Food Stamp History and Coverage

The Food Stamp Program (FSP) started in 1939 and is credited to Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace. It was during a time of widespread unemployment combined with surpluses of perishable foods. The program allowed people on relief to buy orange stamps equal to their normal food expenditures. For \$1 worth of orange stamps purchased, 50 cents worth of blue stamps were received. Orange stamps could be used to buy any food while blue stamps could only be used to buy the unmarketable surplus food. The program ended four years later when conditions improved.

In 1961, President Kennedy's first Executive Order was for a food stamp pilot program. The pilot eliminated special stamps for surplus foods. By 1964 the pilot served 43 areas in 22 states with 360,000 participants. The Food Stamp Act of 1964, signed by President Johnson, made this a permanent program. The goal of this law was to strengthen the agricultural economy, improve the nutrition among low-income people, and be the first line of defense against hunger in America. The law divided responsibilities between the states (certification and issuance) and the Federal government (funding and authorization of retailers/wholesalers) while sharing administrative costs. The Food Stamp Act also prohibited all forms of discrimination.

Congress has passed legislation modifying the original Food Stamp Act many times during the last 40 years. Nine bills have made major changes to the FSP while smaller changes have occurred through other legislation. These changes have all focused on strengthening integrity, simplifying administration, maintaining State flexibility, improving health through nutrition education, and improving access.

Some major changes included work and/or job training requirements, funding responsibilities, regulations for exclusion/ inclusion of benefits, qualification requirements for non-citizens, nutritional counseling, and electronic payments. There were laws that enhanced funding for states with low error rates based on measures of performance. There were coordination efforts between Social Security Disability and Aid

for Dependent Children. Funding attachments were included on Farm Bills in 2002 and 2008. Through all these changes the basic philosophy and goals of the FSP have not changed.

The Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 increased Federal food assistance programs and changed the name of the program to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program or SNAP. It also changed the name of the Food Stamp Act of 1977 to the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008.

Who Gets Benefits

In 2012, there was a monthly average of 46 million low-income people receiving benefits. They were able-bodied adults between 16 and 60 (with some exceptions) who qualified by registering for work, taking part in employment/training programs, and accepting or continuing employment. Thirty percent of participating food stamp households have taxable earnings. Households with children receive about 75 percent of all food stamp benefits. Twenty-three percent of households include a disabled person and 18 percent include an elderly person.

Only U.S. citizens and some non-citizens are eligible for program benefits. Non-citizens must have 5 years of residence in the U.S. in a qualified alien status before receiving benefits.

The FSP supports state and local communities by boosting their economy. Every 5 dollars in new food stamp benefits generate about \$9.20 in total community spending. If, for example, the federal government increased the program by five percent then 1.9 million people would be able to spend an addition 1.3 billion dollars on food and 2.5 billion dollars in new economic activity. This assumes money spent is respent multiple times by business owners, business suppliers, and business employees. These people spend their money in additional businesses. In fiscal year 2012 there was 86.5 billion dollars appropriated to SNAP. This includes a 3 billion dollar contingency fund. NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 67,300 jobs from December 2013 to December 2014. There were large increases in professional/ business services (up 17,100 jobs), which included increases of 11,200 jobs in administrative/support/waste management, 3.800 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services, and 2,100 jobs in management of companies/enterprises; mining/logging/ construction (up 11,000 jobs); and accommodation/food services (up 9,800 jobs), which includes increases of 7,600 jobs in food services/drinking places and 2,200 jobs in accommodation. There were smaller increases in transportation/warehousing (up 6,500 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (up 4,300 jobs); ambulatory health care services (up 4,200 jobs); retail trade (up 4,100 jobs), which includes increases of 1,900 jobs in food/ beverage stores and 1,600 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers combined with a decline of 1.800 jobs in general merchandise stores; wholesale trade (up 3,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,500 jobs in durable goods wholesalers; and real estate/rental/leasing (up 3,100 jobs).

During December 2014, nonfarm employment increased by 3,500 jobs. There were increases in retail trade (up 3,700 jobs), which includes increases of 1,800 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,200 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; transportation/warehousing (up 3,600 jobs); local government educational services (up 1,200 jobs); and professional/ business services (up 1,100 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in state government educational services (down 2,500 jobs); leisure/ hospitality (down 2,100 jobs), which includes a drop of 1,200 jobs in arts/entertainment/ recreation; and educational/health services (down 1,100 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for December was 6.6 percent, down 0.2 percentage point from the revised November 2014 rate. The United States unemployment rate in December was 5.6 percent, down 0.2 percentage point from the revised November 2014 rate.

In December 2013, the national unemployment rate was 6.7 percent while the state rate was 7.7 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in 64 counties, decreased in 20 counties, and remained the same in 11 counties. There were 87 counties that had a rate between 5 percent and 10 percent. The largest percentage increase was in Trousdale County (up 1.2 percent) while the greatest decline was in Montgomery County (down 0.4 percent). In December 2014, the lowest rate was in Lincoln County at 4.4 percent, up 0.1 percentage point from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Scott County at 13.1 percent, up from 12.5 percent in November.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2013 benchmark.




Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,100 jobs from November 2014 to December 2014. There were seasonal increases in professional/business services (up 600 jobs), retail trade (up 500 jobs), and local government and transportation/warehousing/utilities (both up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline of 200 jobs in state government.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 4,700 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,300 while service-providing industries jobs increased by 3,400.

(NOT SEASONALLY ADJUSTED)



Total nonfarm employment decreased by 300 jobs from November 2014 to December 2014. There were decreases in leisure/hospitality (down 1,100 jobs), state government (down 400 jobs), and manufacturing (down 200 jobs). This was offset by increases in mining/logging/construction (up 900 jobs), and transportation/warehousing/utilities and retail trade (both up 400 jobs).

Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 11,100 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 3,900 jobs, while serviceproviding jobs increased by 7,200.

KNOXVILLE MSA U N E M P L O Y M E N T R A T E S (NOT SEASONALLY ADJUSTED)






Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,800 jobs from November 2014 to December 2014. There were increases in retail trade (up 1,100 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 1,000 jobs); professional/business services (up 800 jobs), which included increases of 600 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 200 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; mining/logging/construction (up 600 jobs); financial activities (up 400 jobs); and leisure/hospitality (up 300 jobs).

This was partially offset by seasonal decreases in state government (down 900 jobs), educational/health services (down 300 jobs), and local government (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 5,900 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 3,400, while service-providing jobs increased by 2,500.

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
Total nonfarm employment increased by 3,000 jobs from November 2014 to December 2014. There were seasonal increases in transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 1,600 jobs); retail trade (up 1,300 jobs), professional/scientific/technical services (up 800 jobs), local government (up 600 jobs), other services (up 500 jobs), and durable goods manufacturing (up 200 jobs).

These were partially offset by declines in educational/health services (down 600 jobs), which includes a decline of 400 jobs in health care/social assistance; state government (down 400 jobs); leisure/hospitality (down 300 jobs); and financial activities, administrative/support/waste management, and wholesale trade (each down 400 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 25,600 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 5,500, while service-providing jobs increased by 20,100.
