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## ACCRA Cost-of-Living Index — Third Quarter 2005

The American Chamber of Commerce Research Association (ACCRA), founded in 1961, is a nonprofit professional organization comprised of research staff of chambers of commerce, economic development organizations, and related organizations in participating urban areas throughout the United States and Canada. AC-CRA developed the AC-CRA Cost-of-Living Index in 1968 to meet the need for a measure of living cost differentials among urban areas.

The index measures the relative price levels for consumer goods and services in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas whose chambers of commerce have agreed to participate in the survey. The average of all participating cities equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places.

Taxes, both state and local, are an integral part of the cost of living and vary widely between state and metro areas. Due to the multiplicity of

state and local taxes, taxing jurisdictions, and assessment procedures, the ACCRA felt it was not feasible to measure taxes levied on real and intangible property, retail sales, and income.

The index does not measure inflation (price change over time) because each quarterly report is a separate snapshot of prices at a single point in time. The number and mix of the chambers of commerce that participate may change from one quarter to the next. Index data from different quarters cannot be compared.

While items seem selfdescriptive for most categories, the miscellaneous goods and services category needs to be enumerated due to the vagueness of the heading and the weight carried (35 percent). This category includes men's shirts and women's slacks, fast food items, health and beauty items, dry cleaning, major appliance repair, newspapers, entertainment, and alcoholic beverages.

Since last year, the weighting system of the

cost-of-living index changed. Housing declined by 1 percent while utilities increased by 1 percent.

The highest and lowest costs in the country by group are as follows: Grocery Items: Honolulu, Hawaii (152.5) and San Marcos, Texas (77.9); Housing: New York (Manhattan) (362.4) and Jonesboro, Arkansas and Douglas. Georgia (both 67.6); Utilities: Fairbanks, Alaska (159.5) and Springfield, Missouri (72); Transportation: Kodiak, Alaska (126.2) and McAlester. Oklahoma (78.1); Health Care: Juneau, Alaska (146.5) and Nevada, Missouri (79.9); and Miscellaneous Goods and Services: New York (Manhattan) (138.3) and McAlester, Oklahoma (75.4).

How to use the ACCRA Cost-of-Living Index: Assume that City A has a composite index of 98.3 and City B has a composite index of 128.5. If you live in City A and are contemplating a job offer in City B, how much of an increase in your after-tax income is needed to maintain your current lifestyle? 100\*{(City B-City A)/City A} = 100\*{(128.5-98.3)/98.3} = 100\*(.3072) = 30.72%, or about a 31% increase. Conversely, if you are considering a move from City B to City A, how much of a cut in after-tax income can you sustain without reducing your present lifestyle? 100\*{(City A-City B)/City B} = 100\*{(98.3-128.5)/128.5} = 100\*(-.235) = -23.5%, or about a 24% reduction.







## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for December 2005 was 5.4 percent, down 0.3 percent from the November 2005 rate. This is the third consecutive month, and 11th month this year, that the rate is above the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 4.9 percent in December 2005. In December 2004, the national unemployment rate was 5.4 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5.3 percent.

Across Tennessee, the not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in 79 counties, increased in 13 counties, and remained the same in three counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 3.1 percent, down 0.6 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Clay County's 14.5 percent, up from 13.9 percent in November. Total nonfarm employment increased by 15,900 jobs from December 2004 to December 2005. During this period, there were increases in health care/social assistance (up 6,300 jobs), which includes increases of 3,400 jobs in ambulatory health care services, 1,600 jobs in hospitals, and 1,000 jobs in social assistance; retail trade (up 4,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,800 jobs in general merchandise stores; local government (up 2,600 jobs); construction (up 2,300 jobs); wholesale trade (up 2,000 jobs), which includes increases of

1,100 jobs in wholesale electronic markets and 1,000 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; accommodation/food services (up 1,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,600 jobs in food services/drinking places and a 1,800 job decline in accommodation; financial activities (up 1,700 jobs); and motor vehicle parts manufacturing (up 1,100 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in information (down 1,800 jobs), administrative/support/waste management (down 1,700 jobs), machinery manufacturing (down 1,300 jobs), and state government

educational services and food/beverage stores (both down 1,100 jobs).

During December, nonfarm employment increased by 4,800 jobs. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 4,600 jobs), which includes increases of 1,400 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,000 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; local government (up 1,300 jobs); and professional/ scientific/technical services (up 1,100 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in leisure/hospitality (down 1,200 jobs) and machinery manufacturing (down 1,100 jobs).


The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2004 benchmark.

## Chattanooga MSA

Total nonfarm employment increased by 500 jobs from November to December. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 400 jobs) and local government (up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by small declines of fewer than

100 persons in selected industries.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 2,400 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs declined by 500, while service-providing jobs increased by 2,900.



Total nonfarm employment decreased by 500 jobs from November to December. There were seasonal decreases in state government (down 500 jobs); natural resources/mining/construction (down 400 jobs); and leisure/hospitality (down 300 jobs), which includes a drop of 200 jobs in food services/drinking places. This is partially offset by an increase in retail trade (up 400 jobs) and transportation/warehousing/utilities and professional/business services (both up 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 3,900 jobs. During this time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 600, while service-providing jobs increased by 4,500.




