Myth #1: Grants are only for nonprofit organizations

For-profit businesses can receive grants from various sources.

Grants are not limited to non-profits only.

Many government agencies offer grants to for-profit businesses.





Myth #2: Grants are only for large organizations

Grants are available for organizations of all sizes.

Some grants may be specifically designated for small organizations.

Grant eligibility is based on the project or program, not the size of the organization.





Myth #3: Grants are easy to get

Grants have strict eligibility criteria.

Grant applications require extensive research and planning.

Competition for grants is high, making the process more challenging.





Myth #4: Grants are a one-time funding source

Many grants offer the possibility of renewal.

Some grants specify multi-year funding.

A successful grant application can lead to future funding opportunities.





Myth #5: Grants are only for specific kinds of projects

Grants are available for a wide range of projects, including arts, education, and social services.

The key is to find the right grant for your project and organization.

Grants can also be used for general operating expenses or capacity building initiatives.
