I.

INTRODUCTION

This report is provided in response to Tennessee Code Annotated 68-1-123, which requires the Commissioner of Health, in consultation with the Department of Finance and Administration and any other state agency involved in the administration of the healthcare safety net program to provide a report to the General Assembly regarding data relating to access to care and healthcare safety net adequacy related issues. The aforementioned report should address the adequacy of access and the array of services to which access is available. In addition, the report should address the allocation of scarce healthcare safety net resources with attention to developing a rational health care system that does not duplicate service. The report should also assess access to care in rural and underserved areas across the state. *Please note that this report is due during a calendar year period; however, references to allocation of funding and service provision throughout the report are based on the State's fiscal year.*

II.

ACCESS TO CARE AND ARRAY OF SERVICES

A. Public Health Primary Care Safety Net Expansion

1. *Statewide expansion of the capacity of Local Health Departments to provide primary care services.*

On January 1, 2006, the Department of Health initiated a statewide expansion of primary care services to uninsured adult Tennesseans in the following ways: (1) increasing access for acute and episodic care and chronic disease management; and (2) offering the "best care possible" via preventive physical exams and essential health screenings. These strategies assist in individual preventive health maintenance, which in turn aids in significant reduction of unnecessary emergency department visits and unnecessary hospitalizations. Prior to the initial safety net statewide expansion of primary care services on January 1, 2006, local health departments in seventeen (17) counties across the State provided primary care in a total of twenty (20) sites. To date, there are fifty-five (55) local health department sites in forty-eight (48) counties across the state providing primary care services.

In fiscal year 2008, 135,922 uninsured adult medical encounters were provided for uninsured Tennesseans 19 to 64 years of age. The age and gender breakdown is listed in Table 1 below. The aforementioned encounter numbers do not include the fifteen (15) local health departments operated by the Department of Health that are also FQHCs. Those visit numbers are included under A.2. on page three (3).

In conjunction with expanded primary care services, health departments offer prescription medications, including generic drugs, priority drug groups, patient drug assistance programs and referral for specialty care when necessary. For example, some local health departments have partnered with local hospitals. One outcome of this partnership is that some local hospitals have agreed to offer discounted diagnostic services or a limited amount of diagnostics at no charge for uninsured adult health department patients. Also, some local hospitals have allowed the health department online access to emergency room records. Finally, in addition to expanded primary care services at many local health departments, all health departments continue to provide traditional public health services such as Family Planning, Communicable Disease Management, Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening, and Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) services.

2. Statewide Expansion of the Capacity of Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) or FQHC Look-A-Likes.

In fiscal year 2006, twenty-three (23) FQHCs which comprised a total of eighty-four (84) sites received \$6 million in funding to expand existing capacity of primary care services in forty-one (41) of Tennessee's 95 counties. As a result of the FY06 expansion, the FQHCs were able to provide 173,362 uninsured adult medical encounters. In fiscal year 2007, another \$6 million was allocated to the FQHCs, and the FQHCs provided a total of 217,673 uninsured adult medical encounters. In fiscal year 2008, the FQHCs were allocated \$4.6 million of recurring funding and \$3 million of non-recurring funding for a total of \$7.6 million in fiscal year 2008, resulting in the provision of 241,737 uninsured adult medical encounters. For the first quarter of fiscal year 2009 (July 1, 2008 through September 30, 2008), the FQHCs have provided 58,478 uninsured adult medical

encounters. To date, there are twenty-four (24) FQHCs with 140 sites located in sixty (60) of Tennessee's ninety-five (95) counties.

These private, nonprofit, consumer-directed health care facilities provide high quality, cost-effective and comprehensive primary and preventive care to medically underserved and uninsured Tennesseans. According to the Tennessee Primary Care Association (TPCA), on average approximately 40% of FQHC patients are uninsured; however that number may be as high as 75% for some centers. Several FQHCs participated in Health Disparities Collaboratives, a national effort to improve health outcomes for all medically underserved people with chronic diseases, such as diabetes, cardiovascular disease, depression and asthma. As a result of their participation in Collaboratives, these centers are consistently providing the recommended standards of care for the aforementioned health conditions, which should result in improved health outcomes for participants. In addition, FQHCs are eligible and many participate in the federal 340B Drug Pricing Program, which provides significant savings on pharmaceuticals for their patients.

After the initial implementation of the healthcare safety net, several counties were identified as having no primary care safety net provider. A grant opportunity was created for any provider or organization willing to establish a new FQHC access point for delivery of primary care services in one of these areas. The General Assembly appropriated \$2.5 million of non-recurring funding for this effort. Grants in the amount of \$500,000.00 each were awarded to three (3) FQHCs to expand primary care safety net services for uninsured adults in McMinn, Wayne and Hickman Counties. The McMinn and Hickman FQHCs reported being fully operational as of September 2008. The Wayne County clinic is expected to be fully operational by March 2009.

3. Statewide Expansion of the Capacity of Selected Faith-Based, Community-Based Rural Health, and Federally Funded Centers

In September of 2005, the Department of Health received an appropriation of approximately \$6.3 million by the General Assembly. The Department of Health accepted, reviewed, and awarded grant applications for expansion of primary care services among faith-based, community-based, rural health, and other federally funded centers. The grant process resulted in an additional 67 healthcare safety net providers and created expanded capacity in 44 counties. From July 15, 2005 (date of actual TennCare disenrollment) through June 30, 2006, this further expansion of the healthcare safety net resulted in basic primary care for an additional 57,671 uninsured adult Tennesseans (visit data was not required to be reported), which included a medical home for health conditions including hypertension, diabetes, hyperlipidemia, allergies, and asthma. In addition, laboratory services, pharmacy services and referral to specialty care are provided.

In an effort to provide continued support for the healthcare safety net, the second phase of the Healthcare Safety Net Grant application process was initiated during fiscal year 2007. The Department of Health accepted, reviewed, and implemented forty-two

(42) grant awards. The healthcare safety net grantees provided 164,608 uninsured adult medical encounters during the July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 period. In fiscal year 2008, forty-four (44) grant awards were issued and the health care safety net grantees provided 185,500 total uninsured adult medical encounters from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008. In fiscal year 2009, grant awards were issued to forty-one (41) safety net providers.

Throughout each of these grant application processes the Department of Health gave preference to applicants that proposed to provide primary care services to meet the needs of a Medically Underserved Area (MUA), Medically Underserved Population (MUP), or a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) where current Safety Net services were limited. HPSA's are federally-designated counties, parts of counties (such as census tracts), or public facilities that have been recognized as meeting or exceeding the standards of need for certain services. Generally, primary care HPSA's meet or exceed the following thresholds:

- For a geographic designation, the population to physician ratio is at least 3,500:1
- For a population designation, a segment of the population experiences specific barriers to care and the population to physician ratio is at least 3,000:1
- For a facility designation, a public or private nonprofit medical facility is providing primary medical care services to an area or population group designated as having a shortage of primary care professional(s), and the facility has insufficient capacity to meet the primary care needs of that area or population group. A community health center or homeless clinic is an example of such a designation.

A listing of MUA's, MUP's, and HPSA's for primary care, dental and mental health services is included as Attachment I.

In addition to providing funding support for primary care services, the Department of Health has also continued to award grants for innovative approaches to expanding access to primary care, specialty care, and/or diagnostics for uninsured adults including, but not limited to, serving as a referral source for linking uninsured adults to these services. Four unique projects continue to receive funding in fiscal year 2009: Bridges to Care, Project Access Hamilton County, Project Access Knox County, and Appalachian Mountain Project Access.

The Bridges to Care network comprises 10 hospitals, 7 federally subsidized primary care clinics, 10 faith-based and public/private hospital-sponsored primary care clinics, 4 dental clinics, 4 mental health centers, 3 alcohol and drug treatment centers and 654 volunteer specialty physicians. From July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008, Bridges to Care coordinated services for 3,258 primary care medical encounters. For fiscal year 2009, Bridges to Care estimates linking an additional 2,354 uninsured adult medical encounters. Project Access Hamilton County and Project Access Knoxville also provide

links for the uninsured to primary care medical homes, specialty care services, and diagnostics. The Hamilton County Project Access network comprises 560 physician volunteers. The Knoxville Project Access group comprises 500 volunteer providers, 412 of whom are specialty providers. From July 1, 2007 to June 30, 2008, Project Access Hamilton County coordinated services for 13,391 primary care medical encounters and Project Access Knoxville coordinated services for 8,965 primary care medical encounters. During the period July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009 it is projected that Hamilton County will coordinate 8,544 medical visits for uninsured adults while Project Access Knoxville estimates another 8,248 medical visits for uninsured adults. Appalachian Mountain Project Access has a network of approximately 100 primary care physicians and 200 specialty care providers, and is expected to deliver approximately 5,896 medical visits for uninsured adults during fiscal year 2009.

5. *Access to Statewide Dental Services*

Safety net legislation and funding were intended to enable provision of primary care to TennCare disenrollees and was not intended to exceed the level of previous benefits (e.g., TennCare does not cover adult dental services). There is no public mandate for the Department of Health to provide dental services; however, we strive to address oral health needs of vulnerable citizens and currently award grants for provision of emergency dental services to uninsured adults ages 19-64.

Tennessee Department of Health (TDH) Dental Resources:

Rural

- In 53 rural counties, there are 54 dental clinics located within the local public health departments. All 54 of these clinics provide emergency dental care for adults

Metropolitan

- Sullivan, Hamilton, and Knox, provide emergency dental care to adults at their health departments
- Davidson County indirectly provides adult emergency dental services through referral to United Neighborhood Health Services (FQHC)
- Shelby County limits dental services to patients 21 and younger
- Madison County does not currently provide dental services

- Clinics are typically staffed from 1-5 days per week

Different levels of supplemental funding from county governments, community partnerships, and other public and private agencies and organizations contribute to variation in availability of adult dental services across the state.

In fiscal year 2008, the Tennessee Department of Health initiated a dental safety net program for emergency dental services for uninsured adults. Grants were awarded to seven (7) dental providers; emergency dental services (extractions) were provided to approximately 3,285 uninsured adults. We expect approximately 4,120 uninsured adults will receive emergency adult dental services in fiscal year 2009.

In fiscal year 2008, the Tennessee Department of Health provided funding in the amount of \$475,000 to ten (10) FQHCs and four (4) metropolitan health departments for the provision of emergency dental services to uninsured adults. Approximately 7,920 uninsured adults were served during the period July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008.

B. Mental Health Safety Net Expansion

Statewide Support for Existing Community Mental Health Agencies via funding for selective, healthcare safety net, behavioral health services offered by current community-based behavioral health providers

In response to Public Chapter No. 474 and Section 59 of the Appropriations Act of fiscal year 2005, the Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities (TDMHDD) developed the statewide Mental Health Safety Net (MHSN) to provide essential mental health services to people who were disenrolled from the Standard TennCare Program due to TennCare Reform and were identified as Severely and Persistently Mentally Ill (SPMI). The Department was appropriated \$11.5 million to cover core, vital mental health services that people with serious mental illness must retain to continue leading functional, productive lives. In addition to these services, \$33.4 million was allocated for pharmacy services that include discounts on generic and brand name drugs plus one atypical antipsychotic drug per month with a five-dollar (\$5) co-pay. Furthermore, \$2.6 million was added so that lithium and Depakote could be available with a five-dollar (\$5) co-pay. As of December 4, 2008, 16,284 individuals have registered for the MHSN. The Mental Health Safety Net originally comprised 20 Community Mental Health Agencies; however, as of November 1, 2006 the network consists of 19 providers. The above referenced expansion included the following activities:

- Expanded eligibility and services delivered through the Community Mental Health Agencies including lab work related to medication management, pharmacy coordination and assistance, assessment, evaluation, diagnostic, therapeutic sessions and most importantly, case management.
- Increased funding to pharmacy services including discounts on generic and brand name drugs, one atypical antipsychotic drug per month with co-pay and increased access via lithium and Depakote being available with co-pay. Also,

beginning in January 2007, the state pharmacy assistance program Cover Rx offers tiered co-pay assistance for over 250 generics and 7 brand name medications.

- Monthly technical assistance teleconferences are provided to Community Mental Health Agencies. In addition, since October 2006, one on one training for Community Mental Health Agencies related to Cover Rx have been provided as well.
- The State-Only/Judicial population began receiving services from the Mental Health Safety Net on November 27, 2008 due to changes in the TennCare program.

C. Special Populations

1. Ryan White Part B Funds

The General Assembly appropriated \$1.2 million of recurring state funding and \$3 million of one-time state funding in fiscal year 2006 to assist the Department with providing HIV treatment for former TennCare clients. In fiscal year 2007, the General Assembly appropriated an additional \$3 million of healthcare safety net funding for the Ryan White Program to continue providing care. This funding continued in fiscal year 2008. These additional funds have allowed the Department to provide health services to more than 1,100 HIV-positive clients who were disenrolled from TennCare, and a growing population of uninsured low income clients (2,050 total HIV Drug Assistance Program clients). Those funds, along with approximately \$3 million in drug company rebates, has allowed the Department to continue serving all individuals in the growing state program with critical HIV medications and outpatient medical services absent any increases from federal funding sources.

D. Insurance Options for Uninsured

1. CoverTN

Since launching in April 2007, CoverTN has provided an affordable health insurance option to small businesses and their employees, the self-employed and working individuals who lack coverage. Administered by BlueCross BlueShield of Tennessee and offering two plan options for members, CoverTN expanded eligibility in 2008 to include those who experienced a job loss or reduction in work hours in the last six months. In September 2008, Governor Bredesen announced that for 2009, the number of primary care visits for both plans would increase from five or six to 12 and an additional five or six specialist visits would be added to the benefit plan. In addition, diabetic supplies and insulin will no longer be subject to quarterly pharmacy maximums, while co-pays for these items will decrease from \$25 to \$10.

In a continued effort to keep member costs low and the program affordable, there is no premium increase from the 2008 rates for 2009, meaning members will continue to pay a one-third share of \$34 to \$99 per month. This, along with the benefit expansion, is

a direct result of efficient budget management and measured growth of the program. All changes were made within the existing program budget and do not require additional improvements or expenditures.

CoverTN had 18,094 members as of 12/31/08.

2. *CoverKids*

For nearly two years, qualifying uninsured children in Tennessee have been able to receive comprehensive health insurance through CoverKids, which serves children in families who do not qualify for TennCare but cannot afford private health coverage. Administered by BlueCross BlueShield of Tennessee, the program covers children whose families earn within 250 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL), which was \$53,000 per year for a family of four in 2008. Families earning more than 250 percent FPL continue to have the option of buying into the plan for a per-child-per-month premium.

Changes were made in January and July to the program's benefit plan with the addition of vision and dental benefits, respectively. Vision benefits are provided through the existing contract with BlueCross BlueShield of Tennessee, while the dental plan is administered by Doral Dental. Preventive exams, regular teeth cleanings and x-rays are covered at 100 percent, with co-pays required for glasses or contact lenses and additional dental procedures. An online application was also launched in 2008 at a new web site, www.CoverKids.com, to further simplify the program's enrollment process.

CoverKids had 32,069 children enrolled as of 12/31/08.

3. *AccessTN*

Steady enrollment continues in the AccessTN program which provides comprehensive coverage for Tennesseans who are chronically ill and uninsurable because of their health status. Also modeled after the state employee health plan, AccessTN has a 50% medical benefit for pre-existing conditions for six months before full benefits are paid. Total premiums for the program range from \$273 to \$1,156 depending on the one of three plan options selected, and on the member's age, weight and tobacco use. There are no income limits and no asset tests. Premium assistance continues to be provided to more 90 percent of enrollees. As a result of the success of the premium assistance program, a waiting list has been put in place for new applicants and members who cannot afford the full monthly premium. This is a first come, first served list and requires the completion of the Application for Premium Assistance.

AccessTN had 4,546 members as of 12/31/08.

E. Pharmacy Assistance

1. CoverRx

Completing two full years of operation in 2008, Cover Rx serves as the state's pharmacy assistance program for those Tennesseans who don't have access to pharmacy benefits. With a formulary of more than 250 generic medications, diabetic supplies and insulin, CoverRx provides affordable medications to those who may otherwise might go without filling prescriptions.

Qualifying CoverRx members pay no monthly premiums, only low, income-based co-pays for 30- and 90-day supplies of medications. Co-pays are based on household income and each member has a five prescription per month limit.

CoverRx has always included members of the Mental Health Safety Net population, who receive specific brand name mental health medications in addition to the rest of the formulary. An agreement was reached in 2008 with the Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities for an additional 13,935 members of the "State Only" group to transition into CoverRx on Jan. 1, 2009.

CoverRx had 23,352 members as of 12/31/08.

III.

SUMMARY

As directed, the Tennessee Department of Health has examined the state of the healthcare safety net in Tennessee and evaluated the same with respect to the array of services, adequacy of services and access to care. The assessment shows a comprehensive approach for healthcare safety net services both long and short term. It also demonstrates a strong collaborative effort among state, public/private, not-for-profit and for-profit sectors.

Mental health services are available and accessible in all 95 counties. More than half of those eligible for mental health safety net services have enrolled in the program and are receiving benefits.

CoverTN continues to offer health insurance and pharmacy options for the uninsured. The provision of these health insurance options for the uninsured enables access to care outside of the health safety net thereby increasing access to care and other related necessary services.

Case management as a component of the health safety net both formally and informally has significantly helped in assisting the uninsured obtain necessary services.

For example, programs such as Project Access Hamilton County, Project Access Knoxville, Appalachian Mountain Project Access and Bridges to Care have provided several thousands of the uninsured assistance with obtaining services such as specialty care, diagnostic services, hospitalizations, and in some instances even surgical procedures at little to no cost to the individual. These models are a means to expand the patient service area in contiguous and outlying counties.

Attachment 1 is the most current breakdown available by county of the Federal Health Professional Shortage Areas for primary care, dental health, and mental health. In addition to that information, Attachment 2 outlines by county and census tracts the Medically Underserved Areas (MUAs) of Tennessee. Attachment 3 is a table that shows Unduplicated Dental Patients and Visits by Region and County. Attachments 4, 5, and 6 are buffer maps showing accessibility of primary care services within a 30 mile radius at local health departments, federally qualified health centers, and safety net primary care sites. Attachment 7 is a table of healthcare safety net services broken down by region and county in the areas of FQHC sites, primary care health departments, faith-based or community grantees, mental health service providers, adult dental services through the health departments, adult dental emergency safety net sites, and adult dental services available at FQHCs.

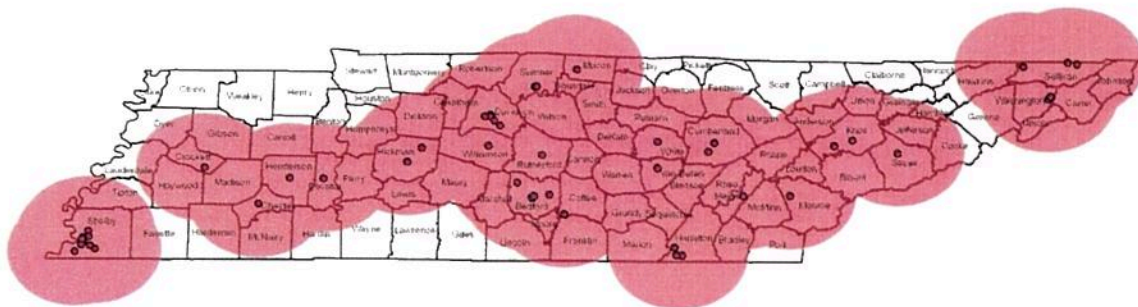
