

What is a Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI)?

- **TBI:** is an acquired injury to the brain caused by an external physical force resulting in a total or partial disability or impairment.
 - Bump, blow, or jolt to the head, or
 - Penetrating injury (such as a gunshot) to the head
- Three main types of TBI:
 - Mild TBI or concussion
 - Moderate TBI
 - Severe TBI





Populations Most At Risk for TBI

- Racial and ethnic minorities
- Service members and Veterans
- People who experience homelessness
- People who are in correctional and detention facilities
- Survivors of intimate partner violence
- People living in rural areas



TBI in the United States

- United States
 - TBI is a major cause of death and disability.
 - Approximately **2.8 million** people sustain a TBI each year.
 - In 2019, approximately 223,135 TBI-related hospitalizations and 64,362 TBI-related deaths in 2020.*
 - About **176** TBI-related deaths every day.*
 - People aged **75 years and older** had the highest number of rates of TBI-related hospitalizations and deaths.*
 - Males were nearly two times more likely to be hospitalized and three times more likely to die from a TBI than females.*
 - People most commonly get TBIs from falls, firearm-related injuries, motor vehicle crashes, or assaults.

***Note:** these estimates do not include the many TBIs that are only treated in the emergency department, primary care, urgent care, or those that go untreated.



TBI in Tennessee

- Tennessee
 - In 2020, approximately **21,399** Tennesseans had a TBI-related emergency department visit, hospitalization, or death.
 - In 2021, approximately 7,838 TBI-related hospitalizations and 935 TBI-related deaths.
 - Three leading causes of TBI include:
 - Falls
 - Motor vehicle accidents
 - Homicide and violent injuries





TBI Among Service Members and Veterans

- More than **450,000** U.S. service members were diagnosed with a TBI from 2000 to 2021.
- More than 185,000 veterans who use VA for their health care have been diagnosed with at least one (1) TBI.
- Majority of those TBIs were classified as mild.
- TBI and its associated co-morbidities are also a significant cause of disability outside of military settings.

We learned of your recent hospital admission at Vanderbilt University Hospital on 1/21/2019. You may have been told you had a "head injury," "concussion," or "brain injury." These terms all refer to an injury to the brain. The Department of Health partners with hospitals to follow up within 4 to 6 months after an injury to alert you to our free service.

Sometimes after this type of injury, people can experience different kinds of symptoms.

- Develop a **comprehensive** plan of care.
- Provide **referrals** to **available** resources.
- **Coordinate services** for individual client advocacy.
- Bridge the gaps in the service delivery system.

Survivors and family members are assisted with: Locating information and services & Are guided in securing these services.



Core Scope of Services

- Provide information on traumatic brain injury
- Refer clients to qualified services
- Assist clients in applying for and accessing services
- Advocate in the area of individual/client rights and benefits
- Develop Support Groups (in person and virtual)
- Assist or consult in the development of new programs and services

 - Drug Overdose





