Inside This Issue: Chattanooga MSA 7 Knoxville MSA 8 Memphis MSA 9 Nashville MSA 10 Smaller MSAs 11 Consumer Price Index 12 The Bureau of Labor Statistics cooperates with the state agencies in the Current Employment Statistics (CES) program, or establishment survey, to collect data each month on employment, hours, and earnings from a sample of nonfarm establishments. Nationally, this sample includes about 140.000 businesses and government agencies covering approximately 410,000 individual work sites. The sample is drawn from the universe of about 9 million unemployment insurance tax accounts. The active CES sample includes approximately one-third of all nonfarm payroll employees. The data collected are classified in accordance with the 2007 North American Industry Classification System.

New survey techniques include unit solicitation in three BLS Regional Data Collection Centers. These collection centers perform initial enrollment via telephone, collect the data for several months via Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (17 percent) and, where possible, transfer respondents to a self-reporting mode such as Touchtone Data Entry (8 percent), FAX (8 percent), or Internet collection (18 percent). Very large firms are often enrolled via personal visits and ongoing reporting is established via Electronic Data Interchange (45 percent). A few establishments do not use the above methods and their data is collected by mail (4 percent). Offering survey respondents a choice of reporting methods helps sustain response rates to this survey. Establishments are grouped into industries based on their primary activity. Those that use comparable capital, equipment, labor, and raw material inputs are classified together.

Employment data are collected for persons on payrolls who receive pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th day of the month. The data excludes proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid volunteer or family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees as military personnel are excluded. Persons on paid sick, holiday, or paid vacation leave are included. Persons who are laid off. on leave without pay, or on strike are excluded.

#### **Tennessee Data**

Page 2 lists the 2005 thru 2009 annual average nonfarm data for Tennessee and four Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs).

Based on nonfarm employment, the largest current MSA is Nashville (723,700) and the smallest is Chattanooga (227,200).

During each of the last two years, the nonfarm employment in the MSAs was less than the previous year. The exception was the Knoxville MSA which remained the same from 2007 to 2008 while declining in 2009. The 2009 annual average nonagricultural employment in Tennessee was at a lower level than the employment in 1998 (2,618,900 compared to 2,638,400 in 1998). The Memphis MSA had the largest decrease in jobs from 2005 until 2009 (down 25,900). The four largest MSAs accounted for 101,100 of the 155,900 job losses in Tennessee last year (64.8 percent of the total). The only industries with slight increases were the Educational and Health Services sectors.





#### Unemployment Rates 1980-2009





### NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 23,700 jobs from April 2009 to April 2010. During this period, there were large seasonal decreases in mining/logging/construction (down 8,700 jobs); transportation/warehousing (down 8,300 jobs), which includes a drop of 3,000 jobs in truck transportation; finance/insurance (down 5,300 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (down 4,000 jobs); wholesale trade (down 3,900 jobs), which includes decreases of 2,800 jobs in nondurable goods wholesalers and 2,000 jobs in durable goods wholesalers; professional/ scientific/technical services (down 3,700 jobs); accommodation/food services (down 3,500 jobs), which includes a drop of 3,300 jobs in food services/drinking places; and information (down 2,000 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in administrative/support/waste management (up 9,100 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 6,000 jobs), which includes increases of 4,600 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 1,900 jobs in nursing/residential care facilities; retail trade (up 5,900 jobs); and educational services (up 2,300 jobs).

During April, nonfarm employment increased by 21,000 jobs. The largest seasonal increases were in administrative/support/waste management (up 5,100 jobs); accommodation/food services (also up 5,100 jobs); which includes an increase of 3,600 jobs in food services/drinking places and 1,500 jobs in accommodation; arts/entertainment/ recreation (up 3,900 jobs); retail trade (up 2,400 jobs); mining/logging/construction (up 1,900 jobs); federal government (up 1,700 jobs); and other services (up 1,600 jobs). This was partially offset by a decrease in health care/social assistance (down 1,100 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for April 2010 was 10.5 percent, down 0.1 percent from the March 2010 rate. This is the 36th consecutive month that the current rate is greater than or equal to the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 9.9 percent in April 2010. In April 2009, the national unemployment rate was 8.9 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 10.5 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 89 counties, increased in three counties, and remained the same in three counties. There were 24 counties with an unemployment rate less than 10 percent and one county had a rate above 20 percent. The lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 7.1 percent, down 0.3 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 20.3 percent, up from 19.8 percent in March 2010.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2009 benchmark.
