

First-Time Pass Rates on Content Assessments by Educator Preparation Provider (EPP)

Purpose of this Report

In its 2021-22 Master Plan, the State Board of Education set forth a plan to publish data on the rate at which prospective educators pass required content area licensure assessments on their first attempt. Historically, the State Board has published annual data on the pass rate within two attempts; however, retaking licensure assessments is costly in terms of both time and money, and some candidates who do not pass on their first attempt may decide not to try again. There have also been recent calls from national organizations for more transparency around candidates' pass rates on their first attempt.¹

This report represents the first time Tennessee has published first-time pass rate data on content area licensure assessments and provides new insights into the work of Tennessee's Educator Preparation Providers (EPPs). The State Board intends to update this report annually to track progress and trends over time.

About This Report

Who is included in this report?

This report includes data on three cohorts of teacher candidates:

Candidates who earned an occupational teacher license or school services personnel license are not included in this report. Candidates who attended a preparation program to earn an additional endorsement are also not included.

Which assessments are included in this report?

This report includes content assessments required for teacher licensure in Tennessee. It does not include pedagogical assessments (edTPA or Praxis Principles of Learning and Teaching) or EPP admissions assessments (ACT, SAT, or Praxis Core).

Only a candidate's first attempt at an assessment is included in this report. Thus, the pass rates reported here are different from those reported in the <u>Tennessee Educator Preparation Report Card</u>, which reports the percentage of candidates who passed within two attempts. Assessments not related to a candidate's endorsement area(s) are not included.

What is the source of the assessment data?

The Tennessee Department of Education receives Praxis scores through a data-sharing agreement with ETS. It receives National Evaluation Series (NES) scores through a data-sharing agreement with Pearson. The Department shares these scores with the State Board for use in the Educator Preparation Report Card and supplemental reports. Assessment records are matched to candidates who enrolled in or completed a Tennessee teacher preparation program during the cohort windows described above. We do not use test-takers' self-reported institution to match test records to EPPs.

Why are job-embedded candidates listed separately from other candidates?

Job-embedded teacher preparation programs are designed to impart teaching skills rather than content knowledge. Because job-embedded candidates serve as teacher of record while they are enrolled in their preparation program, these candidates must demonstrate appropriate content knowledge prior to program enrollment. Candidates may do this by either having a degree with a major in the content area they will be teaching or by passing the relevant content assessment. Due to this requirement, many job-embedded candidates take content assessments prior to enrolling in an EPP. Their pass rate on these assessments therefore reflects preparation they received from prior education or work experience rather than from their EPP. The recruitment process for job-embedded candidates is also different than for other candidates. In some cases, job-embedded candidates are recruited by a school district or public charter school in order to fill a teaching vacancy. These candidates then enroll in an EPP to obtain a teaching license after they have been hired by a school district or public charter school.

What is a typical pass rate on teacher licensure assessments?

The data presented in this report include assessments in more than 40 content areas. Typical pass rates vary depending on the content area. In Tennessee, average first-time pass rates for specific content area exams range from around 50 percent to nearly 100 percent. Thus, average pass rates at the EPP level are affected by which content areas are most popular at each EPP. The U.S. Department of Education cautions against comparing pass rates across states since each state sets its own teacher licensure requirements and passing scores for licensure exams.²

Key Terms

Term	Definition	
Clinical Practice	Clinical practice refers to intensive field-based responsibilities, assignments, tasks, activities, and assessments. These experiences help students to develop and demonstrate their preparedness to be effective educators in the classroom. There are three types of clinical practice: student teaching, internship, and job embedded.	
	 Student Teaching – In this type of clinical practice, a candidate gains classroom experience while earning course credit toward a degree or certification. Student teaching involves a planned semester of at least 15 weeks that includes full-day teaching and observation activities. 	
	 Internship – Internships involve a full year of clinical practice during which the intern engages in direct teaching activities for at least 100 school days. Activities related to this experience may include classroom teaching, observation, coursework, seminars, and planning. 	
	 Job Embedded – Job-embedded candidates receive a license and are able to serve as a teacher of record while they are enrolled in and still completing their preparation program. 	
Content Assessment	Content assessments measure prospective teachers' knowledge of the subject(s) they will be teaching (e.g., math, biology, history). Content assessments are different from pedagogical assessments, which measure teaching skills such as planning lessons and assessing student learning. The content assessments required for teacher licensure in Tennessee are listed in Section III of State Board Policy 5.105 Professional Assessments for Tennessee Educators .	
Educator Preparation Provider (EPP)	Educator preparation providers (EPPs) are the universities, colleges, and education-related organizations that prepare Tennessee educators.	
Endorsement Area	Endorsement areas indicate the subject(s) and/or grade level(s) for which a licensed educator is prepared to provide instruction, leadership, or services in schools or districts. When applying for licensure, each teacher candidate must meet requirements in at least one area of endorsement, though many are endorsed in multiple areas.
