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## Who is in Poverty and Why?

The definition of poverty is an economic term. However, the World Bank says "Poverty is hunger and lack of shelter. Poverty is being sick and not being able to see a doctor. Poverty is not having access to school and not knowing how to read. Poverty is not having a job, is fear for the future, living one day at a time. Poverty is losing a child to illness brought about by unclean water. Poverty is powerlessness, lack of representation and freedom." There are five dimensions of poverty. They are: 1. low household income; 2. limited education; 3 . lack of health insurance; 4. concentrated spatial poverty; and 5. unemployment.

Nearly half the population faces at least one dimension of poverty, and nearly a quarter faces at least two, with 9 percent and 2 percent facing at least 3 and at least 4 dimensions, respectively.

According to the Bureau of the Census publication "Income and Poverty in the United States: 2017" the official poverty rate in 2017 was 12.3 percent, down 0.4 percentage points from 12.7 in 2016. This is the third consecutive annual decline. In 2017, there were 39.7 million Americans living in poverty. The actual poverty thresholds are available on page two.

From 2016 to 2017 the number of people in poverty decreased for people in families; people living in the West; people living outside metropolitan statistical areas; all workers; workers who worked less than full-time, year-round; people with a high school diploma but no college degree; and people with some college but no degree.

## Demographics

In 2017, the poverty rate for Whites was 8.7 percent ( 17.0 million in poverty), Blacks was 21.2 percent ( 9.0 million in poverty), Asians was 10.0 percent ( 2.0 million in poverty), and Hispanics was 18.3 percent ( 10.8 million in poverty). The Hispanic population in poverty declined from 19.4 percent in 2016.

In 2017, the poverty rate for males was
11.0 percent and 13.6 percent for females. For the population under the age of 18, 17.5 percent ( 12.8 million) were in poverty. This group represented 22.7 percent of the total population in 2017 and 32.3 percent of the people in poverty.

Related children are people under the age of 18 related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption who are not themselves householders or spouses of householders. Of this group, 17.1 percent (12.4 million children) were in poverty. Related children under the age of 6 had a poverty rate of 19.2 percent ( 4.5 million children).

One group of children that experienced a decline in poverty rate were children living in unrelated sub-families. These are children whose parents (or parent) are not related by birth, marriage, or adoption to the householder. The poverty rate for these children fell by 10.5 percentage points: from 48.0 percent in 2016 to 37.5 percent in 2017. These children represent less than 1.0 percent of all children in the U.S.

In 2017, 24.5 percent of people aged 25 and older without a high school diploma lived in poverty. Those with at least a bachelor's degree had a poverty rate of 4.8 percent.

The three-year average of poverty rate (2015-2107) using the Current Population Survey (CPS) was 12.8 percent. The highest poverty rates were in Louisiana ( 20 percent), Mississippi ( 19.5 percent), and New Mexico (18.7 percent). The lowest poverty rates were in New Hampshire ( 6.7 percent), Maryland ( 8.2 percent), and Minnesota ( 8.6 percent). The poverty rate in Tennessee ranked $16^{\text {th }}$ at 13.7 percent.

## Nonfarm Employment \& Labor Workforce Narrative

Total nonfarm employment increased by 57,000 jobs from June 2018 to June 2019. There were increases in accommodation/ food services (up 13,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 12,600 jobs in food services/ drinking places; transportation/warehousing (up 6,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,800 jobs in truck transportation; financial activities (up 5,100 jobs) which includes an increase of 2,700 jobs in finance/insurance and 2,400 jobs in real estate/rental/leasing; professional/business services (up 4,500 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,000 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; arts/entertainment/recreation (up 3,800 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 3,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,300 jobs in ambulatory health care services; construction (up 3,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,100 jobs in specialty trade contractors; and transportation equipment manufacturing (up 3,000 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by declines decline of 1,000 jobs in both nondurable goods wholesalers and miscellaneous store retailers.

During the past month, nonfarm employment decreased by 11,300 jobs. This seasonal decline was entirely due to the effect of summer vacation in schools. There were declines in local government educational services (down 29,000 jobs), state government educational services (down 4,900 jobs), and educational services (down 4,600 jobs).

These large decreases were partially offset by increases in arts/entertainment/recreation (up 6,300 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 3,500 jobs); construction (up 3.000 jobs); ambulatory health care services (up 2,100 jobs); accommodation/food services (up 1,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,200 jobs in food services/drinking places; and information (up 1,500 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for June 2019 was 3.4 percent, up 0.1 percentage point from the May 2019 rate. The United States unemployment rate for June 2019 was 3.7 percent, up 0.1 percentage point from the May 2019 rate. In June 2018, the U.S. seasonally adjusted rate was 3.8 percent while the state rate was 4.0 percent.

The not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased in all 95 counties. Williamson County had the lowest rate at 3 percent, up 0.8 percent from the May rate. The highest rate was Hancock County at 7.7 percent, up from 5.3 percent. This was the greatest increase in June.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, selfemployed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid
family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2018 benchmark.

## Knoxville MSA

Total nonfarm employment in Knoxville decreased by 2,300 jobs from May 2019 to June 2019. There were decreases in local government (down 3,100 jobs), state government (down 1,700 jobs), and professional/business services (down 500 jobs).

These declines were partially offset by increases of 1,200 jobs in retail trade, 1,000 jobs in leisure/hospitality, 300 jobs in educational/health services, and 200 jobs in durable goods manufacturing.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 7,900 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,200 while service-providing jobs increased by 6,700.

## Memphis MSA

Total nonfarm employment increased by 3,400 jobs from May 2019 to June 2019. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 2,400 jobs), administrative/support/ waste management (up 2,300 jobs), transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 1,800 jobs), mining/logging/construction (up 700 jobs), retail trade (up 500 jobs), state government and durable goods manufacturing (both up 400 jobs), and financial activities (up 200 jobs).

These were partially offset by decreases in local government (down 5,000 jobs), educational/health services (down 400 jobs), and other services (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 15,200 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 2,500 , while service-providing jobs increased by 12,700 jobs.

## Nashville MSA

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 2,800 jobs from May 2019 to June 2019. There were declines in local government (down 8,900 jobs); educational services (down 2,300 jobs); state government (down 1,100 jobs); and trade/transportation/utilities (down 1,100 jobs), which includes a 700 job decrease in transportation/warehousing/utilities and a 600 job decrease in retail trade.

These decreases were partially offset by increases in professional/business services (up 2,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,900 jobs in administrative/ support/waste management; leisure/hospitality (up 2,600 jobs); other services (up 1,700 jobs); financial activities (up 900 jobs); mining/logging/construction (up 600 jobs); manufacturing (up 600 jobs), which includes an increase of 400 jobs in durable goods manufacturing; and information (up 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 21,900 jobs. During that time, goodsproducing jobs decreased by 300 , while serviceproviding jobs increased by 22,200 .
