### **Essential Industries in Tennessee**

Which industries in Tennessee are essential to everyday life, and what are their employment and key occupations? The Occupational Employment Survey (OES) just released their May 2019 employment and wage data for the states and key metropolitan areas. In Tennessee, this annual survey of 8,333 employers provided detailed employment and wage data for more than 500 occupations at the state level as well as data for 10 MSAs and four balance of state areas.

#### **Select Essential Industries**

Several industries essential to everyday life include those in the food supply chain, healthcare, information, utilities, and government. The food supply chain starts with farm production and moves to the processors, distributors, retailers, and then to the consumer, and included an estimated 299,640 employees in 2019. Agricultural workers are not covered by the OES survey, but the Tennessee shortterm employment projections estimated in 2019 that 24,620 employees were involved in crop production and 9,610 in animal production in the state. Top occupations included farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural managers, farmworkers and laborers raising crops and nursery items as well as those raising animals on farms, ranches and through aquaculture; agricultural equipment operators; and graders and sorters of agricultural products.

According to the May 2019 OES Survey, Tennessee had 265,410 workers in other industries related to the food supply chain, including food manufacturing; merchant wholesalers of groceries, related products, and alcoholic beverages; food and beverage stores, including grocery stores; gas stations/convenience stores and general merchandise stores which often sell groceries; and general freight trucking. This number excludes the hundreds of thousands of workers who were employed in restaurants.

Food manufacturers in Tennessee (35,630 employees) produced everything from animal food, sugar, preserved fruits and vegetables, specialty foods, tortillas, and snack foods, as well as the processing of animals and milling of grain and oilseeds. Distribution of food and related products relies on merchant wholesalers of nondurable goods as well as direct pur-

chases by retailers. These wholesalers (NAICS codes 4244 and 4248) (16,860 employees) purchased and distributed groceries and related products and beer and other alcoholic beverages. Food and beverage stores (55,230) purchased products grown or manufactured in Tennessee as well as those available nationally and internationally. Nearly seven percent of the workers in gas stations/convenience stores were food preparation or fast food counter employees. Many general merchandise stores (73,780) are prime sellers of groceries in Tennessee. General freight trucking companies (59,980 employees) deliver food and other nondurable goods to these locations.

#### **Top Occupations**

The top occupations identified by the OES survey in the food supply chain included cashiers (47,430 employees), heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers (38,860), stockers and order fillers (30,210), retail salespersons (22,610), and first line supervisors of retail sales workers (14,170). Stockers and order fillers had median annual earnings of \$18,710 to \$34,940, with highest average wages in the food manufacturing industries. In the industries reporting, median annual wages for tractor-trailer truck drivers ranged from \$38,160 to \$45,280. Other essential industries are the following, including the number of employees: healthcare and social assistance (398,940), medical equipment and supplies manufacturing (9,200), the information industry (42,750), utilities (3,630), and state (40,690) and local (119,480) government (excluding education and hospitals).


The top occupations in terms of employment in healthcare and social assistance were registered nurses, nursing assistants, and home health and personal care aides, who together made up 107,270 employees in the industry in May 2019. The largest occupations in the information industry were telecommunications equipment installers and repairers, except line installers, with 3,800 employees; customer service representatives and services sales representatives, totaling 5,380 employees; and software development and software quality assurance analysts and testers, whose median annual income was \$88,560. Top occupations in government are listed in the following table: public safety, social workers, and eligibility interview-





# Nonfarm Employment & Labor Workforce Narrative

Total nonfarm employment increased by 54,200 jobs from February 2019 to February 2020. There were increases in trade/ transportation/utilities (up 17,800 jobs), which includes increases of 10,200 jobs in transportation & warehousing; leisure & hospitality (up 14,500 jobs), which includes increases of 9,600 jobs in accommodation & food services; health care & social assistance (up 8,900 jobs); professional/scientific/technical services (up 7,100 jobs); financial activities (up 3,200 jobs), which includes increase of 2,000 jobs in finance and insurance.

These increases were partially offset by a decrease in administrative/support/waste management (down 2,800 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (down 2,500 jobs); state government educational services (down 1,300 jobs).

During the past month, nonfarm employment increased by 18,200 jobs. There were increases in government (up 8,800 jobs), which includes increases of 8,000 jobs in state government educational services; educational & health services (up 6,000 jobs), which includes increases of 3,500 jobs in educational services; professional/scientific/technical services (up 2,000 jobs); manufacturing (up 1,300 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by decreases in administrative/support/waste management (down 1,600 jobs); general merchandising stores (down 1,300 jobs); construction (down 800 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for February 2020 was 3.4 percent, up slightly from the revised January 2020 rate of 3.3 percent. The United States unemployment rate for February 2020 was 3.5 percent, down slightly from the revised January 2020 rate of 3.6 percent. In February 2019, the U.S. seasonally adjusted rate was 3.8 percent while the state rate was 3.4 percent.

The not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in 36 counties, increased in 28 counties, and remained the same in 31 counties. Williamson County had the lowest rate at 2.6 percent, up from 2.5 percent in January. The highest rate was Clay County at 7.3 percent, unchanged from the revised unemployment rate in January.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2018 benchmark.



# Chattanooga MSA

Total nonfarm employment in the Chattanooga MSA increased by 2,700 jobs from January 2020 to February 2020. There was an increase in leisure & hospitality (up 900 jobs); government (up 700 jobs), which includes increases of 600 jobs in state government. This increase was partially offset by decreases of 300 jobs in professional/business services and 100 jobs in retail trade.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 4,900 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 500 jobs while service-providing jobs increased by 4,400 jobs.

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
### **Knoxville MSA**

Total nonfarm employment in the Knoxville MSA increased by 3,000 jobs from January 2020 to February 2020. There were increases in state government (up 1,300 jobs); professional/business services (up 500 jobs); financial activities and educational/health services (both up 400 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by decreases in local government (down 200 jobs) and retail trade (down 100 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 6,400 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,500 jobs while service-providing jobs increased by 4,900 jobs.

### **Memphis MSA**


Total nonfarm employment in the Memphis MSA increased by 5,000 jobs from January 2020 to February 2020. There were increases in government (up 2,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,000 jobs in state government; educational/health services (up 1,100 jobs); manufacturing and trade/transportation/utilities (both up 500 jobs).

This was partially offset by decreases in federal government (down 200 jobs); retail trade and leisure/hospitality (both down 100 jobs)

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 6,200 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 300 jobs, while service-providing jobs increased by 6,500 jobs.


### **Nashville MSA**

Total nonfarm employment in the Nashville MSA increased by 6,500 jobs from January 2020 to February 2020. There were increases in educational/health services (up 3,600 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,100 jobs in health care/social assistance; professional/scientific/technical services (up 1,600 jobs); durable goods manufacturing and government (both up 1,300 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by decreases in transportation/warehousing/utilities (down 1,400 jobs) and administrative/support/waste management (down 800 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 32,300 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 2,800 jobs, while service-providing increased by 29,500 jobs.
