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What Are Labor Surplus Areas?

Employers located in labor surplus areas, as defined by the U.S. Department of Labor, can be given preference in bidding on federal contracts. The purpose in providing such a preference is to help direct the government's procurement dollars into areas where people are in the most severe economic need, i.e., areas with the highest unemployment rate.

Labor surplus areas are classified on the basis of civil jurisdictions rather than on a metropolitan area or a labor market area basis. Civil jurisdictions are defined as all cities with a population

of at least 25,000 and all counties. A civil jurisdiction becomes a labor surplus area when its average unemployment rate was at least 20 percent above the average unemployment rate for all states (including the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico) during the previous two calendar years. During periods of high unemployment, the 20 percent ratio is disregarded, and an area is classified as a labor surplus area if its unemployment rate during the previous two calendar years was 10 percent or more. This 10 percent ceiling concept comes into operation whenever the twoyear average unemployment rate for all states

was 8.3 percent or above. Similarly, a "floor" concept of six percent is used during periods of low national unemployment in order for an area to qualify as a labor surplus area. The six percent "floor" comes into effect whenever the average unemployment rate for all states during the two-year reference period was five percent or less.

The U.S. Department of Labor issues the labor surplus area listing on a fiscal year basis. The 2005 listing becomes effective on October 1, 2005, and remains in effect until September 30, 2006. For more information go to the Department of Labor Internet site at www.doleta.gov.

• Per Capita Personal Income in Tennessee, Metro Areas, and Counties from 1999 to 2003. This shows the per capita personal income and the percentage change for each area.

AUGUST

• Births, Deaths, and Net Migration Components of Population Changes in Tennessee from 2000 to 2004. This shows the population changes by county by breaking out the components of that change.

SEPTEMBER

• Annual Average Labor Force Information for the Metro and Micro Areas. This gives labor force, employment, and unemployment data for the prior three years.

OCTOBER

• Annual Average Labor Force Information for the Tennessee Counties. This gives labor force, employment, and unemployment data for the prior two years. This is the same as the September article except it covers different areas (counties vs. MSAs).

NOVEMBER

• The American Community Survey 2004 Comparison Data for Tennessee. Household data collected yearly to help offset the long-form census data collected every 10 years.

DECEMBER

• The ACCRA Cost-of-Living Index for Third Quarter, 2005. This is the cost of living in selected U.S. cities as figured by a survey from the nation's Chambers of Commerce Research Associations.







NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for January 2006 was 5.1 percent, down 0.3 percent from the December 2005 rate. This is the 18th consecutive month that the rate is above the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 4.7 percent in January 2006. In January 2005, the national unemployment rate was 5.2 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5.9 percent.

Across Tennessee, the not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased in 93 counties and decreased in two counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 3.9 percent, up 0.9 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Clay County's 15.3 percent, up from 14.4 percent in December 2005.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 37,600 jobs from January 2005 to January 2006. During this period, there were increases in accommodation/food services (up 7,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 6,500 jobs in food services/drinking places; retail trade (up 7,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,200 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,400 jobs in both building material/garden equipment/supplies and health/personal care stores; health care/social assistance (up 6,600 jobs), which includes increases of 3,100 jobs in ambulatory health

care services and 2,000 jobs in hospitals; professional/business services (up 6,600 jobs), which includes increases of 3,000 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services and 2,600 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; construction (up 3,700 jobs); local government (up 2,300 jobs); wholesale trade (up 2,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; and truck transportation (up 1,200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in computer/electronic product manufacturing and food/beverage stores (both down 1,300 jobs).


During January, nonfarm employment decreased by 80,400 jobs. There were seasonal declines in retail trade (down 25,500 jobs), which includes drops of 5,400 jobs in general merchandise stores and 3,500 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; administrative/support/waste management (down 14,100 jobs); transportation/warehousing (down 7,500 jobs); accommodation/food services (down 7,300 jobs), which includes an decrease of 5,300 jobs in food services/drinking places; state and local governments (both down 4,600 jobs); and construction (down 4,000 jobs).

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2004 benchmark.

Chattanooga MSA

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 4,300 jobs from December 2005 to January 2006. There were seasonal decreases in retail trade (down 1,400 jobs), which includes a drop of 700 jobs in general merchandise stores; local government (down 500 jobs); leisure/hospitality (down 400 jobs), which includes a decline of 200 jobs in accommodation/food services; state government and educational/health services (both down 400 jobs); durable goods manufacturing and administrative/support/ waste management (both down 300 jobs); and federal government (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 3,900 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs declined by 100 jobs, while service-providing jobs increased by 4,000.



There were seasonal decreases in retail trade (down 1,400 jobs), which includes a decline of 800 jobs in general merchandise stores and 200 jobs in food/beverage stores; administrative/support/ waste management (down 1,400 jobs); local government (down 1,000 jobs); accommodation/ food services (down 800 jobs), which includes a drop of 500 jobs in food services/drinking places; educational/health services (down 400 jobs); and transportation/warehousing/utilities and wholesale trade (both down 300 jobs). This is partially offset by an increase in durable goods manufacturing (up 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 5,500 jobs. During this time, goods-producing jobs increased by 100, while service-providing jobs increased by 5,400.






