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# Per Capita Personal Income in MSAs, 2002 to 2004

Personal income is the sum of net earnings by place of residence, rental income of persons, personal dividend and/or interest income, and transfer payments. Personal income is measured before the deduction of personal income taxes and other personal taxes and is reported in current dollars (no adjustment is made for price changes). Per capita personal income is the annual total personal income of residents divided by the resident population as of July 1. A metropolitan statistical area (MSA) is a geographic area consisting of a large population nucleus together with adjacent communities having a high degree of economic and social integration with the nu-

In the United States the per capita personal income, in 2004,was \$33,050, up from the \$31,484 of the previous year. This was a growth rate of 5 percent from 2003 to 2004. The metropolitan areas had a higher average per capita income than the nonmetropolitan areas. The per capita income of the former was \$34,668,

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while the latter was \$25,104 in 2004. In 2002, the per capita income in metro areas was \$32,414, while in nonmetro areas it was \$23,024.

### **Highest & Lowest Areas**

Page 2 contains a list of selected MSAs across the United States. The first and last eight MSAs represent the highest and lowest per capita cities. The cities in bold on the table are the Tennessee MSAs. The other cities included are major metropolitan areas and cities close to Tennesee's borders. This list is sorted by 2004 per capita personal income.

The cities with the highest per capita incomes were Bridgeport, CT; San Francisco; San Jose; Washington; Boston; Trenton, NJ; Boulder, CO; and New York City. This ranking remains unchanged from the previous year.

The cities with the lowest per capita incomes were McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, TX; Brownsville-Harlingen, TX; Laredo, TX; Yuma, AZ; Provo-Orem, UT; Hinesville-Ft. Stewart, GA; Hanford-Corcoran, CA; and St. George, UT.

### **Tennessee Cities**

The Nashville MSA has the highest per capita personal income in the state at \$34.904 (ranked 49 of 361). It is also the only Tennessee city above the national average. This per capita income is lower than Los Angeles, Dallas, Detroit, and Chicago but higher than Charlotte, St. Louis, Miami, and Atlanta. The Memphis MSA was next at \$32,741 (ranked 90). This was followed by Knoxville (ranked 149), Chattanooga (ranked 157), Clarksville (ranked 219), Jackson (ranked 226). Cleveland (ranked 255), Kingsport-Bristol (ranked 282), Johnson City (ranked 323), and Morristown (ranked 337). Clarksville had the largest two-year percentage growth of all Tennessee cities (up 11.8 percent), while Hinesville-Fort Stewart, GA, had the highest on the list at 17 percent over two years.







# NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for March was 5.1 percent, down 0.1 percent from the February rate. This is the 20th consecutive month that the rate is above the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 4.7 percent in March 2006. In March 2005, the national unemployment rate was 5.1 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5.6 percent.

Across Tennessee, the not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in 77 counties, increased in eight counties, and remained the same in 10 counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 3.3 percent, unchanged from the previous month. The highest rate was Clay County's 13.4 percent, down from 14.3 percent in February 2006.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 34,100 jobs from March 2005 to March 2006. During this period, there were increases in accommodation/food services (up 7,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 6,000 jobs in food services/drinking places and 1,200 jobs in accommodation; retail trade (up 7,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,200 jobs in general merchandise stores, 1,400 jobs in both building material/garden equipment/supplies and health/personal care stores, and 1,200 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers; health care/social assistance (up 6,500 jobs), which

includes an increase of 3,100 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 2,000 jobs in hospitals; professional/business services (up 4,400 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,000 jobs in professional/ scientific/technical services; construction (up 3,700 jobs); local government (up 2,400 jobs); wholesale trade (up 2,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,400 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; and arts/ entertainment/recreation (up 1,900 jobs). This was partially offset by declines of 1,300 jobs in both computer/electronic product manufacturing and food/beverage stores.

During March, nonfarm employment increased by 21,000 jobs. There were seasonal increases in accommodation/food services (up 5,400 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,600 jobs in food services/drinking places; retail trade (up 2,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,000 jobs in building material/ garden equipment/ supplies; construction (up 2,600 jobs); arts/entertainment/recreation (up 1,600 jobs); other services (up 1,400 jobs); and transportation/warehousing and professional/ business services (both up 1,300 jobs).



This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2005 benchmark.






