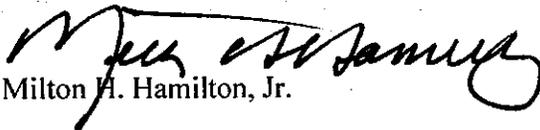
Dear Mr. Criner:

The Department of Environment and Conservation has not received the Solid Waste Planning Region Five-Year Update Report for the Lauderdale County Solid Waste Planning Region. The Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 [T.C.A. 68-211-814 (2)] requires that these reports be revised every five years after the plan's initial approval. The Lauderdale County report was due to the Division of Community Assistance on October 8, 2001.

The Region must submit the required report within 90 days of receipt of this letter. Otherwise, the region and jurisdiction(s) within the region may lose eligibility for grants from the Solid Waste Management Fund. If non-compliance continues, additional sanctions may follow [T.C.A. 68-211-816].

As you are aware, the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 requires the Solid Waste Regions to plan, monitor, and report on solid waste activities. One of the requirements of this legislation was for each region to prepare a Ten-year Solid Waste Management Plan. The legislation also requires that Five-year updates to those plans be prepared and submitted to the state for review. The Lauderdale County Region's Ten-year plan was approved on October 8, 1996; therefore, your Five-year Update is due to this office by **October 8, 2001**. Please note that the Update is expected to consider the next Ten-year planning horizon, and will become your current Ten-year Plan upon approval by this office.

Also required by the Solid Waste Act is submittal of a Needs Assessment report for all of the counties within each Development District. The initial Assessment was due by September 30, 1992; with revisions due by April 1, 1999 and every five years after that. The SW Needs Assessment for the counties and municipalities within your region was received on February 2, 2001. Please contact Mr. Steve Andrews with the Memphis Area Assoc. of Governments to determine the status of your Region's Needs Assessment report. The Needs Assessment will provide much of the information necessary for the preparation of the Five-year Update to your Ten-year Plan.

The Five-year update to your Ten-year Solid Waste Management Plan is an important tool for your Region. Due to the fact that when your original Ten-year Plan was approved in 1996, your county was part of the Haywood-Lauderdale-Tipton Region, this revision will actually be the first Ten-year Plan for your single-county region. 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## INTRODUCTION

The Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 was adopted to help state and local officials deal with solid waste management in a comprehensive manner. The Act required all counties to form Solid Waste Planning Regions and Boards, to prepare a Ten Year Municipal Solid Waste Management Plan, to prepare Annual Solid Waste Progress Reports, and to prepare a Five-Year Plan Update. This document is *The Five-Year Update to the Lauderdale County Solid Waste Planning Region Plan*.

## **Chapter I: Summary – Discussion of the County's Current Status, Needs, and Goals**

The Lauderdale County Solid Waste Planning Region meets or exceeds the state's solid waste management requirements. There are few unmet needs or citizen complaints. Lauderdale County is a single county Region of 471 square miles. Lauderdale County is bounded on the west by the Mississippi River and Arkansas; on the south by the Hatchie River and Tipton County; on the east by Haywood County; on the northeast by Crockett County and the South Fork Forked Deer River; and on the north by Dyer County and the Old Bed Forked Deer River. Lauderdale County is served by U. S. Highway 51 and State Highways 208, 209, and 210 for north/south travel and State Highways 88, 180, 19, 87, and 371 for east/west travel.

Lauderdale County was a member of the Haywood Lauderdale Tipton County Solid Waste Planning Region. The Region agreed to dissolve into single county regions in late 1996. Lauderdale County passed a resolution removing it from the HLT Solid Waste Planning Region and becoming a single county region March 1997.

The Lauderdale County waste reduction rate for 1998 was 0.8244 tons per person, for a 19.45% reduction from the 1989 base year. The 1999 rate was 0.7684 tons per person or a 24.92% reduction from 1989. If more yard, construction and demolition wastes can be diverted or if markets can be found to add new materials to the recycling program the county can exceed the 25% waste reduction goal.

The Lauderdale County waste collection system includes a drop off site at the County Convenience Center, and a contract with Barker Brothers to offer curbside collection to rural residents. The four municipalities have provided curbside collection prior to the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991. The county collection system exceeds the minimum requirements. Comparing the Lauderdale County waste disposal rate to the EPA waste generation rate indicates that almost all of waste generated is collected and disposed of properly. The County Class I landfill closed in late 2000 and the County Convenience Center opened at the same site. The County Class III/IV Landfill opened in 1999, and is also on the same property.

The new convenience center provides a drop of site for recycling and will include space to expand the recycling program and add new materials as markets are found. The County Convenience Center is the county drop-off site for used tires and used oil. The City of Ripley operates a curbside recycling program that collects corrugated containers, mixed metals, and white goods from its residents and businesses. Ripley diverts its yard waste by using an air curtain destructor.

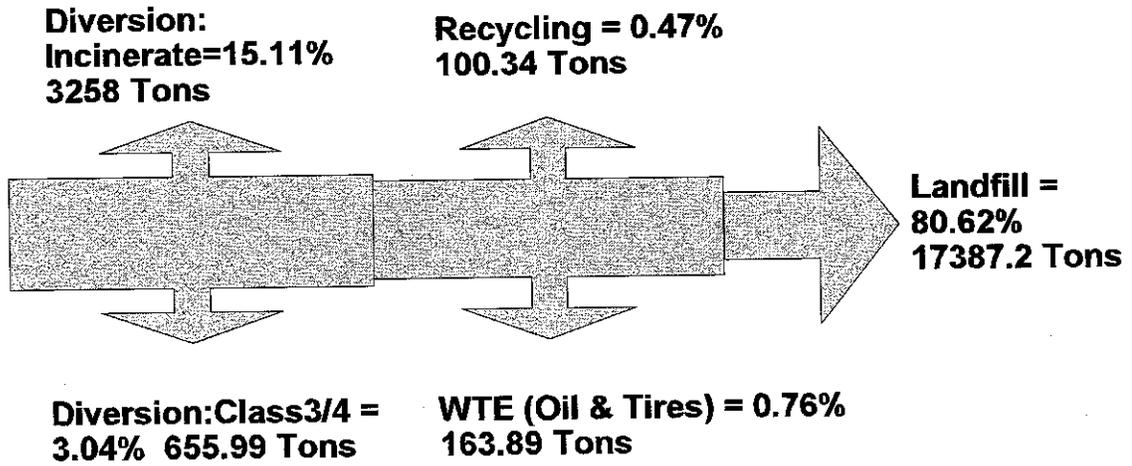
The Lauderdale County used tire drop-off site is at the County Convenience Center. The County changed from using the State tire shredding program to

Option 3 (August 1999), where they contract with an end user, Mac's Tire Recyclers. This system has been more efficient and had fewer problems than the State's shredding program. Mac's provides a trailer to store the tires requiring less space and handling, and the tires are out of the weather and therefore do not become a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Mac's shreds the tires and transports them to TVA's Allen Steam Plant to be used for fuel.

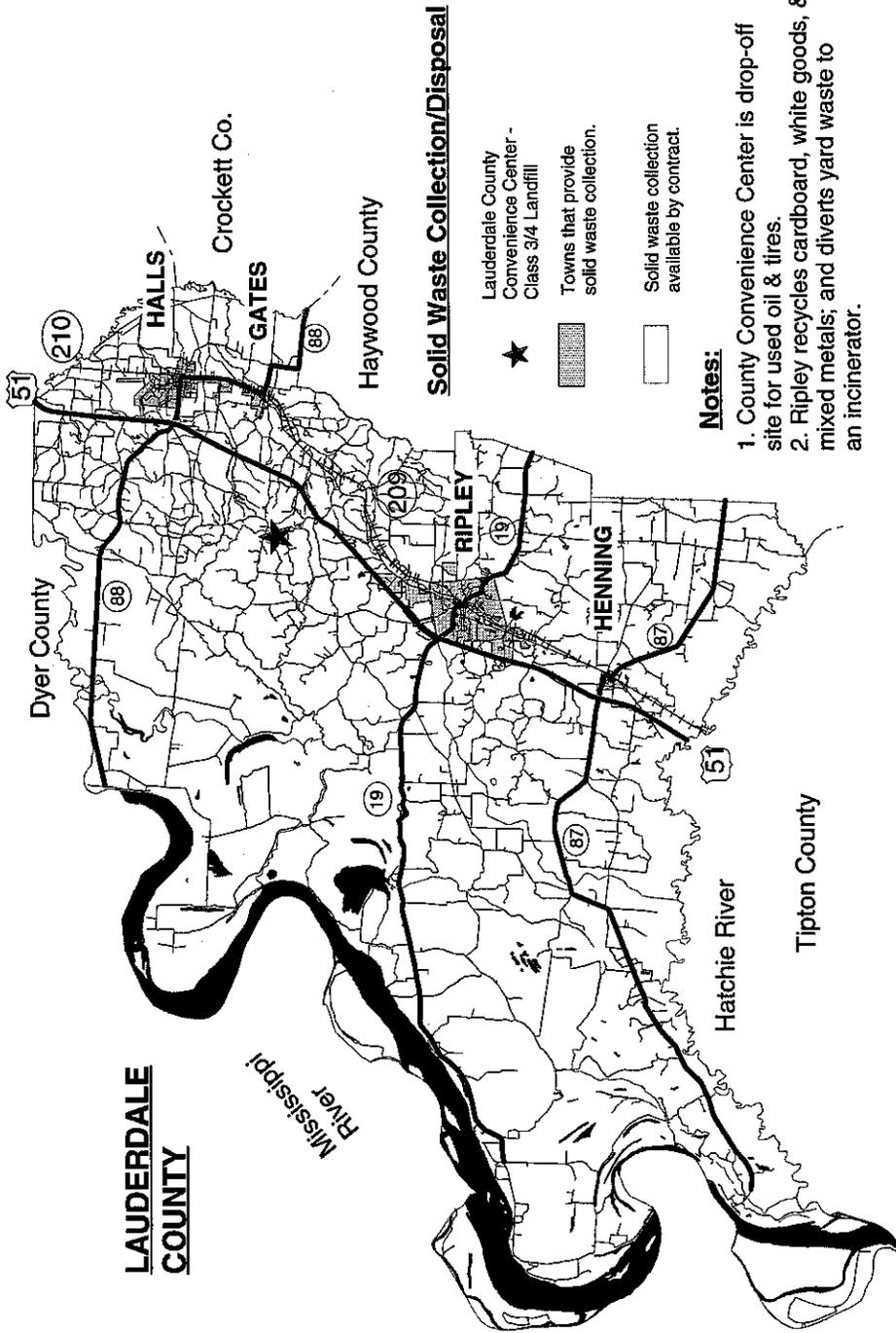
The County has a used oil drop-off site at the Convenience Center. The City of Ripley diverts yard waste from the Class I landfill by using its incinerator. The County has used the State's Household Hazardous Waste Program and hopes to increase participation for future events. The county's main emphasis in solid waste education has been in the public schools.

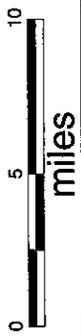


**Solid Waste Collection/Disposal**

## **Chapter 2. General Information**

### **1. Region Name and Governments:**

Lauderdale County is in the Lauderdale County Solid Waste Planning Region. Originally Lauderdale County was a member of the Haywood-Lauderdale-Tipton County Solid Waste Planning Region. The Region agreed to dissolve into single county regions, in late 1996. Lauderdale County passed a resolution removing it from the HLT Solid Waste Planning Region and becoming a single county region March 1997. The four cities that provide solid waste collection are: Gates, Halls, Henning, and Ripley.

### **2. Population:**

The 2000 Census for Lauderdale County is 27,101. The 2000 Census, for the four towns that provide collection, was 12,026 or 44.4% urban.

### **3. Solid Waste Planning Region Board:**

The original Region formation resolution of the Haywood-Lauderdale-Tipton County Solid Waste Planning Region (HLT SWPR), had five representatives appointed for each county. The five Lauderdale County HLT SWPR board members represented the County, Gates, Halls, Henning and Ripley.

When the HLT SWPR dissolved, and the Lauderdale County Solid Waste Planning Region Board was created a nine member board was selected. Five members represent the County and one each represents the cities of Gates, Halls, Henning, and Ripley. The four cities provide collection to their residents and therefore are entitled to a representative on the board.

**6. Solid Waste Planning Board Activities:**

The Planning Board meets as needed to prepare the annual progress reports and to review solid waste facility permit applications.

**7. Region Formation and Structure:**

Lauderdale County is a single county Region. Lauderdale County originally formed a three county region with Haywood and Tipton Counties. The original intent was to share resources and talents in the areas of preparing the Ten Year Solid Waste Plan, recycling, composting, and disposal to reduce the costs for the residents in all three counties. The Haywood Lauderdale Tipton Solid Waste Planning Region worked together to prepare the Ten Year Plan and to prepare the Annual Progress reports, until it dissolved in late 1996. The lack of opportunities and small incentives for working together, and the decision that none of the counties wanted to operate a Regional Class I Landfill lead to the Region dissolving. The decline in board member attendance, resulting in the lack of a quorum, made it difficult for the Board to conduct business and was a contributing factor in the counties forming single county regions.

**8. Municipalities that Provide Door-to-Door Collection:**

The four cities that provide door-to-door municipal solid waste collection are in Table 2-3. Lauderdale County has a contract with Barker Brothers to offer curbside collection to rural residents and operates a Convenience Center, at the former Class I Landfill site.

**9. Geographic and Demographic Description:**

Lauderdale County is a single county Region of 471 square miles. Lauderdale County is bounded on the west by the Mississippi River and Arkansas, and on the south by the Hatchie River and Tipton County. It is bounded on the east by Haywood County; on the northeast by Crockett County and the South Fork Forked Deer River; and on the north by Dyer County and the Old Bed Forked Deer River. Lauderdale County is served by U. S. Highway 51 and State Highways 208, 209, and 210 for north/south travel, and State Highways 88, 180, 19, 87, and 371 for east/west travel.

The largest city is Ripley, the county seat. The four incorporated towns, in Lauderdale County, are Gates, Halls, Henning, and Ripley. The towns are located in the eastern part of the county, east of U.S. Highway 51. The western portion of the county is less populated and more agricultural and wooded; and contains the Chickasaw National Wildlife Refuge (5,798 acres), Anderson-Tully State Wildlife Management Area (24160 acres), Fort Pillow State Park (1,646 acres), Fort Pillow State Prison and Farm (5,715 acres), and the Lower Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge (3,265 acres).

**10. Solid Waste Fees:**

The Lauderdale County Solid Waste Planning Region does not impose a solid waste fee. Lauderdale County charges a disposal fee at the County Convenience Center.

The Town of Gates charges residents a sanitation fee of \$11.00 per month (was \$9.00 prior to July 1, 2000) for twice a week collection. Residents outside the city limits pay \$17.00 a month. The fee was approved by resolution.

The Town of Halls charge residents a sanitation fee of \$10.75 per month (was \$9.00 prior to July 1, 2000) for once a week collection. Businesses pay \$55.75/month for a 4 cubic yard dumpster and \$82.75/month for a 6 cubic yard dumpster. with once a week pick-up.

The Town of Henning created its sanitation fee by resolution. Residents are charged \$9.00 per month, for once a week collection. Businesses are charged \$18.00 per month, for once a week collection. Industries are charged according to the size of container and the frequency of pick-up.

The City of Ripley charges its residents a refuse tax of \$12.00 per month, for weekly pick-up. Businesses on the Square are \$25.00/month, for collection five days/week. Other businesses and industries are charged \$20.00 each time their dumpster is collected. The refuse tax was created and amended by an ordinance and is included in each years budget.

All the municipalities have provided solid waste collection prior to the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991. All the municipalities include the solid waste fee as part of the water bill.

## **Chapter III: Waste Stream**

### **1. Class I Disposal Tonnage**

Lauderdale County had 17,387.2 tons of municipal solid waste collected and sent to Class I landfills or incinerators, in the calendar year 2000. The Lauderdale County Landfill accepted 15,380.20 tons, including 376.5 tons from Gates, 1,871 tons from Halls, 932 tons from Henning, and 5,898.34 tons from Ripley. Northwest Tennessee Disposal Corp. (Barker Brothers) collected 2,007 tons of municipal solid waste and disposed of it at their Obion County.

### **2. Waste Stream Categories by Source**

The estimated percentage of municipal solid waste for the following categories: Residential 31%, Commercial 17%, Industrial 42%, Institutional 2%, and Other 8%.

### **3. Waste Stream Categories by Type**

The waste stream can be shown by the following types: Yard Waste 20%, Construction/Demolition Waste 3% (Class IV), Tires 2%, Recyclables 0.54%, White Goods 2%, Regular Municipal Solid Waste 72.46%, Total 100%.

### **5. Demographic trends**

Lauderdale County's population grew from 1990 to 2000. The Census Bureau shows that Lauderdale County grew from 23,491 in 1990, to 27,101 in 2000, a 15.4% increase. This increase is above that of the nation (13.1%) and below that of the state of Tennessee (16.7%).

### **6. Economic Factors**

Median Household Income (MHI) increased in Lauderdale County from 1990 to 1995 from \$18,972 to \$24,018. That is a 26.6% increase, which is greater than

the Percent increase for the nation (13.4%) and for Tennessee (21.0%). However, Lauderdale's actual MHI in 1995 was significantly lower than both the nation's (\$34,076) and the state's (\$30,016).

The Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development lists Lauderdale's major employers and approximate numbers of employees as: S-R of Tennessee with 722 employees. Tennessee Electroplating company with 720. Marvin Windows and Doors with 675. A. D. Smith, Inc. with 575. Magnetek with 575. Komatsu America with 350, Anderson Hickey Co. with 250. and Ripley Graphics with 125. The 1998 unemployment rate in Lauderdale County, 8.1%, was much higher than the nation's rate, 4.6%, and the state's rate, 4.2%.

## **8. Litter prevention**

Allen Cherry, Halls Public Works Director (731-836-7379), supervises the city's litter clean up and prevention program. One part of the prevention program is distributing free litter bags, at the Annual Air Show. Henning has weekly litter clean-ups of its streets with the use of inmates. The City of Ripley has a litter ordinance. The Ripley Streets Department. L. A. Pennington. Sr., Superintendent (901-635-4000). picks up litter along the city streets. while the Parks Department clean up the city parks, both departments supplement their crews with Inmate labor. Lauderdale County has a TN Department of Transportation Litter Grant Program. Ed Hunt, Lauderdale County Sheriffs Department (731-435-1311), is the County litter grant officer.

## **9. Economic growth adjustment formula**

The economic growth adjustment formula could be of some benefit to the Lauderdale County Solid Waste Planning Region, when a realistic base year waste generation rate has been determined. The data required for the formula is difficult to obtain and should be reviewed and an accurate base year waste generation rate is needed before the formula is adopted.

## **10. New 1995 Base Year and 2003 Goal Year for 25% Waste Reduction**

The new base year generation rate assigned is lower than the original base year generation rate. This change does not reflect existing reduction efforts and makes comparisons with previous years efforts difficult. The region should be allowed to establish a more realistic base year waste generation rate.

## **11. Reduction and Diversion Programs**

The County collects used oil and tires at the County Convenience Center. The City of Ripley collects cardboard, white goods and mixed metals. In 2000, 0.76 tons of used oil, 27.6 tons of cardboard, 55 tons of white goods, 7.75 tons of nonferrous scrap, and 10 tons of mixed metals were collected for recycling. Used tires are dropped off at the County Convenience Center and collected by Mac's Tire Recycling, shredded and transported to TVA's Allen Steam Plant to be used as fuel. The County diverts yard waste at the Class 3/4 landfill, at the County Convenience Center. The City of Ripley in addition to recycling cardboard, white goods, and mixed metals, diverts yard waste and brush at their air curtain destructor. The County Class III/IV Landfill, at the closed Class I Landfill site, helps divert yard waste, construction, and demolition wastes from Class I landfills.

### **3. Recycling Efforts**

The variable and often low market value of recyclables makes operating a recycling program difficult. The long distances and high transportation costs to get recyclables to end users make recycling most items not cost effective. It is difficult to get high participation rates in a drop-off recycling program unless there are an extremely high number of drop-off sites. It is difficult to encourage public participation in a drop-off recycling system, when 50% of the county's population lives in the rural part of the county. The County Convenience Center provides another recycling location and allows the County to recycle more and additional materials as markets are found. The development of the Class III/IV landfill provides a cost effective way of diverting yard waste and construction and

demolition waste from Class I landfills. The City of Ripley reduces its yard waste by incinerating in an air curtain destructor. The jurisdictions in the region do not have any future plans for additional recycling programs.

### 3. Disposal Needs

The region is assured of adequate disposal capacity at a reasonable price for the ten year planning period. The planned disposal facilities have planned disposal capacity in excess of ten years. Lauderdale County closed its Class I Landfill in late 2000. The County Convenience Center and a Class III/IV Landfill are located on the same property. The Convenience Center serves as a solid waste and recycling drop-off site and as a transfer station. The cost of disposal will probably increase, but the competition between area solid waste haulers and landfills will hopefully keep prices reasonable.

## Chapter 7: Problem Wastes

Lauderdale County provides a collection site for used tires, and used oil at the County Convenience Center; and used tires, used automotive fluids and lead acid batteries are collected at area retailers.

### 1. State Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program

Lauderdale County has not taken advantage of the State's Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program in the past two years. The County has been satisfied with the State household hazardous waste collection events and while participation was low, the County plans to continue participating in the program. The County hopes to increase the participation rate for future events.

## **2. Permanent Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center**

The region does not have permanent household hazardous waste collection center and does not plan for one in the future.

## **3. Success of State Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program**

The region has had limited success with the State's collection program. It is difficult to get participation for a drop-off collection event that occurs, at a maximum of, once a year.

## **4. Waste Tire Collection:**

The Lauderdale County accepts used tires at the County Convenience Center. Local retailers recycle the used tires of their customers. The County used the State's mobile shredder program until July 1999. The County changed to the State's Option Three program in July 1999 and contracted with Mac's Tire Recyclers (Saltillo, MS) to collect and dispose of their tires. Mac's shreds the tires at their plant and transports the shreds to the TVA Allen steam plant to be used as fuel.

## **5. Satisfaction with Waste Tire Collection Program:**

Lauderdale County is satisfied with the Option Three program. There are no changes planned or needed.

## **6. Waste Tire Dumping:**

The county does not have a problem with waste tire dumping.

## **7. Used Oil, Automotive Fluids and Lead Acid Battery Collection:**

Used oil is collected at the County Convenience Center. Used oil, automotive fluids and lead acid batteries are collected at area retailers.

The county's main emphasis has been encouraging environmental education through the school system. This approach is the least expensive method and reaches the most people. Children, who learn to consider what is best for the environment, encourage their parents and other relatives to protect the environment. The public school programs have been applied since the early 1990's. The region has not filed an education action plan. The tight budgets and limited staff, trained to run a solid waste management education program, make it difficult for county governments to provide public solid waste education. One suggestion, offered by several

rural counties, is that the State should sponsor a solid waste education/recycling coordinator, for each of the state's grand divisions.

Mr. Newman had only favorable comments about the Plan Update.

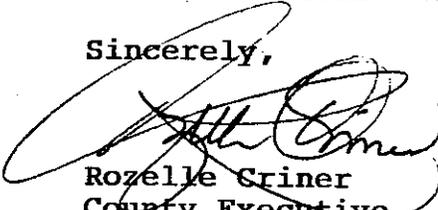

MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE PLANNING REGION

WHEREAS, the adoption of the Subtitle D landfill regulations by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and companion regulations adopted by the Tennessee Solid Waste Control Board will impact on both the cost and method of disposal of municipal solid waste; and

WHEREAS, at the urging and support of a coalition of local government, environmental, commercial and industrial leaders, the 97th Tennessee General Assembly enacted T.C.A. § 68-211-801 et seq. Titled "Solid Waste Act of 1991"; and

WHEREAS, with the view that better planning for solid waste will help control the additional cost that will be imposed by the new landfill regulations, help protect the environment, provide and improve solid waste management system, better utilize or natural resources, and promote the education of the citizens of Tennessee in the areas of solid waste management including the need for and desirability of reduction and minimization of solid waste, local governments in Tennessee supported and worked for the passage of this Act; and

WHEREAS, one of the stated public policies of this Act is to institute and maintain a comprehensive, integrated, statewide program for solid waste management; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that all ties and affiliation of Lauderdale County with the Haywood, Lauderdale and Tipton County Solid Waste Planning Region be dissolved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Board of County Commissioners of Lauderdale County, Tennessee, acting pursuant to T.C.A. § 68-211-801 *et seq.*, that there is hereby established a Municipal Solid Waste Region for and by Lauderdale County, Tennessee; and

BE it Further Resolved, that members of the Board of the Municipal Solid Waste Region shall serve a six (6) year term except that two (2) member appointed by the County Executive shall have a two (2) year term, that one (1) member appointed by the Mayor of Ripleys shall have a two(2) year term, that two (2) member appointed by the County Executive shall have a four (4) year term, that one (1) member appointed by the Mayor of Henning shall have a four (4) year term, that one (1) member appointed by the Mayor of Halls shall have a four (4) year term, that one (1) member appointed by the Mayor of Gates shall have a six (6) year term, that one (1) member appointed by the County Executive shall have a six (6) year term; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Municipal Solid Waste Region Board shall have all powers and duties as granted by T.C.A. § 68-211-813 *et seq.* And in addition, in the performance of its duty to produce a municipal solid waste region plan, it shall be empowered to utilize existing Lauderdale County governmental personnel, to employ or contract with persons, private consulting firms, and /or governmental, quasi-governmental, and public entities and agencies and to utilize Lauderdale County's services, facilities and records in completing this task; and

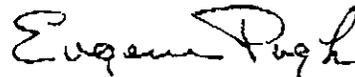

## Treatment of Children with Persist

Asthma involves inflammation and narrowing of passages (bronchioles) in the lungs. Recent reports show a number of adults and children affected by asthma in 1982 and 1992. During these same 10 years the death rate from asthma increased 35%. Typically, at the beginning of an asthma attack there is shortness of breath, coughing, and/or chest pain. If the lungs are not properly ventilated, the victim may turn blue, confused and lethargic. These are signs that emergency treatment should be taken.

A new study indicates that children who are not following recommended prevention and treatment are at the highest risk for the effects of uncontrolled asthma. Controlled studies show that only 38% received recommended daily anti-inflammatories such as cromolyn (Intal) or nedocromil (Tilade). Daily inhaled steroids such as beclomethasone (Beclonase) are also used. Some families do not have action plans for asthma emergencies. If there is a child in your family with asthma, talk with your doctor and pharmacist about things you can do to prevent flare-ups.

## A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF LAUDERDALE COUNTY APPROVING THE FIVE-YEAR UPDATE OF THE LAUDERDALE COUNTY MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE REGIONAL PLAN

**WHEREAS,** The 97<sup>th</sup> Tennessee General Assembly enacted T.C.A. 68-211-801 et seq. titled "Solid Waste Management Act of 1991"; and

**WHEREAS,** The act required that municipal solid waste regions be established throughout the state to institute and maintain a comprehensive, integrated, state-wide program for solid waste management; and

**WHEREAS,** The County of Lauderdale, including the municipalities therein, was established as a municipal solid waste region; and

**WHEREAS,** Each region was charged with establishing a municipal solid waste regional board to administer the activities of the region and to develop a municipal solid waste regional plan; and

**WHEREAS,** The State of Tennessee requires documentation that Lauderdale County's Board of County Commissioners has approved the five-year update.

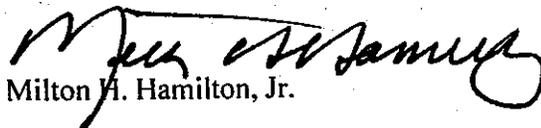

The Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 [T.C.A. 68-211-814 (2)] requires that these reports be revised every five years after the plan's initial approval. The Lauderdale County report was due to the Division of Community Assistance on October 8, 2001.

The Region must submit the required report within 90 days of receipt of this letter. Otherwise, the region and jurisdiction(s) within the region may lose eligibility for grants from the Solid Waste Management Fund. If non-compliance continues, additional sanctions may follow [T.C.A. 68-211-816].

As you are aware, the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 requires the Solid Waste Regions to plan, monitor, and report on solid waste activities. One of the requirements of this legislation was for each region to prepare a Ten-year Solid Waste Management Plan. The legislation also requires that Five-year updates to those plans be prepared and submitted to the state for review. The Lauderdale County Region's Ten-year plan was approved on October 8, 1996; therefore, your Five-year Update is due to this office by **October 8, 2001**. Please note that the Update is expected to consider the next Ten-year planning horizon, and will become your current Ten-year Plan upon approval by this office.

Also required by the Solid Waste Act is submittal of a Needs Assessment report for all of the counties within each Development District. The initial Assessment was due by September 30, 1992; with revisions due by April 1, 1999 and every five years after that. The SW Needs Assessment for the counties and municipalities within your region was received on February 2, 2001. Please contact Mr. Steve Andrews with the Memphis Area Assoc. of Governments to determine the status of your Region's Needs Assessment report. The Needs Assessment will provide much of the information necessary for the preparation of the Five-year Update to your Ten-year Plan.

The Five-year update to your Ten-year Solid Waste Management Plan is an important tool for your Region. Due to the fact that when your original Ten-year Plan was approved in 1996, your county was part of the Haywood-Lauderdale-Tipton Region, this revision will actually be the first Ten-year Plan for your single-county region.
