Increasing Partnerships with Workforce Development and Business Communities

TDHS is currently working to develop a Child Care Employer Toolkit, which will serve as a guide for partnering with employers and providing employer-sponsored child care for employees. Employers can support child care in a variety of ways:

- Operating an employer owned child care facility
- Providing financial support to an existing child care agency by paying operational costs
- Partnering with a child care agency to provide financial supports so the agency operates specifically for the children of the employer
- Creating child care incentives as part of the employees benefit package



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Services

A web of TDHS resources and supports can be tailored to fit the diverse needs of employers interested in establishing child care services for employees:

- Pre-Licensure Unit support
- Funding to assist with start-up costs
- Smart Steps tuition reimbursement
- Quality program supports
- Employee recruitment and support

New Pre-Licensure Support Unit

TDHS' new Pre-Licensure Unit will help streamline processes and increase support for child care providers

Support new agencies throughout the child care licensing process

- Training that equips agencies to serve families *and* run successful businesses
- Guidance that ensures compliance with licensure rules and regulations

Grow child care capacity across the state

- Build partnerships with community and business leaders to assess child care needs and explore solutions and necessary supports
- Establish local contacts, facilitate effective and impactful connections
- Recruit prospective providers to increase the number of child care slots available



Growing Capacity: DECD Grant Funding

A new partnership between TDHS, the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD), and local development districts to expand the state's network of child care facilities.

- Provides assistance to center-based and home-based child care facilities
- Launches a pilot program to develop employer-based child care opportunities
- Supports capital expenses
 - New construction
 - Renovation
 - Expansion of existing child care spaces
- Partners are encouraged to braid DECD funding with TDHS Establishment Grants when possible



Growing Capacity: Establishment Grants

Agencies seeking licensure can... Existing licensed agencies can...

- Apply for up to \$1,000 per slot of licensed capacity to be created
- Use funding to purchase items like furniture, supplies, materials, and curriculum

Administered in partnership with Childcare Tennessee, an initiative of Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee

Support provided through federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Child Care Stabilization Funds (*which provide resources to carry out activities that increase the supply of child care*)

Pre-licensure Unit launched August 1, 2021

October 2019 Initiatives

- <u>10% Overall Rate Increase</u> for all categories of care
- <u>15% Rate Differential</u> for serving children with disabilities or special needs
- <u>Inclusion of Technical Assistance and Coaching</u> to increase ability to serve children with special needs or disabilities
- <u>WAGE\$®</u> Increase to eligibility and supplement amounts
- <u>Tech Goes Home</u> provides equipment, technical assistance, and coaching to increase child care technical abilities
- <u>Establishment/Expansion Grants</u> funding to support costs associated with increasing licensed capacity at new or existing agencies
