The Consumer Price Index

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a monthly survey of a market basket of goods and services that estimates the change in prices of that market basket. While the CPI is used as a cost-of-living index, it is not a straightforward measure of cost increases. A true cost-of-living index would also measure changes in the amount that consumers would spend to maintain their standard of living. The CPI does not measure the changes in consumer spending. It only measures the cost of the market basket surveyed. The CPI is commonly used as a means for adjusting income payments. Over 2 million workers are covered by collective bargaining agreements which tie wages to the CPI. The index affects the income of almost 80 million people as a result of statutory action: 47.8 million Social Security beneficiaries, about 4.1 million military and Federal Civil Service retirees and survivors, and about 22.4 million food stamp recipients.

Changes in the CPI also affect the cost of lunches for the 26.7 million children who eat lunch at school. Some private firms and individuals use the CPI to keep rents, royalties, alimony payments, and child support payments in line with changing prices.

The Market Basket of Goods

The CPI is an ongoing survey of the spending habits of about 7,000 families from around the country. This market basket of goods and services includes products from eight major groups and over 200 broad categories of spending.

The major categories included in the CPI are: food and beverage, including cereal, milk, coffee, and chicken; housing, including monthly housing costs and bedroom furniture; **apparel**, including shirts, sweaters, dresses and jewelry; transportation, including new vehicles, airline fares, gas and auto insurance; medical care, including glasses, drugs, medical supplies, doctors and hospital services; recreation, including television, pets and pet products, and sports equipment; education

and communication, including telephone and computer services, postage, and college tuition; and other goods and services, including smoking products, haircuts, funeral expenses, and other personal services. Sales and excise taxes, auto registration and water and sewage costs are government user fees that are included in the costs of other goods.

Taxes (such as income or Social Security taxes) are excluded from the CPI. Also excluded are stocks, bonds, real estate, and life insurance as these are not day-to-day expenditures.

The CPI also collects the prices of 80,000 consumer goods. This allows the CPI to understand actual costs of goods and how to compare those costs with the buying habits of consumers.

July 2021 Changes

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) rose 0.5 percent in July 2021 on a seasonally adjusted bases, following a 0.9 percent increase in June 2021. (See data on Page 2.) From July 2020 to July 2021, the all items index increased 5.4 percent before seasonal adjustment.

The index has risen at a 2.1-percent annual rate over the last 10 years. A sharp decline in the gasoline index, which fell 21.0 percent in 2014, was the main factor in the total rate of change decrease.

The all items index rose 5.4 percent for the 12 months ending July, the same increase as the period ending June. The index for all items less food and energy rose 4.3 percent over the last 12 months, while the energy index rose 23.8 percent. The food index increased 3.4 percent for the 12 months ending July, compared to a 2.4percent rise for the period ending June.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Pandemic Impact on July 2021 Consumer Price Index Data

Data collection by personal visit for the Consumer Price Index (CPI) program has been suspended since March 16, 2020. When possible, data normally collected by personal visit were collected either online or by phone. Additionally, data collection in July was affected by the temporary closing or limited operations of certain types of establishments. These factors resulted in an increase in the number of prices considered temporarily unavailable and imputed.

While the CPI program attempted to collect as much data as possible, many indexes are based on smaller amounts of collected prices than usual, and a small number of indexes that are normally published were not published this month. 



Nonfarm Employment & Labor Workforce Narrative

Total nonfarm employment increased by 151,600 jobs from July 2020 to July 2021. There were increases in professional & business services (up 41,300 jobs), which includes increases of 24,700 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; leisure & hospitality (up 38,100 jobs), which includes increases of 23,900 jobs in food services & drinking places; trade/ transportation/utilities (up 24,900), which includes increases of 13,000 jobs in transportation & warehousing; government (up 12,800 jobs), which includes increases of 10,300 jobs in local government; durable goods manufacturing (up 12,100 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by decreases in nursing & residential care facilities (down 3,500 jobs); truck transportation (down 1,800 jobs); construction of buildings (down 1,300 jobs); general merchandise stores (down 1,000 jobs); plastic & rubber products manufacturing (down 600 jobs).

During the past month, nonfarm employment decreased by 10,900 jobs. There were decreases in government (down 23,800 jobs), which include decreases of 23,400 jobs in local government educational services; retail trade (down 1,900 jobs), which includes decreases of 1,200 jobs in building material/garden equipment/ supplies; wholesale trade (down 1,400 jobs).

These decreases were partially offset by increases in leisure & hospitality (up 5,400 jobs), which includes increases of 3,300 jobs in food services & drinking places; professional & business services (up 4,700 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for July 2021 was 4.7 percent, down from the revised June 2021 rate of 4.9 percent. The United States unemployment rate for July 2021 was 5.4 percent, down from the revised June 2021 rate of 5.9 percent. In July 2020, the U.S. seasonally adjusted rate was 10.2 percent while the state rate was 8.9 percent.

The not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in 95 counties and increased in 1 county. Williamson County had the lowest rate at 2.7 percent, down from the revised June rate of 3.4 percent. The highest rate was Perry County at 10.4 percent, down from the revised unemployment rate of 13.0 percent in June.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, selfemployed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2020 benchmark.



Chattanooga MSA

Total nonfarm employment in the Chattanooga MSA decreased by 500 jobs from June 2021 to July 2021. There was a decrease in local government (down 800 jobs); financial activities and educational & health services (both down 200 jobs); retail trade and wholesale trade (both down 100 jobs). These decreases were partially offset by an increase in professional & business services (up 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 11,000 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 2,800 jobs while serviceproviding jobs increased by 8,200 jobs.





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
