Fun Facts About Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day began as Lupercalia, a pagan celebration of fertility at the ides of February. The most popular theory of the origin is that Saint Valentine, a priest, was executed by Emperor Claudius II for marrying young lovers in secret (against the law) around 270 A.D. In 496 A.D., Pope Gelasius I declared February 14 as Saint Valentine's feast day to both commemorate the saint and "Christianize" the pagan celebration.

The day was first associated with romantic love in the High Middle Ages, when the tradition of courtly love flourished. In 18thcentury England, it evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering confectionery, and sending greeting cards (known as "valentines"). Esther Howland, a native of Massachusetts, is given credit for selling the first mass-produced valentine cards in the 1840's. According to the Greeting Card Association an estimated one billion cards are sent each year (second to Christmas). Women purchase about 85 percent of all valentines. The spirit continues with young children exchanging valentine's cards with their fellow classmates.

Today, sweethearts and family members present gifts to one another, such as cards, candy, flowers, and other symbols of affection. These traditions have the following effect on the economy.

Showing Your Love

There are 1,185 manufacturing establishments that produce chocolate and cocoa products in the U.S. These establishments employ 38,717 people. California had 129 establishments that produce these chocolate products and 45 establishments that produced non-chocolate products. Pennsylvania had 114 chocolate producing businesses. Some of these products, valued at 14.9 billion dollars, are sold in the 3,367 confectionery and nut stores in the United States.

There were a total of 448 manufacturing establishments that produced non-chocolate products in 2013. These establishments employ 19,308 people. These products were valued at 9.3 billion dollars.

As of 2013, there were 14,161 florists that employed 62,222 workers. The total value of fresh cut roses sold, as of October 2014, was \$381,757,889. As of October 2014, there were 272,180,347 dollars of cut flowers and buds (for bouquets) imported.

Jewelry stores offer engagement, wedding and other rings to couples of all ages. There were 23,096 jewelry stores in the United States in 2013. For the 2013 Valentine's Day holiday, these stores sold an estimated \$2.5 billion in merchandise. (Continued on Page 2)

Some of this merchandise was produced at one of the nation's 2,134 jewelry and silverware manufacturing establishments.

Tying the Knot

As of 2012, there were 399 dating businesses in the U.S. These establishments, which include Internet dating services, employed 2,348 people. The American Community Survey (ACS) reported that 47.7 percent of people 15 and older reported being married. In this group, 19.2 percent reported being married two times. Five percent were married three or more times. However, 75.5 percent of the couples were only married once. This excludes those that are separated. The ACS also reported that the median age for first marriages was 29.5 years for men and 27.6 years for women.

In 2012, there were 2.1 million provisional marriages in the United States. That breaks down to about 5,800 marriages a day. In 2012, Nevada was the number one marriage state with 35.1 marriages per 1,000 people. This was followed by Hawaii (17.5 marriages), Arkansas (10.9 marriages), Tennessee (8.8 marriages), and Utah and the District of Columbia (both with 8.4 marriages per 1,000 people). The states with the fewest marriages per 1,000 people were New Jersey (4.9 marriages), Connecticut (5.2 marriages), Wisconsin (5.4 marriages), and Massachusetts and Pennsylvania (both with 5.5 marriages).

In 2000, Nevada was the number one marriage state with 99.0 marriages per 1,000 people! This was followed by Hawaii (16.4 marriages), South Carolina (15.9 marriages), Arkansas (15.3 marriages), and Idaho and Tennessee (both with 13.9 marriages per 1,000 people). The states with the fewest marriages per 1,000 people in 2000 were Pennsylvania (7.1 marriages), West Virginia (7.2 marriages)

es), North Dakota (7.5 marriages), and New Jersey (7.6 marriages).

Romantic Vacations

If you want to take a romantic vacation on February 14th you might consider going to Loveland in either Colorado (population 72,651), Ohio (population 12,405), or Oklahoma (population 13). You could consider a different kind of love in Lovejoy, Georgia (population 6,406), Lovelady, Texas (population 621), Lovelock, Nevada (population 1,900), Love's Park, Illinois (population 23,551), and Love County, Oklahoma (population 9,773). There is also Lovington in New Mexico (population 11,840) and Illinois (population 1,109). There is Loving, New Mexico (population 1,399) and Loving County, Texas (population 86). If that's too much love, then you could go to Rose City. Michigan (population 636), Rose City, Texas (population 514), Valentine, Nebraska (population 2,785), and Romeo, Colorado (population 394). There is no Juliet.



NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 66,400 jobs from December 2014 to December 2015. There were large increases in administrative/ support/waste management (up 12,400 jobs); retail trade (up 9,400 jobs), which includes increases of 3,000 jobs in both food/beverage stores and motor vehicle/parts dealers combined with a decline of 1,100 jobs in gasoline stations; and accommodation/food services (up 8,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 7,700 jobs in food services/drinking places.

Smaller increases occurred in health care/social assistance (up 7,600 jobs), which includes increases of 7,400 jobs in ambulatory health care services, 2,400 jobs in hospitals, and a decline of 2,100 jobs in nursing/residential care facilities; transportation/warehousing (up 6,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,200 jobs in truck transportation; wholesale trade (up 6,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,000 jobs in nondurable goods wholesalers; financial activities (up 5,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,200 jobs in finance/insurance; transportation equipment manufacturing (up 3,100 jobs); and state government educational services (up 3,000 jobs). These increases were partially offset by declines in information (down 2,000 jobs) and machinery manufacturing (down 1,000 jobs).

During December 2015, nonfarm employment increased by 14,400 jobs. There were increases in transportation/warehousing (up 5,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,600 jobs in truck transportation; professional/business services (up 4,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,900 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; retail trade (up 4,200 jobs), which includes increases of 1,300 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,200 jobs in clothing/ clothing accessories stores; and education/health services (up 1,300 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in state government educational services (down 1,400 jobs), financial activities (down 1,200 jobs), and leisure/hospitality (down 1.000 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for December 2015 was 5.6 percent, down 0.1 percentage point from the revised November rate. The United States unemployment rate in December was 5.0 percent, unchanged since the October 2015 rate.

In December 2014, the national unemployment rate was 5.6 percent while the state rate was 6.6 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 43 counties, increased in 35 counties, and remained the same in 17 counties. There were 17 counties with rates below 5 percent. In December 2015, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 3.6 percent, down 0.2 percent from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Hancock County at 9.9 percent, up from 9.8 percent in November.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2014 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,200 jobs from November 2015 to December 2015. There were increases in retail trade and leisure/hospitality (both up 600 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities and local government (both up 400 jobs); and federal government (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline of 200 jobs in state government.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 6,700 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 400 while service-providing jobs increased by 6,300.





Total nonfarm employment increased by 7,000 jobs from November 2015 to December 2015. There were seasonal increases in administrative/support/waste management (up 2,700 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 1,700 jobs); leisure/hospitality (up 1,600 jobs); professional/scientific/technical services (up 600 jobs); wholesale trade and federal government (both up 500 jobs); and retail trade and educational/health services (both up 300 jobs). These were partially offset by a decline in state government (down 1,100 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 8,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs declined by 1,400, while service-providing jobs increased by 9,900.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 4,000 jobs from November 2015 to December 2015. There were increases in transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 2,300 jobs); retail trade (up 1,300 jobs); professional/business services (up 900 jobs), which includes increases of 400 jobs in both professional/scientific/technical services and administrative/support/waste management; durable goods manufacturing (up 600 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 500 jobs); local government (up 400 jobs); and federal government (up 200 jobs).

These were partially offset by declines in leisure/hospitality (down 1,100 jobs), financial activities (down 800 jobs), and state government (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 29,100 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 3,600, while service-providing jobs increased by 25,500.
