Tennessee Women and Minorities

The American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing survey conducted by the Bureau of the Census that provides yearly information about our nation and its people. The ACS randomly selects approximately 3.5 million addresses to survey each year. The demographic data shown on pages 2 and 3 are from the 2014 American Community Survey, 1-year-estimates. The data shows a number of social and economic characteristics by race and ethnicity in Tennessee.

The Census Bureau collects racial data based on self-identification. The five racial categories available are: White, Black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander. People may select more than one race, such as "White" and "Asian" to reflect a racial mixture. Respondents may also choose among several sub-categories of the five main groups or select "Some other race" and specify the other race.

American Indian and Native Hawaiian are not shown in these pages due to the small population of these groups in Tennessee. Hispanic or Latino is not considered a racial category. People who identify as such may be of any race. 'NA' denotes data that cannot be displayed due to small sample size, and '(X)' indicates data is not applicable or not available.

Female Statistics

The majority of the Tennessee population is female (51.3 percent), but females are a minority among people under 18 years of age. Of the female over 15 years-old population, over one-fourth (27.3 percent) have never married. Almost half of the Black over 15 population (48.8 percent) has never married. Forty percent of Tennessee births, in 2014, were to unmarried mothers. Unmarried women accounted for 68.5 percent of Black births, 32.8 percent of White births, and 30.7 percent of Hispanic births. Female households with no husband present had a poverty rate of 36.9 percent. Hispanic headed households with no husband present had a poverty rate of 65 percent despite having a lower rate of births to unmarried mothers compared to the White and Black populations.

Women had mean (average) earnings of \$41,629 (versus \$58,555 for males), while their median (mid-point) income was \$34,009 (versus \$41,661 for males).

Race and Ancestry

Foreign-born people account for 5.2 percent of Tennessee's population. Of the foreign-born, over three-fourths (76.6 percent) were born in either Latin America or Asia. Foreign-born males outnumber females in Tennessee. This is true for all racial groups except Asian.

A language other than English is spoken in seven percent of Tennessee homes. In 78 percent of Asian households and 73.4 percent of Hispanic households a language other than English is spoken. Asians report speaking English less than "very well" at a rate of 35.6 percent, while the Hispanic rate is 36 percent.

Twenty-five point two percent of Tennessee residents have a bachelor's degree or greater. Asian women have received a bachelor's degree or greater at the highest rate (50.2 percent), followed by white women at 26.2 percent. Asian women have the lowest unemployment rate (1.8 percent) compared to 4.5 percent for women in the labor force.

Looking at occupation groups, the largest share of Black or African American workers were employed in sales and office occupations (25.8 percent). Asian workers were most frequently employed in management/business/ science/arts occupations (45.5 percent). Hispanic workers were employed with almost equal frequency in service occupations (24.8 percent) and construction/maintenance occupations (24.5 percent).

Twelve percent of Tennesseans do not have health insurance while 17.6 percent receive SNAP benefits (food stamps). Among those classified as Other race, 43 percent were uninsured; 33.5 percent received food stamps; and 42.6 percent were in poverty.

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

NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 91,600 jobs from March 2015 to March 2016. There were large increases in professional/ business services (up 15,600 jobs), which includes increases of 8,400 jobs in administrative/ support/waste management and 4,000 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; health care/social assistance (up 14,000 jobs), which includes increases of 9,000 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 3,400 jobs in hospitals; retail trade (up 12,300 jobs), which includes increases of 2,900 jobs in food/beverage stores and 2,500 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers; and construction (up 10,900 jobs), which includes increases of 6,100 jobs in specialty trade contractors and 2,600 jobs in construction of buildings.

Smaller increases occurred in accommodation/ food services (up 8,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 7,500 jobs in food services/drinking places); wholesale trade (up 5,500 jobs), which includes increases of 2,200 jobs in nondurable goods and 2,100 jobs in durable goods; financial activities (up 4,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,200 jobs in finance/insurance; transportation equipment manufacturing (up 5,000 jobs); transportation/warehousing (up 4,800 jobs); and educational services (up 2,700 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline of 1,300 jobs in state government.

During March 2016, nonfarm employment increased by 13,200 jobs. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 5,300 jobs), which includes increases of 2,700 jobs in accommodation/food services and 2,600 jobs in arts/entertainment/recreation; health care/social assistance (up 3,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,200 jobs in ambulatory health care services; building materials/garden equipment/ supplies (up 1,500 jobs); and construction (up 1,000 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in administrative/support/waste management and local government educational services (both down 1,200 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for March 2016 was 4.5 percent, down 0.4 percentage point from the revised February 2016 rate. The United States unemployment rate in March was 5 percent, up 0.1 percentage point from the revised February 2016 rate.

In March 2015, the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.5 percent while the state rate was 6 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 92 counties, increased in Sequatchie County, and remained the same in both Lewis and Moore Counties. In March 2016, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 2.8 percent, down 0.2 percent from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Hancock County at 7.5 percent, down from 7.8 percent in February.



This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2015 benchmark.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 300 jobs from February 2016 to March 2016. There were increases in educational/health services and retail trade (both up 500 jobs). This was offset by a decline of 1,000 jobs in professional/ business services.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 7,600 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,600 while serviceproviding jobs increased by 6,000.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,600 jobs from February 2016 to March 2016. There were increases in leisure/ hospitality (up 800 jobs); professional/ business services (up 500 jobs); educational/health services and mining/ logging/construction (both up 300 jobs); and financial activities (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases of 400 jobs in both retail trade and state government.

Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 11,800 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 3,800 jobs, while serviceproviding jobs increased by 8,000.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 500 jobs from February 2016 to March 2016. There were increases in educational/ health services (up 1,500 jobs); leisure/ hospitality (up 400 jobs); and professional/ scientific/technical services and other services (both up 200 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by declines in administrative/support/waste management (down 900 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities (down 400 jobs); retail trade (down 300 jobs); and wholesale trade and financial activities (both down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 10,800 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 400, while service-providing jobs increased by 10,400.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 5,300 jobs from February 2016 to March 2016. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 1,600 jobs); educational/health services (up 1,400 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,100 jobs in health care/social assistance; professional/business services (up 800 jobs), which includes an increase of 600 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; mining/logging/construction (up 500 jobs); durable goods manufacturing and other services (both up 300 jobs); and information (up 200 jobs).

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During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 33,400 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 6,700, while service-providing jobs increased by 26,700.
