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## **Intercensal County Population Estimates**

After completing a census count the Bureau of the Census releases the compiled information collected. Those data are released in a piecemeal fashion over a two-to three-year time period based on the importance of the information. State population numbers were released first for reapportionment of Congress. This was followed by population by state, county, and metro area. The current data include some of the demographic information for that population. This article is part of an ongoing series of some of the newly released Census information. Complete data files are available on

www.census.gov.

Postcensal estimates (2000-2010) are produced by updating the resident population enumerated in the 2000 census. The intercensal estimates (2000-2010), used in this article, modify these previous estimates using the 2010 Census numbers. The intercensal estimates provide a consistent time series of population estimates that reflect the most recent census results. These estimates are used to determine historical trends for birth and death rates as well as inand out-migration. They are also used as a baseline for the American Community Survey.

County estimates were produced by demographic characteristic and for total population. State estimates were produced by summing the county estimates within each state. The national intercensal estimates were produced by demographic characteristic and summed to obtain the total U.S. population. Although not shown on page 2, this county population data are also available by demographic characteristics (age, sex, race, and Hispanic origin).

#### Tennessee's Numbers

During the past 10 years the population in Tennessee increased by 656,678 (11.5 percent). The counties with growth more than 20 percent were Williamson County (44.6 percent), Rutherford County (44.3 percent), Fayette County (33.4 percent), Wilson County (28.4 percent), Montgomery County (27.9 percent), Sevier County (26.2 percent), Sequatchie County (25.3 percent), Loudon County (24.2 percent), Sumner County (23.1 percent), and Robertson County (21.8 percent). It is interesting to note that only Montgomery and Sevier counties are not suburbs of a metropolitan area.

The counties with the greatest actual growth were Rutherford (80,575), Davidson (56,754), Williamson (56,533), Knox (50.342), Montgomery (37,606), Shelby (30,178), and Sumner (30,117). The three counties with the largest actual growth are all in the Nashville MSA. Their combined growth (193,862 people) was 29.5 percent of the entire growth in the state. The 13 counties that comprise the Nashville MSA had a 10year growth of 278,064 people. This was 42.3 percent of Tennessee's growth from 2000 to 2010.

Eight counties that had population declines during the first decade of this century. Led by Haywood County (-5.1 percent) the other counties that had a decrease in population include Grundy County (-4.3 percent), Carroll County (-3.1 percent), Hardeman County (-3 percent), Obion County (-2 percent), Lake County (-1.5 percent), Clay County (-1.2 percent), and Benton County (-0.3 percent). In actual numbers, the largest decline was Haywood County's 1,003 persons. Van Buren and Hancock counties each had the smallest growth. They each increased by 43 people in the past 10 years.



#### Unemployment Rates 1981-2010




#### UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTIVITIES (MOST RECENT AVAILABLE)

## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 25,300 jobs from September 2010 to September 2011. This includes seasonal increases in professional/ business services (up7,900 jobs), which includes increases of 3,300 jobs in professional/scientific/ technical services and 3,200 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; local government educational services (up 6,400 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 5,200 jobs), which includes increases of 3,400 jobs in nursing/residential care facilities and 1,600 jobs in ambulatory health care services; mining/ logging/construction (up 5,100 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (up 3,400 jobs); accommodation/food services (up 3,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,500 jobs in food services/drinking places; durable goods wholesalers (up 2,200 jobs); financial activities (up 2,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,200 jobs in finance/insurance; machinery manufacturing (up 1,900 jobs); and food/beverage stores (up 1,800 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in retail trade (down 4,400 jobs), which includes a drop of 1,500 jobs in gasoline stations; federal government (down 1,200 jobs); plastics/rubber products (down 1,000

During September, nonfarm employment increased by 18,500 jobs. This included seasonal increases in local government educational services (up 11,900 jobs); state government (up 8,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 5,400 jobs in state government educational services; and educational services (up 3,200 jobs). This was offset by decreases in accommodation/food services (down 3,000 jobs), which includes decreases of 1,800 jobs in accommodation and 1,200 jobs in food services/drinking places; arts/ entertainment/recreation (down 2,500 jobs); and administrative/support/ waste services (down 1,000 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for September 2011 was 9.8 percent, up 0.1 percent from the revised August 2011 rate.

The United States' unemployment rate was 9.1 percent in September 2011. In September 2010, the national unemployment rate was 9.6 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 9.4 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in 51 counties, decreased in 32 counties, and remained the same in 12 counties. There were 34 counties with an unemployment rate less than 10 percent, and three counties had a rate at or above 15 percent. In September, the lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 6.6 percent, up 0.2 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 19.5 percent, down from 19.7 percent in August 2011.

Over the past 12 months, Obion County had the greatest increase in its unemployment rate (up 7.7 percent), while the largest unemployment rate decline was in Marshall County (down 1.3 percent).

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2010 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 900 jobs from August 2011 to September 2011. There were seasonal increases in state government (up 800 jobs) and local government (up 600 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in trade/transportation/utilities (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 700 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 500, while service-providing jobs increased by 1,200.



Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 800 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 200, while service-providing jobs increased by 600.



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Total nonfarm employment increased by 600 jobs from August 2011 to September 2011. There were seasonal increases in state government (up 1,500 jobs), educational/health services (up 1,300 jobs), local government (up 1,000 jobs), and transportation/warehousing/ utilities (up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by seasonal declines in leisure/hospitality (down 1,400 jobs); administrative/support/ waste management (down 1,300 jobs); retail trade and mining/logging/construction (both down 400 jobs); and durable goods manufacturing (down 300 jobs).




