

History of the Tennessee/Kentucky Wildland Fire Academy

The Tennessee/Kentucky Wildland Fire Academy will be conducting training and education in Bell Buckle January 4 through January 14. This will be the 20th Annual Academy to be held at the Tennessee Fire Service and Codes Enforcement Academy campus located on Unionville-Deason road. The Academy serves wildland firefighters from across the nation by providing education and training. The annual academy is a joint effort of several agencies. The Tennessee Division of Forestry, The U.S. Forest Service, Kentucky Division of Forestry, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and National Park Service work together for the success and growth of the educational endeavor.

The idea for the Tennessee/Kentucky Wildland Fire Academy was conceived by the Daniel Boone and Cherokee National Forests in 2001. The first year was planned for June 2002 but was cancelled due to an extreme Western fire season. In 2003 the academy was moved to Bell Buckle for its inaugural and has never been moved. The wildland academy was the first occupant of Fire Service and Codes Enforcement Academy campus. 2016 was the first year the academy conducted a two-week schedule. This could not have been possible without the commitment and foresight of the participating agencies. Further, the academy's success and longevity would not be possible without support from regional and state offices.

The academy is a true interagency cooperative. There are seven partners that have put forth the effort to build the Southeast's most elite academy. This partnership has been built voluntarily from the strong desire to see employees trained to fulfill agency needs. Specifically, the partnership includes: Cherokee National Forest, Daniel Boone National Forest, Land Between the Lakes, R4 US Fish and Wildlife Service, South East Region National Park Service, Tennessee Division of Forestry, and Kentucky Division of Forestry.

The cooperation between all the agencies is considered a great accomplishment. The shared contributions of the agencies involved have led to the academy continuing for 20 years. The academy has been a success from the outset.

The greatest accomplishment has been the cooperation between all these agencies and the desire to keep this event going for 20 years. The academy received the 2014 Regional Forester's Award for "Leading in the Business Environment".

The academy has provided a platform for students across the nation to interact and exchange information. Beyond all this, the biggest accomplishment is delivering high quality training to thousands of students.



Major Hazards and Risks:

Illness: Covid-19, Flu and RSV cases are on the rise. Take appropriate actions to limit your chances of getting sick. Frequently wash your hands, use hand sanitizer, wipe down your devices, steering wheels, and door handles. A mask is not required but wear one if you wish to minimize your chance of sickness even more. If you think you have any symptoms of the above illnesses or anything else, let your instructors know, or contact Safety Officers found in IAP. The IMT Safety Officers will have Covid-19 supplies available. Masks, hand sanitizer, cleaning wipes, and disinfectant spray.

Driving: Driving safety is always a priority while attending the academy. This is especially important for those driving from hotels to the academy. The traffic in Murfreesboro is always busy, especially during morning and evening commutes. Also be cautious while driving thru the academy grounds. Obey posted speed limits, stop at all stop signs completely, use headlights in low light situations, and stay off all devices while driving! Be alert for pedestrians walking on campus. Especially during morning, lunch, and evening hours. Please try to keep trailer hitches from being over sidewalks while parking.

Situational Awareness: Make sure to be aware where your emergency exits are while in classrooms. Pay attention to where you are going while walking on academy grounds. Look out for potholes, cracks, uneven ground, vehicles, or any other potential hazards while walking around academy. Make sure to find out where first aid kits and defibrillators are located.
