### **Update: Non-Profit and Local Government**

### **Local Governments (\$115 million)**

- Funds are in addition to \$75M held to cover Local FEMA claims
- Training townhalls held last week (Additional possible)
- Portal for submitting expenses will be open this week
- Funds will be distributed as early as August 17 (30% advance)
- Sept 30 deadline to document 30% of expenses.

### Non-Profit (\$150 million)

- 6 grant administrators selected
- Two-week initial application period for grantees
- Grant application will be available this week
- If oversubscribed for any region, grants may be competitively ranked, reduced, or reallocated to other administrators
- If funds remaining, additional application periods possible.

# Planning for Remaining CRF Funds

- Remaining funds projected between \$243 million to \$482 million
  - Range depends on September-December figures for Unemployment;
- Assuming no additional funds from Congress or ability to replace revenue at state or local level;
- Objective is to ensure readiness to direct funds in response to changing circumstances including:
  - Federal changes to existing funds or duplication of funding priorities;
  - Marked improvement or deterioration of economic indicators;
  - Significant shift in demand for public health resources.



# Scenario 1 – Flat Economic Recovery

- Beginning Balance: \$243 million
  - Assuming:
    - (i) No additional funds or flexibilities from Congress; and
    - (ii) Flat jobless claims through year-end

# Scenario 2 - Moderate Recovery

- Remaining Balance: \$362.79 million
  - Assumptions:
    - No additional funds or flexibilities from Congress,
    - Average 50% decrease in jobless claims through year-end
- Potential Expenses:
  - All Scenario 1 expenses: \$207.5 million
  - Additional Business Relief (Third Phase): \$100 million
- Remaining: \$55 million



# Potential Congressional Changes

- May directly change the Coronavirus Relief Fund w/r/t:
  - USES: Providing some <u>limited capacity</u> for revenue replacement;
    - Limitations may reduce amount of benefit to Tennessee (formula, mandates)
  - TIME: Extend grant end-date into end of 2021 fiscal year;
  - AMOUNT: Appropriate new funds for state and locals.
- Make other appropriations that could duplicate or impact CRF plans:
  - Extension of some enhanced Unemployment Insurance benefit;
  - Expansion of programs that overlap with majority of identified Tennessee priorities (e.g., business relief, education, workforce, medical provider relief);
  - Appropriate new funds that would address other priorities (childcare, agriculture, behavioral and mental health).



# Framework for Adapting to Congressional Changes

- Account for any new CRF funds that could be appropriated;
- Model impact on Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund;
- Re-order priorities to eliminate or reduce those duplicated by Congress;
- Consider designating funds for State and Local Revenue Replacement if formula and terms applicable to Tennessee;
- Lengthen time horizon of existing programs if applicable;
