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## American Community Survey Updates 2000 Census Data

The American Community Survey (ACS) is a nationwide survey designed to provide communities a fresh look at how they are changing. It is intended to eliminate the need for the long form in the 2010 Census. The ACS collects information from U.S. households similar to what was collected on the Census 2000 long form, such as income, commute time to work, home value, veteran status, and other important data. As with the official U.S. census, information about individuals will remain confidential.

The ACS will collect and produce population and housing information every year instead of every 10 years. About 3 million households will be surveyed each year. Collecting data every year will reduce the cost of the official decennial census and will provide more upto-date information

throughout the decade about trends in the U.S. population at the local community level. A similar program is planned for Puerto Rico.

The ACS began in 1996 and has expanded each subsequent year. Data from the current ACS are available for over 7,000 geographies of 65,000 population or more, including all states, counties, cities, congressional districts, and American Indian/Alaskan native areas.

## **Tennessee Data**

The 2005 ACS data for areas with a population of 65,000 or more include demographic and social information, such as race, Hispanic origin, age, education, marital status, grandparents as caregivers, veterans, disability status, and U.S. citizenship.

Over the last five years in Tennessee, the population has increased by

121,307 (2.1 percent), with males accounting for 56 percent of the increase in the state during this period. From 2000 until 2005, the median age in the state has increased by 1.4 years. The biggest changes in the population in the last five vears were the increases in Hispanic or Latino (up 48,866 persons or 39 percent) and the foreign-born residents (up 64,114 persons or 40 percent).

The number of disabled persons declined as did the percentage of civilian veterans. The percentage of the population that completed high school and that completed college both increased during this period.







## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for July was 5.9 percent, up 0.3 tenths from the June rate. This is the 24th consecutive month that the rate is above the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 4.8 percent in July 2006. In July 2005, the national unemployment rate was 5.0 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5.5 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in 52 counties, decreased in 34 counties, and remained the same in nine counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 3.4 percent, down 0.2 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Lawrence County's 13.8 percent, up from 12.5 percent in June 2006.

During this period, there were increases in retail trade (up 7,400 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,200 jobs in general merchandise stores, 1,800 jobs in building material/garden equipment/supplies, and 1,300 in both health/personal care stores and motor vehicle/parts dealers; accommodation/food services (up 7,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 5,900 jobs in food services/drinking places and 1,200 jobs in accommodation; health care/social assistance (up 5,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,800 jobs in ambulatory health care services

and 2,100 jobs in hospitals; professional/business services (up 4,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,000 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; local government (up 3,100 jobs); construction (up 2,900 jobs); wholesale trade (up 1,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; arts/entertainment/recreation (up 1,700 jobs); and transportation/warehousing (up 1,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,100 jobs in truck transportation. This was partially offset by declines of 1,500 jobs in food/beverage stores and 1,100 jobs in

transportation equipment manufacturing and computer/electronic product manufacturing.


During July, nonfarm employment decreased by 19,000 jobs. There were seasonal declines in local government educational services (down 12,600 jobs), state government educational services (down 3,100 jobs), administrative/support/waste management (down 1,900 jobs), and food services/drinking places and motor vehicle parts manufacturing (both down 1,400 jobs). This was partially offset by an increase in arts/entertainment/recreation (up 1,000 jobs).

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2005 benchmark.

## Chattanooga MSA

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 100 jobs from June 2006 to July 2006. There were seasonal decreases in state government and financial activities (both down 200 jobs). This was partially offset by an increase in nondurable goods manufacturing (up 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 4,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,400, and service-providing jobs increased by 3,100.



During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 4,800 jobs. During that time, goodsproducing jobs increased by 100 jobs, while service-providing jobs increased by 4,700.





There were seasonal declines in local government (down 1,100 jobs); professional/business services (down 600 jobs), which includes a decline of 500 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; state government (down 300 jobs); and education/health services (down 200 jobs). This was partially offset by an increase in natural resources/mining/construction (up 200 jobs).

During the last 12 months, there was an increase of 7,400 jobs. During that time, goods-producing declined by 800, and service-providing jobs increased by 8,200.





There were seasonal increases in trade/transportation/utilities (up 1,200 jobs), which includes increases of 600 jobs in retail trade and 400 jobs in transportation/warehousing/ utilities; educational/health services (up 600 jobs), which includes an increase of 300 jobs in both educational services and hospitals; accommodation (up 600 jobs); arts/entertainment/recreation (up 400 jobs); and state government (up 300 jobs).

This was partially offset by declines in professional/scientific/technical services (down 600 jobs), food services/drinking places (down 500 jobs), local government and transportation equipment manufacturing (both down 400 jobs), and food/beverage stores (down 300 jobs).
