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Poverty in the Nation and States

Poverty status is determined by comparing annual income to a set of dollar values called "thresholds" that vary by family size, number of children, and age of householder. If a family's before-tax money income is less than the dollar value of their threshold. then that family and every individual in it are considered to be in poverty. For people not living in families, poverty status is determined by comparing the individual's income to his or her threshold. The poverty thresholds are updated annually to allow for changes in the cost of living using the Consumer Price Index (CPI-U). They do not vary geographically.

Since income is reported for the previous 12 months, the appropriate poverty threshold for each family is determined by multiplying the base-year poverty threshold (1982) by the average of monthly CPI values for the 12 months preceding the survey month.

Poverty

The 2009 American Community Survey (ACS) data indicate an estimated 14.3 percent of the U.S. population had in-

come below its poverty threshold in the past 12 months. This is 1 percentage point higher than the 13.3 percent poverty rate estimated for the 2008 ACS. According to the ACS, the estimated number of people in poverty increased by 3.5 million to 42.9 million.

Poverty rates from the 2009 ACS for the 50 states and the District of Columbia ranged from a low of 8.5 percent in New Hampshire to a high of 21.9 percent in Mississippi. Only five states had estimated poverty rates lower than 10 percent. They were Alaska, Connecticut, Maryland, New Hampshire, and New Jersev. On the other side of the distribution, five states had estimated poverty rates at or above 17 percent in 2009. They were Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Mississippi, and West Virginia.

Highlights

Thirty-one states saw increases in both the number and percentage of people in poverty between the 2008 and the 2009 ACS. No state had a statistically significant decline in either the number in poverty or the poverty

rate. In the 2009 ACS, 18.9 percent of people in the United States had income less than 125 percent of their poverty threshold, compared to 17.6 percent in the 2008 ACS. The percentage of people with income less than 50 percent of their poverty threshold increased from 5.6 percent in the 2008 ACS to 6.3 in the 2009 ACS. Tennessee saw poverty levels increase by 116,579 persons from 2008 to 2009. Of that amount, there was an increase of 36,780 citizens less than 18 years old (see Page 2). In both vears studied. Tennesseans that are under the poverty threshold were greater than 20 percent of the U.S. average in all categories. This included those less than 18 years






UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTIVITIES (MOST RECENT AVAILABLE)

NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 35,000 jobs from February 2010 to February 2011. This includes increases in professional/business services (up 9,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 6,800 jobs in administrative/ support/waste management; health care/social assistance (up 9,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,100 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 3,700 jobs in hospitals; mining/logging/construction (up 7,800 jobs); transportation/warehousing (up 5,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,200 jobs in truck transportation; accommodation/ food services (up 2,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,500 jobs in food services/drinking places; educational services (up 2,400 jobs); and transportation equipment manufacturing (up 2,000 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in retail trade (down 2,100 jobs), information (down 1,400 jobs), printing/related activities (down 1,100 jobs), and real estate/rental/leasing (down 1,000 jobs).

During February, nonfarm employment increased by 15,900 jobs. This included seasonal gains in educational/health services (up 4,400 jobs), which includes increases of 3,200 jobs in educational services and 1,200 jobs in health care/social assistance; state government educational services (up 3,500 jobs); leisure/hospitality (up 3,100 jobs), which includes increases of 2,600 jobs in food services/drinking places and 1,000 jobs in arts/entertainment/recreation; mining/logging/ construction (up 3,000 jobs); professional/business services (up 1,800 jobs), which includes a gain of 1,000 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services: and local government educational services (up 1,600 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in retail trade (down 3,500 jobs), which includes drops of 1,400 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores and 1,100 jobs in general merchandise stores.

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for February 2011 was 9.6 percent, up 0.2 percent from the revised January 2011 rate.

The United States' unemployment rate was 8.9 percent in February 2011. In February 2010, the national unemployment rate was 9.7 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 10.3 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 57 counties, increased in 26 counties, and remained unchanged in 12 counties. There were 19 counties with an unemployment rate less than 10 percent, and nine counties had a rate at or above 15 percent. In February, the lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 6.6 percent, down 0.1 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 22.7 percent, down from 23.2 percent in January 2011.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2010 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment decreased by 5,000 jobs from December 2010 to January 2011. There were declines in retail trade (down 1,200 jobs), state government (down 1,000 jobs), leisure/hospitality (down 800 jobs), professional/business services (down 600 jobs), mining/logging/ construction (down 400 jobs), and nondurable goods manufacturing, financial activities, and other services (each down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 2,900 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 700, while service-providing jobs increased by 2,200.





Total nonfarm employment decreased by 6,100 jobs from December 2010 to January 2011. There were seasonal declines in retail trade and leisure/ hospitality (both down 300 jobs); mining/logging/ construction (down 900 jobs); professional/business services (down 700 jobs); state government (down 400 jobs); local government and educational/health services (both down 300 jobs); and transportation/ warehousing/utilities and financial activities (both down 200 jobs).

Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 5,700 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 900, while service-providing jobs increased by 4,800.



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Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,600 jobs from January 2011 to February 2011. There were seasonal increases in state government and educational/health services (both up 900 jobs); federal and local government (both up 500 jobs); and leisure/hospitality, durable goods manufacturing, and financial activities (each up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in professional/business services (down 700 jobs), which includes a decline of 600 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; retail trade (down 600 jobs); and transportation/warehousing/utilities (down 400 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 5,600 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 900, while service-providing jobs declined by 4,700.





Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,900 jobs from January 2011 to February 2011. There were seasonal increases in state government (up 1,400 jobs); professional/business services (up 1,000 jobs), which includes a gain of 800 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; leisure/hospitality (up 700 jobs); educational/health services (up 600 jobs), which includes increases of 400 jobs in educational services and 200 jobs in health care/social assistance; and transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in retail trade (down 700 jobs), and mining/logging/construction and local government (both down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 16,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 2,200, while service-providing jobs increased by 14,300.
