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## Kids Count: The State of the Child in Tennessee

If "children are our greatest resource," then the work that one does to protect and grow that resource is of great value to our society. The Tennessee Commission on Children and Youth quantified those attempts in its publication "Kids Count: The State of the Child in Tennessee."

## History

The beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century produced the passage of the first state laws monitoring child abuse and neglect. Also, the first national conference on the needs of dependent children was convened with the first federal children's bureau.

The Social Security Act of 1935 authorized the first federal grants for child welfare services. The Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA), originally passed in 1974, brought national attention to the need to protect vulnerable children in the United States. CAPTA provides federal funding to states in support of prevention, assessment, investigation, prosecution, and treatment activities. CAPTA also sets forth a minimum definition of child abuse and neglect.

Similar to the old bridges in this country, the public social services structures have become stressed over the years. Many state child welfare systems, with insufficient funding, experience high rates of staff turnover and difficulty finding and retaining foster parents and identifying permanent placement for children.

In Tennessee, only 19.7 percent of federal dollars for child welfare can be spent flexibly to serve children and families. This amounts to approximately \$17.4 million dollars out of a total of \$88.2 million in child welfare in 2008.

## The Data

Looking at the specific Tennessee data by county, we have chosen four different types of measures to look at in this *Labor Market Report*. The actual publication has 40 different tables of information from median income to dropout rates to numbers of doctors, all by county.

Free or reduced school lunch participation was extremely interesting as almost four in 10 school children (348,285) participated in this program. The counties with the highest percent school lunch participation were all suburban counties of Memphis: Haywood (67.7 percent), Fayette (63.8 percent), and Lauderdale (61.7 percent). The lowest were all suburban counties of Nashville: Williamson (8.2 percent), Sumner (20.8 percent), and Wilson (21.3 percent). It should be noted that the number of free lunches provided in both Davidson and Shelby counties were 29.7 percent of the total.

There were 4,150 teen pregnancies in 2006. This is 35 per 1,000 population. The counties with the highest teen pregnancy rate were Rhea (53 per 1,000), Shelby (49.6), Davidson (48.6), and Henderson (47.9). The lowest were Pickett and Van Buren counties (both with 0), Monroe (4.1), and Hancock and Williamson (both with 6.6). Shelby County had over onequarter of all Tennessee teen pregnancies in 2006.

Child abuse and neglect and teen violent deaths are particularly disturbing as both categories are attacks on the safety of our children. The highest teen violent deaths occurred in Hancock (429.2 per 100,000), Houston (371.1), and picket (301.2) counties. There were 20 counties with no violent deaths. There were 17.067 cases of child abuse and/or neglect in Tennessee in 2006. There were 2,192 in Shelby County, 1,646 in Davidson County, 781 in Knox County, and 691 in Sullivan County.





### Unemployment Rates 1979-2008





## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 114,200 jobs from September 2008 to September 2009. During this period, there were large seasonal decreases in mining/construction (down 28,900 jobs); retail trade (down 13,600 jobs), which includes declines of 3,600 jobs in general merchandise stores and 2,700 in motor vehicle/parts dealers; administrative/support/waste management (down 11,500 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (down 9,700 jobs); transportation/ warehousing (down 8,400 jobs), which includes a drop of 6,200 jobs in truck transportation; financial activities (down 6,600 jobs), which includes a decrease of 4,400 jobs in finance/insurance; wholesale trade (down 5,900 jobs), which includes a decline of 4,000 jobs in durable goods wholesalers; fabricated metal product manufacturing (down 4,400 jobs); plastics/rubber products manufacturing (down 3,600 jobs), which includes a drop of 1,900 jobs in rubber product manufacturing; accommodation/food services (down 3.200 jobs). which includes a drop of 4,700 jobs in accommodation and an increase of 1,500 jobs in food services/drinking places; and information (down 2,600 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in health care/social assistance (up 7.6 00 jobs), which includes an increase of 5,100 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 3,300 jobs in hospitals; local government (up 2,800 jobs); and 1,200 jobs in federal government.

During September, nonfarm employment increased by 11,000 jobs. The largest seasonal increases were in local government educational services (up 9,400 jobs); professional/business services (up 6,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,400 jobs in administrative/ support/waste management; state government educational services (up 3,900 jobs); educational services (up 2,200 jobs); finance/insurance (up 1,800 jobs); and wholesale trade (up 1,200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in retail trade (down 5,500 jobs), which includes a drop of 1,800 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,500 jobs in clothing/ clothing accessories stores; and leisure/hospitality (down 4,600 jobs), which includes a drop of 3,000 jobs in arts/entertainment/recreation and 1,600 jobs in accommodation/food services.

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for September 2009 was 10.5 percent, down 0.2 percent from the August rate. This is the 26th consecutive month that the current rate is greater than or equal to the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 9.8 percent in September 2009. In September 2008, the national unemployment rate was 6.2 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 6.9 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 83 counties, increased in 11 counties, and remained the same in one county. There were 22 counties with an unemployment rate less than 10 percent, and 10 counties had unemployment rates greater than 15 percent. The lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 6.9 percent, down 0.3 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Lauderdale County's 18.9 percent, down from 19.7 percent in August 2009.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2008 benchmark.



This was partially offset by a decline in accommodation/food services (down 600 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm jobs decreased by 7,800. During that time, goods-producing dropped by 4,100 jobs while service-providing declined by 3,700.





This was partially offset by increases in administrative/support/waste management (up 700 jobs), local government (up 500 jobs), and transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 200 jobs).



Total nonfarm employment increased by 600 jobs from August 2009 to September 2009. There were seasonal gains in local government (up 2,000 jobs); state government and administrative/support/waste management  $% \left( \frac{1}{2} \right) = 0$ (both up 800 jobs); educational/health services (up 500 jobs), which includes an increase of 400 jobs in educational services; and other services (up 300 jobs).

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This was partially offset by declines in retail trade (down 1,000 jobs), which includes a drop of 300 jobs in general merchandise stores; food services/drinking places (down 800 jobs); durable goods manufacturing (down 700 jobs); arts/entertainment/recreation (down 600 jobs); financial activities and professional/scientific/ technical services (both down 300 jobs); and mining/ construction (down 200 jobs).

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
