The Labor Market Report

Union Membership

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the percent of wage and salary workers who were members of a union in 2013 was 11.3 percent, the same as in 2012. In 2013, 14.5 million workers were union members, however an additional 1.5 million workers were represented by a union while not being union members. In 1983, the first year for which comparable union data are available, the union membership rate was 20.1 percent, and there were 17.7 million union workers.

Membership & Earnings

In 2013, among full-time wage and salary workers, union members had median weekly earnings of \$950, while those who were not union members had median weekly earnings of \$750. Union membership among public-sector workers was 35.3 percent while that of private-sector workers was 6.7 percent. Workers in education, training, and library occupations had the highest unionization rate.

The union rate was higher for men (11.9 percent) than for women (10.5)percent) in 2013. In the last 30 years the union membership has narrowed considerably. In 1983, 24.7 percent of men were union workers while 14.6 percent of women were also in the union. Unionization was higher for black workers (13.6 percent) than white workers (11.0 percent), Asian workers (9.4 percent), or Hispanic workers (9.4 percent). Union membership was highest among 55-to-64 year olds (14.3 percent) and lowest among 16-to-24 year olds (4.3 percent).

In the States

In 2013. 30 states and the District of Columbia had union membership rates below that of the U.S. average, 11.3 percent, while 20 states had higher rates.

The states with the highest union rates were New York (24.4 percent), Alaska (23.2 percent), Hawaii (22.0 percent), Washington (18.9 percent), Rhode Island (16.8 percent), California (16.4 percent), and Michigan (16.3 percent). The states with the lowest union rates were North Carolina (3.0 percent), Arkansas (3.5 percent), Mississippi and South Carolina (both 3.7 percent), and Utah (3.9 percent). Slightly over one-half of all union members live in seven states: California (2.4 million), New York (2.0 million), Illinois, (0.9 million), Pennsylvania (0.7 million), and Ohio, New Jersey, and Michigan (each at 0.6 million).

The state with the lowest union percent (North Carolina) has a comparable number of union workers as Hawaii (the third highest percent of union workers). The difference is that North Carolina (with 3.9 million workers) has more than seven times the employment of Hawaii (549,000 workers). Tennessee had 7.4 percent (188,000 workers) who are either members or are represented by a union contract.

The data on union membership were collected as part of the Current Population Survey (CPS), a monthly sample survey of about 60,000 households that obtains information on employment among the nation's civilian non-institutional population age 16 and over.







Total nonfarm employment increased by 32,000 jobs from December 2012 to December 2013. There were large increases in retail trade (up 10,300 jobs), which included increases of 2,700 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers and 1,200 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; and accommodation/food services (up 8,400 jobs). which included increases of 6,600 jobs in food services/drinking places and 1,800 jobs in accommodation. Other significant increases were in professional/business services (up 6,400 jobs), which included increases of 4,100 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services and 1,400 jobs in administrative/support/waste management: health care/social assistance (up 5,900 jobs), which included increases of 4,100 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 4,000 jobs in social assistance combined with a decline of 3,400 jobs in hospitals; transportation equipment manufacturing (up 5,700 jobs); finance/insurance (up 2,300 jobs); and arts/ entertainment/recreation (up 2,000 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by declines in transportation/warehousing (down 2,600 jobs), local government educational services (down 2,500 jobs), and mining/logging/ construction and durable goods wholesalers (both down 1,500 jobs).

During December 2013 nonfarm employment decreased by 7,800 jobs. This decline occurred in leisure/hospitality (down 3,500 jobs), which included a drop of 2,300 jobs in accommodation/ food services: state government educational services (down 3,200 jobs); administrative/ support/waste management (down 2,300 jobs); mining/logging/construction (down 2,000 jobs); and education/health services (down 1,800 jobs), which includes a decrease of 1,000 jobs in health care/social assistance. This was partially offset by increases in retail trade (up 2,500 jobs), which includes increases of 2,300 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,100 jobs in clothing/ clothing accessories stores; and transportation/ warehousing and professional/scientific/ technical services (both up 1,200 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for December 2013 was 7.8 percent, down 0.3 percentage point from the revised November 2013 rate.

The United States unemployment rate was 6.7 percent in December 2013. In December 2012, the national rate was 7.9 percent while the state unemployment rate was 7.6 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 51 counties, increased in 29 counties and remained the same in 15 counties. Of the counties with lowest unemployment rates, eight of the top nine are from the Nashville MSA. In December 2013, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 4.8 percent, down 0.1 percentage point from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Scott County at 15.6 percent, unchanged from November.


The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2012 benchmark.

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 300 jobs from November 2013 to December 2013. There were decreases in leisure/hospitality (down 600 jobs), mining/logging/construction (down 300 jobs), and state government (down 200 jobs). This was partially offset by increases of 500 jobs in educational/health services and 400 jobs in retail trade.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 700 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs declined by 500 jobs while service-providing jobs increased by 1,200.



Total nonfarm employment decreased by 1,700 jobs from November 2013 to December 2013. 

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 2,100 jobs from November 2013 to December 2013. There were declines in mining/logging/construction (down 1,200 jobs), administrative/support/waste management (down 900 jobs), state government (down 800 jobs), educational/health services (down 600 jobs), leisure/hospitality (down 500 jobs), and local government (down 200 jobs). These decreases were partially offset by seasonal increases in transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 800 jobs), professional/scientific/technical services (up 700 jobs), retail trade (up 400 jobs), and nondurable goods manufacturing (up 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 300 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 200, while service-providing jobs decreased by 100.





Total nonfarm employment decreased by 1,400 jobs from November 2013 to December 2013. There were declines in administrative/support/waste management (down 1,900 jobs); educational/health services (down 1,800 jobs), which includes a decline of 1,600 jobs in health care/social assistance; leisure/ hospitality (down 1,300 jobs); and other services and financial activities (both down 200 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in retail trade (up 1,500 jobs), professional/scientific/technical services (up 900 jobs), mining/logging/construction (up 800 jobs), transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 500 jobs), local government (up 300 jobs), and durable goods manufacturing and management of companies/ enterprises (both up 200 jobs).


