

TN Placemakers Entrepreneurship Fund | Purpose

Be A Placemaker

What is the TN Placemakers Entrepreneurship Fund?

A pool of monetary resources dedicated to assisting communities across the state, from rural to urban, to develop and train small businesses and entrepreneurs by allowing them to obtain funds for broad and diverse activities.

The two groups of funding are (1) Assess & Plan, Build & Sustain, and Support & Train, and (2) Pivot & Recover – a new funding group tied to the impacts of the pandemic.

Why does it matter?

We took our entrepreneurship and small business development initiatives and consolidated them into a single fund to improve the overall customer experience and streamline access to funds for our communities.

Talent is everywhere, opportunity is not, and availability does not equate to equitable access. TN Placemakers strives to help communities provide opportunity through true access for the small businesses and entrepreneurs that are and will be a part of their community. We know those businesses include microenterprises, minority, women and veteran-owned businesses, entrepreneurs with disabilities and those in underserved and underrepresented areas.

Who can apply?

- Nonprofits
- Educational institutions
- Government entities

This includes ED organizations, chambers of commerce, development districts, public-private partnerships, etc. Nonprofit applicants must be established for at least three years. This grant is not intended to support an individual business; it is for the benefit and support of businesses.

IMPORTANT:

- Individual businesses are not eligible for TN Placemakers funding. If you are looking for resources for individual business, visit <u>BERO</u>.
- To verify that your nonprofit is in good standing in TN, do a business information search here **before** applying.

Type of Grant: Reimbursement

Application Period: Open

Note: Applications are accepted and reviewed on a rolling basis until funding the program dollars are fully awarded.

The TN SmartStart™ Community initiative is designed to train and equip Community Partners with the resources and tools to address the needs of new and existing small businesses and entrepreneurs within their own communities.

What is a TN SmartStart™ Community?

It is a community that uses a "no wrong door" approach to get people who are interested in starting or growing a business to the right resources, no matter which "door" they try. It also helps the community deliver up-to-date resources and tools to its aspiring and existing small businesses and entrepreneurs.

Why does it matter?

The goal of a SmartStart™ Community is to increase collaboration within a community. The participating individuals/entities, called Community Partners, increase value in their community, not to mention in their customer and stakeholder satisfaction.

Community Partners are key!

Who is a Community Partner?

Each SmartStart™ Community must have a minimum of three (3) unique Community Partners who are willing to provide resources (aka be "doors") for their aspiring and existing small business and entrepreneurs.

Community Partners could be any combination of the following entities...

- Elected official's office
- Chamber of Commerce
- ESOs (Entrepreneurial Support Organization)
- Electric/utility providers
- Business owners and leaders, small or large, for-profit or nonprofit
- Educational institutions
- Inventors, artists, makers
- Et. al.

There is a lot of flexibility because we know your community is unique.

Business Planning

Scenario

- Chelsea walks through your door. She has an exciting idea to open a new breakfast restaurant.
- She wants to capture the early morning crowd... healthy breakfast options and maybe lunches, too.
- She goes into some detail about the coffee, maybe roasting it down the road, baked goods she wants to sell, among other food offerings and who the restaurant will appeal to, etc.
- She explains that she has worked in restaurants but does not have any prior business experience. She knows she needs startup money to purchase equipment, etc., and has found a building that could work.

Challenge

She clearly has lots of ideas! She says she is looking for help on where to start and specifically mentions the areas of funding, business planning, and possibly franchising.


