

# Housing

Housing and Urban Development-VA Supported Housing (HUD-VASH)

**HUD-VASH**: Collaborative program between HUD and VA; HUD provides Housing Choice Vouchers and VA provides case management and supportive services.

- Permanent Supported Housing Program
- Goal: Help Homeless Veterans and their families gain stable housing while promoting full recovery and independence in their community

# Housing

#### Grant and Per Diem (GPD)

**GPD**: Community-based agencies awarded national VA grants to provide transitional housing and supportive services.

- VA's largest transitional housing program with over 12,000 beds nationwide
- Grant types: Capital, Per Diem Only, Transition in Place, Special Needs, Service Centers, and Case Management
- PDO Models include Service Intensive, Clinical Treatment, Low Demand, Bridge, and Hospital to Housing
- Goal: Help Homeless Veterans achieve residential stability, increase their skill levels and/or income, and obtain greater self-determination

# Housing

Health Care for Homeless Veterans Contract Residential Services (HCHV CRS)

**HCHV CRS:** Community-based agencies awarded local contracts to provide transitional housing and support services that meet the specialized needs of Homeless Veterans in that region.

- Transitional housing with low barrier admission and short lengths of stay (usually 90 days or less)
- Goal: Provide temporary housing and case management services to Homeless Veterans as they prepare for and transition to permanent housing

# Housing

Domiciliary Care for Homeless Veterans (DCHV)

**DCHV**: Provides time-limited residential treatment at VAMCs for homeless Veterans with mental health and substance use disorder, co-occurring medical concerns, and psychosocial needs including homelessness and unemployment.

• Not all VAMCs offer DCHV programs; in FY2020 there were 44 DCHV sites nationwide

Mountain Home VAMC oversees a 20-bed DCHV in addition to other Residential Rehabilitation Treatment Program (RRTP) domiciliary beds including PTSD Dom, Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Dom, and General Dom.

The DCHV at Mountain Home VAMC is the only DCHV program in VISN 9. The DCHV is located at the VA Medical Center in Johnson City, TN.





# Housing

Support Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)

**SSVF**: Community-based agencies awarded national VA grants to provide rapid rehousing and homeless prevention services to very low-income Veteran families.

• SSVF provides Shallow Subsidies to those Veteran families that qualify

\*\*Centerstone is sunsetting their SSVF grant at the end of FY22. It is unclear at this time which agency(s) will provide coverage for the counties Centerstone currently services

VISN 9 Homeless Programs in Tennessee

Currently all but 3 counties in TN have SSVF Coverage. Those without SSVF: Lincoln, Moore, and Wayne counties.





# Veterans Justice Programs

Veterans Justice Outreach (VJO) Program

**VJO:** The purpose of VJO is to prevent homelessness and avoid unnecessary criminalization of mental illness and extended incarceration among Veterans.

- Ensuring eligible justice-involved Veterans have timely access to VHA services as clinically indicated and other VA benefits as appropriate
- Partner in Veterans Treatment Courts (VTCs)
- Conduct jail outreach

# Veterans Justice Programs

Health Care for Reentry Veterans (HCRV)

**HCRV**: Designed to address the needs of incarcerated Veterans when it comes to reentering their community.

 Goals: Prevent homelessness; reduce the impact of medical, psychiatric, and substance use problems on community readjustment; and decrease likelihood of re-incarceration for those leaving prison

#### **Veterans Justice Programs serving TN**

<u>VJO\*:</u>

- 148 identified jails within the catchment area
- 20 active Veteran Treatment Courts VJO staff participate in
- Memphis VAMC also helps facilitate a Veterans Legal Clinic in Shelby County, TN and Jonesboro, AR
- TVHS Veterans have access to a Veterans Legal Clinic run at Operation Stand Down in Nashville, TN (located at the Service Center)

#### HCRV\*:

24 identified prisons within the catchment area (Southern portion of V9)

\*Some of the resources may fall outside TN but still in the catchment area for Memphis or TVHS (AR, MS, GA, VA)





Health Care for Homeless Veterans (HCHV) Outreach:


**HCHV Outreach**: Provides outreach and case management services for homeless Veterans; particularly focused around those who are literally homeless and in emergency shelter settings.

 Goal: Reduce homelessness among Veterans by connecting the homeless Veterans with health care and other needed services

Homeless – Patient Aligned Care Team (H-PACT)

**H-PACT**: Coordinated health care for homeless Veterans designed around the unique needs and distinct challenges homeless Veterans face both accessing and engaging in health care.

Goals: More effectively engage Veterans in primary care; increased engagement in health care and preventative services; reduction in inpatient and emergency services

**Coordinated Entry**: Intended to prioritize those with the greatest need, match people with services that are most likely to help them exit homelessness, reduce the time it takes to access services, and ensure that limited resources are allocated efficiently.

- VA Homeless Programs are required actively engage with each local Continuum of Care (CoC) within their catchment area.
- CoCs promote community wide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness and provide guidance and recommendations as to what is needed to serve the homeless population in a given community.





National Call Center for Homeless Veterans (NCCHV)

**NCCHV**: Veterans that are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless have free, 24/7 access to VA staff.

- TVHS is considering starting up an H-PACT Team

#### Coordinated Entry: CoCs (Continuums of Care)

- 10 CoCs across TN
  - 2 in Memphis catchment
  - 5 in TVHS catchment
  - 3 in MTH catchment

#### <u>NCCHV</u>

- 1802 NCCHV calls answered by MEM, TVHS, and MTH in first 7 months FY22
- 2546 NCCHV calls answered by MEM, TVHS, and MTH in FY21







## Homeless Program Office 5-Year Strategic Plan

**HPO Strategic Plan** 

**HPO Strategic Objectives:** 

- **1.** Expand and increase housing stock
- 2. Prevent and resolve returns to homelessness
- 3. Enhance targeted services to address the needs of high-acuity and vulnerable populations (e.g., Veterans who are older, have a history of opioid misuse, or are at risk for suicide)
- 4. Support the development of a highly skilled workforce
- 5. Use research and state-of-the-art analytical data, evaluation tools, and processes to make informed and timely decisions
- 6. Provide equitable services and outcomes through all homeless programs and services



## Goal of 38,000 Permanent Housing Placements in 2022

On February 25, 2022, Secretary of Veterans Affairs Denis McDonough outlined new goals towards ending homelessness, which included a national goal of placing at least 38,000 Veterans experiencing homelessness into permanent housing during calendar year 2022.



**USICH** Criteria:

- 1. The community has identified all Veterans experiencing homelessness.
- 2. The community provides shelter immediately to any Veteran experiencing unsheltered homelessness who wants it.
- 3. The community provides serviceintensive transitional housing only in limited instances.
- 4. The community has capacity to assist Veterans to swiftly move into permanent housing.
- 5. The community has resources, plans, partnerships, and system capacity in place should any Veteran become homeless or be at risk of homelessness in the future.



United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) -Criteria and Benchmarks for Achieving the Goal of Ending Veteran Homelessness

VA is committed to ending Veteran homelessness, community by community. 3 states and 82 communities have successfully met the USICH threshold and announced they've ended Veteran homelessness:

#### Ending Veteran Homelessness - VA Homeless Programs

Among those 82 communities are:

- Chattanooga, TN
- Jackson/West Tennessee CoC (TN-507)





#### **Rideshare Pilot**

- National initiative that authorizes and funds local VAMCs to provide Veterans engaged in VHA Homeless Programs and in need of transportation, no cost Rideshare transport.
  - Transportation can be used for: medical appointments, housing and employment searches, grocery store visits and an array of other necessary activities
  - Process:
    - VHA Homeless Case Manager must complete the Rideshare form on behalf of the Veteran
    - Rideshare driver contacts the Veteran directly via smartphone for pickup
      - If Veteran has no access to a smartphone, there are workarounds for this too

Over 1500 rideshare trips have been given to Homeless Program Veterans in TN since this initiative began.





#### **Smartphone Initiative**

The Homeless Program Office utilized CARES Act funds to procure disposable smartphones for homeless Veterans in response to the COVID-19 National Health Emergency. The phones are prioritized for Veterans engaged in VA Homeless Programs including SSVF, GPD, HCHV CRS, HUD-VASH, and VJP or engaged in other homeless services, and are utilized as a resource for Veterans to stay connected to caregivers and support during the pandemic.

Approximately 500 smartphones have been given to homeless Veterans in TN since this initiative began.
