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Population Estimates for Counties in Tennessee, Census 2000 and 2005-2006

According to estimates published by the Bureau of the Census, the 2006 population of Tennessee was 6,038,803, up 83,058 (1.39 percent) from the previous July 1 estimate. (See the table on Page 2.)

The Population Division of the Census Bureau produces estimates of statewide and county populations each July 1. The methodology has remained unchanged for over two decades.

The most recent decennial census data from April 1, 2000, were used. The updated population estimates include births, deaths, internal migration, and international migration that have occurred from the census date to the date of the population estimate. For the net migration component, the bureau relies on the annual extract of tax returns to develop net migration rates for the population under age 65 for each county.

The largest county population increases in the past year were in Rutherford County (up 10,351), Williamson

County (up 7,336), Knox County (up 6,612), Shelby County (up 5,733), Sumner County (up 4,647), Davidson County (up 4,303), and Wilson County (up 3,564). These seven counties had a total population increase of 42,546, or 51.2 percent, of the entire state increase.

During the past year, Fayette County had the largest percentage increase (up 4.89 percent), followed by Williamson County (up 4.78 percent), Rutherford County (up 4.74 percent), and Wilson County (up 3.55 percent). Weakley County had the largest population decrease, declining by 250 persons from last year (down 0.74 percent). The largest percentage decline was the 1.83 percent drop in Lake County.

Since the 2000 Census, the largest growth counties were Rutherford County (up 48,806 persons), Williamson County (up 34,143 persons), and Knox County (up 29,935 persons). The largest percentage increases were in Williamson County (up 26.96 percent), Rutherford County (up 25.71 percent), Fayette County (up 25.33

percent), Wilson County (up 17.14 percent), and Bedford County (up 15.5 percent). Weakley County declined by 1,538, while Lake County dropped by 6.89 percent.

Weakley County had population declines for six consecutive years. Last year, 14 of the 95 counties saw population declines. Six of those declining counties are in West Tennessee, while five are in Middle Tennessee. The seven highest growth counties were urban or suburban areas.

There are five counties with a population greater than 200,000. They are Shelby (911,438), Davidson (578,698), Knox (411,967), Hamilton (312,905), and Rutherford (228,829). The seven counties with populations greater than 100,000 but less than 200,000 are Williamson (160,781), Sullivan (153,239), Sumner (149,416), Montgomery (147,114), Blount (118,186), Washington (114.316), and Wilson (104.035). The smallest counties are Pickett (4,855), Van Buren (5,448), and Hancock (6,713).







NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for November 2007 was 4.9 percent, up 0.3 percent from the October 2007 rate. This is the fifth month this calendar year that the current rate is greater than the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 4.7 percent in November 2007. In November 2006, the national unemployment rate was 4.5 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in 89 counties, decreased in four counties, and remained the same in two counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 3.6 percent, down 0.4 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Marshall County's 8.9 percent, up from 8.2 percent in October 2007.

(Continued from Page 5) Total nonfarm employment increased by 20,000 jobs from November 2006 to November 2007. During this period, there were increases in construction (up 7,000 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 5,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,900 jobs in ambulatory health care services; accommodation/food services (up 4,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,200 jobs in food services/drinking places; local government educational services (up 3,700 jobs); retail trade (up 2,600 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,200 jobs in building material/garden equipment/supplies and

1,100 jobs in general merchandise stores; wholesale trade (up 2,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,500 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; plastics/rubber products manufacturing (up 2,300 jobs); information (up 1,600 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,200 jobs in telecommunications; and arts/entertainment/recreation (up 1,500 jobs). This was partially offset by declines of 3,400 jobs in transportation equipment manufacturing; 1,700 jobs in textile mills/products/apparel; and 1,600 jobs in both clothing/clothing accessories stores and professional/business services.


During November, nonfarm employment increased by 11,900 jobs. The primary increases were seasonal upturns in retail trade (up 9,200 jobs), which includes increases of 4,500 jobs in general merchandise stores and 2,200 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; professional/business services (up 1,700 jobs); and local government educational services (up 1,100 jobs). This was partially offset by a seasonal decline in leisure/hospitality (down 2,700 jobs), which includes decreases of 1,500 jobs in arts/entertainment/recreation and 1,200 jobs in accommodation/food services.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables includes all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2006 benchmark.

Chattanooga MSA

Total nonfarm employment increased by 500 jobs from October to November. There was a seasonal increase in retail trade (up 900 jobs), which includes an increase of 400 jobs in general merchandise stores. This was partially offset by a decline of 500 jobs in leisure/hospitality, of which 300 job losses were in accommodation/food services.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 600 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs declined by 100, and service-providing jobs increased by 700.



This was partially offset by a decrease in natural resources/mining/construction (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 2,900 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 800, while service-providing jobs increased by 2,100.




