# Governor's School Safety Working Group

Several tragic events at schools across the United States in early 2018 created an opportunity for Tennessee leaders to work together to strategically plan and act to address the important challenge of protecting our teachers and students. In February 2018, Governor Bill Haslam convened a school safety working group to review Tennessee's school safety measures and provide recommendations for improvement. The group identified three immediate priorities:

- 1) a review of all school facilities to identify vulnerabilities,
- 2) increased funding for school resource officers (SROs), and
- 3) development of a system for reporting suspicious activity.

In addition, the working group identified a need to better support student mental health needs, to ensure planning and preparedness processes are monitored, and to require that plans and processes are specifically built around identified vulnerabilities. A copy of the working group's recommendations is attached as <a href="Appendix I.">Appendix I.</a>

# Building a Comprehensive School Safety Strategy for Tennessee Schools

At the national level, the <u>Federal Commission on School Safety</u> was tasked with producing policy recommendations to prevent future tragedies. Like the recommendations of Tennessee's school safety working group, the commission's report recognizes the need for a comprehensive approach that is tailored to the unique needs of individual schools and the communities they serve. Both the national and state reports recognize the importance of preventing and mitigating risks while ensuring that schools are prepared to respond effectively to worst-case scenarios.

This comprehensive approach consists of four broad areas of focus: security, preparedness, student support, and school climate. These four areas are equally important and mutually-supporting. For example, students who feel welcome and engaged at school (i.e., school climate) are much more likely to share information about potentially-dangerous situations, like if a student has a gun at school (i.e., security).

# **School Security**

## **School Safety Funding**

The Safe Schools Act of 1998 established a matching grant program for Tennessee schools. Safe schools funds are available to all Tennessee school districts and may be used for a variety of safety and violence prevention activities including school resource officers, security and surveillance equipment, and violence prevention programs. The amount of funding available through this program has remained level at approximately \$4.8 million since 2001. A summary of the 2017-18 grants to individual districts and the purposes for which they were used is attached as <a href="Appendix II">Appendix II</a>. As a result of recommendations from the School Safety Working Group, school safety funding for the 2018-19 school year was increased to \$35 million. A summary of these grants will be included in the 2018/2019 Annual Safe Schools Report.

# **Security Assessment for Every Public School**

In order to be eligible to receive grant funding, every school in the state was required to complete a security assessment and submit their emergency operations plan (EOP) and drill log for the 2017-18 school year. The Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security created a security assessment based on national criteria and conducted training for teams of local law enforcement and school personnel. Over 1,800 assessments were conducted by these local teams during the months of May and June of 2018.

#### **School Resource Officers**

According to the <u>Federal Commission on School Safety</u>, the personnel best positioned to respond to acts of violence are SROs. In Tennessee, SROs are duly sworn and authorized law enforcement officers assigned to a school setting. SROs are required to receive 40 hours of specialized training within the first year of their assignment and must obtain 16 hours of specialized training annually thereafter.




Figure 2: Percentage of SROs in Tennessee Schools

Districts report annually to the department regarding their SRO programs. Figure 2 shows the percentage of SROs assigned to high school, middle school, and elementary schools in the state. A total of 967 full-time equivalent SRO positions were reported. Compared to the 2016-17 school year there has been a nine percent increase in the number of SROs assigned to schools.




Figure 3: Funding Sources for SROs

Funding for SROs comes from local government, districts, safe schools grant, and federal funds. The percentages are identified in Figure 3.

# **Emergency Preparedness**

#### **Emergency Operations Planning**

The SAVE Act, T.C.A. § 49-6-801, established specific requirements for districts related to providing a safe school environment, including the formation of district and school safety teams and the development of comprehensive safety plans. These plans, referred to as emergency operations plans (EOPs), outline how schools prepare for, respond to, and recover from emergencies. A well-developed and well-documented EOP ensures that plans and procedures are comprehensive and are communicated to everyone with a potential role during emergency situations.

District EOPs are reviewed by an interdepartmental state team on a five-year cycle that coincides with their county emergency management planning cycle. Districts also provide the department with an annual assurance that school EOPs are updated. The District EOP reviews found that the plans were stronger in response procedures, emergency communication, and incident command structure. Areas of improvement included security procedures and the usage of memorandums of understanding for securing community partnerships.

## **Training Personnel and Conducting Emergency Drills**

Training on school safety principles provide school personnel with strategies to prevent, protect, mitigate, respond, and ultimately recover from a crisis. The department, along with its state partners such as Safety and Homeland Security, the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency, and the departments of Health and Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services, delivers training through many different means. The Tennessee School Safety Specialist Program (TSSSP), a five-day training program, offers participants an indepth look at school safety issues and offers strategies for district personnel to support school safety at the building level.

Drills provide an opportunity for students to be trained in emergency procedures and allow school staff to identify gaps in their planning and training. Current drill requirements are listed in Table 1.


#### **School Climate**

#### **Tennessee School Climate Model**

According to Federal Commission on School Safety: Prevent, 2018, "The circumstances that lead to violence are complex and far ranging, often the culmination of months and years of individual experiences. Accordingly, improving school safety cannot focus solely on mitigating incidents of violence. Successful efforts must improve the culture in which students live and learn". The department has taken important steps to enhance the quality of students' school life and to foster conditions for learning that contribute to student's academic success.

One foundational step has been the creation of an infrastructure for measuring student, parent, and staff perceptions of school climate. School climate refers to the aspects of the school environment that makes a student feel academically challenged, physically and emotionally safe, and valued and connected to their school settings. The <a href="Tennessee School Climate Measurement System">Tennessee School Climate Measurement System</a> is a free resource for Tennessee schools and districts that allows school leaders to assess student, parent, and teacher perceptions in the three key areas of engagement, safety, and environment.

In the 2017-18 school year, 38 districts and 269 schools voluntarily utilized the school climate survey. The tables below highlight trends in the use of school climate measurement over the past three years.

The tables above indicate that school leaders are becoming better informed as to the importance of the climate of their schools. A list of participating districts and state level results can be found in <u>Appendix III</u>.

#### **Bullying Prevention Practices and Policies**

T.C.A. § 49-6-4503 requires every school district to establish policies relative to bullying, harassment, and intimidation. The department regularly conducts student support trainings to provide an overview of these and other related requirements with a particular focus on ensuring that policy is reflected in effective practice. In addition, districts annually report to the department regarding the number of incidents reported. More information about the trainings can be found in <u>Appendix IV</u>.

#### **Restorative Practices**

Restorative practices is a strengths-based strategy which seeks to develop community and manage conflict by repairing the harm caused by inappropriate behavior and restoring relationships. These practices have been proven to be effective in reducing misbehavior, bullying, violence, and crime among students while improving the overall climate for learning. In the 2017-18 school year, the department provided 43 restorative practices trainings for an estimated 1,260 educators and administrators.

# Student Support

#### **Mental Health Needs in Tennessee Schools**

According to the <u>Coordinated School Health Annual Report</u>, Tennessee schools have a total of 2,347 school counselors (947 in elementary schools, 500 in middle schools, and 900 in high schools). Furthermore, the report indicates that only 444 Tennessee schools have a social worker. The national recommendation for student-to-school counselor ratio is 250:1. If we evaluate Tennessee data against this recommendation, over 90 percent of districts are designated as having a school counselor shortage. (<u>Seamless Pathways: Bridging Tennessee's Gap Between High School and Postsecondary</u>, 2017).

In 2018, the National Threat Assessment Center released "Enhancing School Safety Using A Threat Assessment Model: Operational Guide for Preventing Targeted School Violence" with recommendations for establishing a multidisciplinary threat assessment team to include SROs, school counselors, mental health professionals, teachers, coaches, members from the school community, and school administrators. These teams, sometimes referred to as CARE Teams, are trained to identify and intervene with students who may be on a pathway of violence to themselves or others. The model indicates that anxiety, depression, thoughts of suicide, and other mental health issues are important factors to consider when conducting an assessment.

According to the <u>Tennessee Suicide Prevention Network</u>, <u>Tennessee Youth Suicide Data</u>, Tennessee ranks 22nd in the nation for suicide rates for youth ages 10 to 24. In 2017, 75 young Tennesseans, ages 10 to 24, died by suicide, up from 65 during the previous year.

The department received a federal grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to expand youth access to mental health resources and promote resilience and positive behavioral functioning among school-age youth. Through this grant, the department has created the Tennessee Comprehensive School-based Mental Health Resource Guide to assist districts in expanding their capacity to provide students with mental health supports and services. This grant also provided Youth Mental Health First Aid training to introduce all staff working with adolescents to the unique risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems in adolescents. The training builds an understanding of the importance of early intervention and teaches individuals how to help an adolescent who is in crisis or experiencing a mental health challenge. In the 2017-18 school year, 1,362 first aiders were trained in Tennessee who then referred 1,568 students to mental health or related services.

## **Building Strong Brains: Strategies for Educators**

The department's 2015-16 school year educator survey indicated that 73 percent of teachers reported a need for further support in meeting the non-academic needs of students. Building Strong Brains: Strategies for Educators was developed to empower school leaders and teachers to address the impact of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) on the school and classroom. In this training, participants learn:

- Types of stress and how stress interferes with healthy development
- Brain architecture and how experiences and interaction shape the brain
- Types of trauma
- Knowledge building on self-regulation and resilience
- ACEs study and implications
- Trauma-informed principles and practices for classrooms
- School employee wellness needs

During the 2017-18 school year, over 5,000 Tennessee educators participated in the Building Strong Brains: Strategies for Educators Training. Participants reported that learning to respond versus react to students affected by ACEs was the most important outcome of the training.

#### **Social and Personal Competencies**

Social and personal competencies are a set of interpersonal competencies that include self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making skills. Research has proven that fostering social and personal competencies can help prevent school violence and improve school safety (Federal Commission on School Safety: Prevent, 2018). The department has released a variety of resources to support the integration of social and personal competency development into classroom instruction including a Social and Personal Competency Resource Guide and a Toolkit for Teachers and Administrators to Incorporate Social and Personal Competencies into Instruction. These resources can be found here.

#### Serious Incidents in Tennessee Schools

Serious incidents related to student behavior in Tennessee schools are tracked via the department's student management information system. For the purposes of this report, the department has developed a measure entitled the School Safety Index which includes those incidents deemed to be most directly related to the safety and welfare of students including the following:

- Possession of a handgun
- Possession of a rifle or shotgun
- Possession of an explosive or incendiary device
- Possession of a weapon other than a firearm
- Assault of a teacher or staff member
- Assault of a student
- Sexual assault
- Aggravated assault of a teacher or staff member
- Aggravated assault of a student
- Attempted homicide

Below is a summary of these incidents in Tennessee schools for the past four years.

## **School Safety Index**

In order to arrive at a school-level measure, the total number of the above incidents that have been reported for the school year via the student management information system are divided by a school's average daily membership to arrive at a school safety index score. Scores for any schools reporting one or more serious incidents during the 2017-18 school year, aggregated by district, is included in <u>Appendix V</u>.

Using the same formula (i.e., serious incidents/ADM) to review Tennessee as a whole, the aggregate school safety index for Tennessee is presented below:

## **Special Focus: Transportation**

Public Chapter 289 of the Public Acts of 2017 marked a significant new direction for school transportation policy in Tennessee. Enacted following a tragic bus accident in Hamilton County, the legislation enhances the safety of student transportation by increasing accountability while strengthening the qualification and training requirements for Tennessee transportation supervisors. Specifically, Public Chapter 289 requires that:

- Each school district and charter school appoint a transportation supervisor for monitoring and oversight of transportation services.
- Each transportation supervisor complete a management training program developed by the Departments of Safety and Education.
- By August 15 of each year, each school district or charter school submit to the department the name of the transportation supervisor and verification that they have completed training.
- School boards adopt transportation policies that include:
  - Procedures for safety complaints to be reported by students, parents, teachers, staff, and the community.
  - o Procedures for supervisors to investigate any complaint of safety violation or safety concern.
  - Requirements that each bus is equipped with a phone number on the rear bumper) for reporting safety complaints.
  - o Policy or procedure of annual notification of the safety concern process.
  - o Policy or procedures for the collection and maintenance of relevant records.
- New bus drivers complete an entry level driver training program prior to transporting students that, at a minimum, addresses:

- Student management
- Distracted driving
- School and district policy
- Driving techniques
- Evacuations
- Loading and unloading
- o Mirror usage, and
- State and federal law
- All applicants seeking an initial school bus endorsement must be 25 years old.
- All applicants must have at least five consecutive years of unrestricted driving experience.

In order to implement this new law, the department has hired a director and a consultant to oversee training and monitoring associated with the new district requirements. Transportation supervisor training has been developed and is conducted on a rotating basis to ensure new supervisors receive training in a timely manner. A monitoring system is in place to ensure compliance with state and federal pupil transportation requirements. To date, over 60 compliance visits have been completed including all charter operators.

In addition, the department is currently administering a \$3 million appropriation to establish a school bus seat restraint grant program. The grant program reimburses districts for the additional cost associated with adding seat restraints when purchasing new buses or retrofitting qualifying buses already in operation. Seventeen districts have been awarded grants, and two districts have placed buses in service that are equipped with seat restraints.

# Appendix I: School Safety Working Group Recommendations

The Governor's School Safety Working Group prepared recommendations for consideration using the following **guiding principles** that emerged throughout the process:

- Students and educators fundamentally deserve to feel safe in schools.
- School safety and emergency operations planning must be approached comprehensively with attention to safety planning, preparation, and prevention.
- School climate planning and assessment strategies must be integrated into the school safety planning process.
- Districts, schools, and local communities must prioritize placing trained law enforcement officers in schools.
- State funding for school safety should be allocated and distributed as fairly and equitably as
  possible with attention to the areas of greatest need based on a standardized assessment of
  security risks.
- The state should support and encourage maximum utilization of technology to support school safety.

Based on these guiding principles, the working group submits the following **immediate priorities and recommendations for consideration**:

#### I. Immediate Priorities

- 1. Review and assess all school facilities to identify vulnerabilities and determine the most appropriate use of resources to address those vulnerabilities.
- 2. Provide funding for school resource officers with an initial focus on schools with lesser capacity to fund through local resources.
- 3. Develop or secure a statewide technology application for the anonymous reporting of threats and critical concerns.

#### II. Further Recommendations and Detail

- 1. Facility Security and Planning
  - Every school in Tennessee should be assessed for safety and security measures and rated
    using a standardized tool to identify strengths and areas of risk. State funding should be
    prioritized for local needs as determined by this assessment. Each school emergency
    operations plan should be reviewed and assessed annually.
  - The Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security (TN DOS) should develop statewide physical security model standards for schools and establish statewide physical assessment training and protocols to enable local school districts and first responders to identify and address vulnerabilities.
  - The Tennessee Department of Education (TN DOE) should require individual school emergency operations plans (EOPs) to be reviewed by relevant local subject matter experts on an annual basis and ensure specific facility risks and hazards are identified and addressed.

#### 2. School Safety Personnel

• The state should prioritize the use of school resource officers (SROs) for school security personnel and provide guidance to local school districts, local law enforcement, and local funding bodies relative to available state and federal funding.

#### 3. Training and Drills

- The TN DOE should ensure required school safety drills and exercises address current risks
  and hazards at the local sites as identified by the security assessment and that such risks
  and hazards are reviewed annually for the purpose of updating and revising corresponding
  training.
- Local school districts should expand required safety drills and exercises to include scenariobased discussions, simulations, and post-drill reviews under the leadership of local first responders.
- TN DOE, TN DOS, and the Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (TN DMHSAS) should create a model and roll out supporting resources (tools/training) for establishment of a student threat reporting, assessment and response system in every district.

#### 4. Promoting Positive Behavioral Health for All Students

- TN DMHSAS in conjunction with TN DOE should expand training areas to include:
  - o Early and periodic screening and identification of student behavioral health needs;
  - Strategies for creating, expanding, and sustaining school-based behavioral health services;
  - o Strategies for promoting positive behavior and decision-making among all students; and
  - Strategies for increasing staff awareness and responsiveness to signs and symptoms of student behavioral and mental health needs.
- The Basic Education Program (BEP) Review Committee, utilizing multiple state and national sources, should conduct a review of current staffing of student support professionals (school social workers, counselors, school psychologists, etc.) and recommend model staffing to promote and enhance school climate and healthy learning environments.

#### 5. Technology

- The state should explore the utilization of an anonymous reporting system for students, faculty, staff, and others to report suspicious activity and concerns to law enforcement and school officials. Additionally, the state should explore inclusion of mental health services as part of the technology development.
- The state should encourage the utilization of technology whereby school districts can provide local law enforcement with EOPs, site maps, floor plans, and other relevant facility information with first responders via a secure online system.
- The TN DOS should identify model components of school safety response and threat alert technology.

# **Building Strong Brains: Strategies for Educators**

Building Strong Brains: Strategies for Educators is a free training provided by the department, designed to empower school leaders and teachers to address chronic childhood trauma (ACES) in the school and classroom. In this training, participants learn:

- Types of stress and how stress interferes with healthy development
- Brain architecture and how experiences and interaction shape the brain
- Types of trauma
- Knowledge building on self-regulation and resilience
- ACEs study and implications
- Trauma informed principles and practices for classrooms
- School employee wellness needs

During the 2017-18 school year, 5,000 Tennessee educators participated in the Building Strong Brains: Strategies for Educators Training. Overwhelmingly, educators said that learning to respond vs. react to students affected by adverse childhood experiences was the number one takeaway.

# Bullying, Harassment, and Hazing: Policy and Best Practice Updates

A civil and respectful learning environment is an essential foundation for teaching and learning. To achieve that end, state law (T.C.A. § 49-6-4501 et al) mandates specific actions on the part of schools relative to bullying, harassment, and intimidation. This seminar provided an overview of these and other related requirements with a particular focus on ensuring that policy is reflected in effective practice. # Appendix V: School Safety Index

**Description:** The SAVE Act states that "the commissioner shall report to the governor and the General Assembly concerning the prevalence of violent and disruptive incidents in the public schools." To fulfill this legislative mandate, the department has developed the School Safety Index. For each school, the reported sum of school safety incidents is divided by the school's average daily membership (ADM) to arrive at a percentage of enrollment or School Safety Index score. A higher index score indicates a relatively higher level of reported incidents. Schools that did not report any of the incidents identified below will not appear in the index:

- Possession of a handgun
- Possession of a rifle or shotgun
- Possession of an explosive or incendiary device
- Possession of a weapon other than a firearm
- Assault of a teacher or staff member
- Assault of a student
- Sexual assault report
- Aggravated assault of a teacher or staff member
- Aggravated assault of a student
- Attempted homicide

## The Danger Zone Statistics

The U.S. population grew by 16.4 million from 2010 to 2017. The number of cars on our streets grew by 27.4 million between 2012 and 2018. Distracted driving claimed 3,450 lives and injured 391,000 people in 2016. School buses are 70 times safer than traveling by car. The majority of catastrophic injuries and fatalities occur outside the bus. Sixty-five percent of illegal passing of school buses occur due to distracted drivers, while 35 percent occur because the driver did not know they had to stop. Tennessee bus drivers participate in an annual survey of illegal passing entitled *The Danger Zone*. Below are results for the 2018 survey.
