

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TENNESSEE EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS BOARD

Fiscal Year 2019



Pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. §§ 7-86-128(b)(3)¹ and 7-86-315,² the Tennessee Emergency Communications Board ("Board" or "TECB") hereby submits its annual report to the Governor, Speakers of the General Assembly and the Senate and House Finance, Ways and Means Committees. This annual report covers the Board's activities from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019.

Statement of the Chairman

On behalf of the members of the Tennessee Emergency Communications Board, I am pleased to present you with the Board's annual report for fiscal year 2019.

The Emergency Communications Board began the fiscal year focusing on 911 telecommunicator training and education. The Board provided an average of more than five hundred (500) hours of training each month through its online training platform. The Board also coordinated with the National Emergency Number Association ("NENA"), to provide several in-person training programs throughout the state resulting in over 2,500 hours of in-person training.

The Board continued to move forward with its Next Generation 911 ("NG911") project. NG911 is replacing the State's 911 infrastructure with an internet protocol ("IP") platform that will improve 911 call delivery, enhance interoperability and increase the ease of communication between emergency communications districts, allowing the immediate transfer of 911 calls, caller information, and other data statewide.

At the end of the fiscal year over 105 of Tennessee's 142 public safety answering points ("PSAPs") were live on the network, as were all telecommunications carriers operating in Tennessee. Each month over 250,000 911 calls are processed over the NG911 network.

In fiscal year 2019, the Board also began offering Text-to-911 service to Tennessee's one hundred (100) emergency communications districts. Text-to-911 has been successfully deployed in Hamilton County, Memphis and part of Madison County. Many other deployments are expected in fiscal year 2020.

The financial integrity of the emergency communications districts across Tennessee continues to be one of the board's highest priorities. The Board and its staff worked diligently throughout the year to guide and assist districts with financial matters, and the Board is pleased to announce that none of the districts are "financially distressed" under Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-86-304(d).

I would like to express my gratitude to the hundreds of 911 professionals in Tennessee. Because of their hard work and dedication Tennessee remains a national leader in 911 and continues to provide its citizens and guests with high-quality 911 service throughout the State. It is an honor to serve as the chairman of the Tennessee Emergency Communications Board.

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Introduction

The Tennessee Emergency Communications Board ("TECB"), a division of the Department of Commerce and Insurance, was created "for the purpose of assisting emergency communications district boards of directors in the area of management, operations, and accountability, and establishing emergency communications for all citizens of the state."¹ The TECB is funded through a monthly 911 surcharge on communications services capable of connecting to 911.²

The TECB exercises financial and operational oversight over the State's one hundred (100) emergency communications districts ("ECDs"), which are statutorily created municipalities responsible for administering and facilitating local 911 call taking and dispatching services.³ The TECB is also charged with establishing technical, operational, and dispatcher training standards and establishing operating standards concerning acceptable uses of revenue.⁴

The TECB works on the local, state and federal levels to facilitate the technical, financial and operational advancement of Tennessee's 911 system and its ECDs. As part of this advancement, the TECB is currently engaged in a revolutionary project to modernize the State's aging 911 infrastructure, converting it from analog to digital. This Next Generation 911 project involves the construction and management of a statewide Internet Protocol ("IP") platform that will vastly improve 911 call delivery, provide additional layers of redundancy, and enhance interoperability between ECDs. The TECB's progress on this project makes Tennessee a national leader in 911.

The 911 Emergency Communications Fund

The 911 Emergency Communications Fund is a separate fund of deposits in the state treasury comprised of 911 surcharges collected by the TECB and interest accumulated on those deposits.⁶ The 911 surcharge is the TECB's sole recurring revenue source. It is levied on communications services that are capable of contacting a PSAP by entering or dialing the digits 911.

Disbursements from the fund are limited solely to the operational and administrative expenses of the TECB. Authorized operational and administrative expenditures include distributing a statutorily-determined amount of base funding to each ECD, implementing and maintaining an IP-based NG911 network, and funding the Tennessee Regulatory Authority for the Tennessee Relay Services/Telecommunications Devices Access Program ("TRS/TDAP"), which provides assistance to those Tennesseans whose disabilities interfere with their use of communications services and technologies.

During fiscal year 2019, total cash receipts of \$105,652,433 were collected from the 911 surcharge. This was comprised of \$19,823,853 from prepaid cell phone service sales and \$85,728,580 from standard 911 service charges. The TECB had total expenditures of \$113,925,128 for the fiscal year. Payments to ECDs totaled over \$97.3 million, constituting 85.4% of the total expenditures. Payments to ECDs included \$94.4 million for statutory distributions and \$3 million for recurring non-mandated controller subsidy distributions. Payments to individual districts are identified in Exhibit D.

The TECB provided corporate cost recovery to wireless telecommunications providers in the amount of \$28,329 while investing over \$11.2 million to advance NG911 in the state. Approximately \$2.8 million was expended for administration, including contracts with technical consultants and training. The 911 Funding Modernization and IP Transition Act of 2014 requires the TECB to reimburse the TRA, renamed the Public Utilities Commission ("PUC"), for the Tennessee Relay Services/Telecommunications Devices Access Program. The TECB reimbursed the PUC over \$1.9 million for these services and programs.

The 911 Funding Modernization and IP Transition Act of 2014 also requires the TECB to annually distribute to each ECD a base amount equal to the average total recurring

annual revenue the ECD received for fiscal years 2010 through 2012.⁷ The Act guarantees no ECD will receive less than the total amount it received in fiscal year 2012. The adjusted base amounts for each ECD are identified in Exhibit G.

Status of Next Generation 911 Modernization Project

Traditional 911 infrastructure does not fully support the next generation of IP devices and advancements in 911 technology currently becoming available. In order to advance 911 congruently as telecommunications technology advances, the TECB began a project to replace Tennessee's 911 infrastructure with a platform that will provide 911 with the capabilities our citizens expect from modern telecommunications technology.

The project, referred to as NG911, involves utilization of the State's secure, private, outsourced Multiprotocol Label Switching ("MPLS") network called "NetTN," provided by AT&T and managed by Strategic Technology Solutions ("STS") in the Tennessee Department of Finance and Administration. The new network improves redundancy, reliability, and 911 call delivery. It enhances interoperability and increases the ease of communication between ECDs, allowing immediate transfer of 911 calls, caller information, and other data on a statewide level. NG911 will also provide alternate paths to process emergency calls in the event of an outage, providing lifesaving capabilities in the event of an emergency that would have been unachievable on the outdated analog network.

On September 27, 2018, the TECB voted to proceed with moving from AT&T's microDATA-based Internet protocol selective routing (IPSR) solution to its nationwide ESInet[™] with Next Generation Core Services (NGCS) solution. This decision includes a transition to the automatic location identification (ALI) platform also supported by the AT&T nationwide solution. This change will allow the state of Tennessee to continue its leadership in NG911 and will enable the TECB to deliver enhanced technology services, including deployment of Text-to-911. Text-to-911 has been successfully deployed in Hamilton County and portions of Madison and Shelby County, and many other deployments are expected in fiscal year 2020.

In fiscal year 2019, the TECB spent \$11,224,726 million implementing and maintaining the NG911 project: \$6,974,790 to integrate with and adapt the Net TN system for NG911 purposes; \$780,966 for non-recurring start-up costs of the statewide hosted controller or Call Handling as a Service program; \$3,451,369 to maintain the twenty-four hour network operations center to assist PSAPs with technical issues; and \$17,600 for Esri GIS software licensing.

The TECB projects annual recurring operational costs of approximately \$16.5 million to maintain the NG911 program.

Financial Status of Emergency Communications Districts

The TECB monitors the financial health of all one hundred (100) ECDs in Tennessee. Districts that are deemed to meet the statutory definition of "financially distressed" are subject to the TECB's supervision and evaluation pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-86-304(d). The TECB is pleased to report none of Tennessee's one hundred (100) ECDs were determined to be financially distressed during the 2019 fiscal year based on analysis of FY2018 audit reports.

- One district had three consecutive years of negative change in net position meeting the definition for distressed status and three (3) districts with three years of negative change in FY2017 had a fourth consecutive year of negative change. These four (4) districts had depreciation expense greater than their negative change on FY2018 audit reports and were evaluated by TECB and determined not distressed in consideration of state law and TECB Policy No. 6. TECB staff attended at least one board meeting of each of these districts after audits were released; and Policy 6 requirements were discussed with ECD board members. All four (4) districts are working with staff to address their negative changes in net position.
- Eighteen (18) districts had a first year of negative change in net position; and twelve (12) of those districts had depreciation expenses greater than the negative change. The remaining six (6) were notified and offered assistance in accordance with Policy 6.
- Five (5) districts had a second consecutive year of negative change in net position and staff has communicated with these districts to offer assistance.

Emergency Communications Districts Audits

The TECB may act upon any adverse findings noted in ECD audits and order such action as may be necessary to remedy the adverse findings.⁸

The following schedule is a comparison of reported findings in ECD audit reports for the last three (3) years. Fiscal year 2018 findings for each ECD are found in Attachment F.

Other TECB Activities

The TECB is committed to ensuring 911 telecommunicators are providing Tennesseans with the highest level of 911 service. The TECB fulfills this commitment by providing numerous education and training opportunities for 911 districts and telecommunicators. In FY2019, there were three core focus areas that provided positive impacts to our customers and citizens.


First, the TECB partnered with the National Emergency Number Association ("NENA") to offer several in-person training programs throughout the state. In excess of 2,500 hours of training was executed through courses such as: Center Supervisor; 9-1-1 Center Training Officer; Recruit, Hire, Retain and Promote for Success; Advanced Police Dispatch; Advanced Fire/EMS Dispatch; and Enhanced Caller Management. NENA courses provide direct benefit to the leadership of 911 in Tennessee.


Second, the TECB offered coursework that enhanced the trade-skills 911 Geographical Information Systems (GIS) professionals in the state through a partnership with TrueNorth Geographic Technologies (TNGeo). The local GIS dataset is the required base for Next Generation 911 call routing, call delivery, and effective dispatching of emergency services within the State. These courses offered instruction to local GIS professionals on proper data management, standards compliance, enhanced location service offerings, and response boundary topology. TNGeo courses provide direct benefit to the core functions of NG911 in Tennessee.

Last, the TECB continued to provide its Virtual Academy on-line training platform at no cost to Tennessee's 911 telecommunicators. The Virtual Academy initiative has been an enormous success, averaging more than five hundred (500) hours of training each month. The platform saves local jurisdictions significant time and money, ensuring their employees meet Tennessee's training requirements while reducing travel, staffing, and tuition costs. As of June 30, 2019, there were 1,938 users registered on the platform, and over 9,000 hours of content has been delivered. Virtual Academy provides direct benefit to the frontline operations of 911 in Tennessee.


