Per Capita Personal Income by County and MSA

In Tennessee, the per capita personal income in 2008 was \$34,833, up 1.98 percent from the previous year.

The Tennessee metropolitan counties had a per capita income of \$37,426 in 2008. During the same period, the nonmetropolitan counties had a per capita personal income of \$27,687.

Per capita personal income is the annual total personal income of residents divided by the residential population as of July 1. Personal income is derived by summing the net earnings by place of residence, person's rental income, personal dividend/ interest income, and transfer payments. Personal income excludes income tax deductions and other personal taxes and is reported in current dollars. In simpler terms, it is the total income on the front page of your 1040 tax form. This data can be influenced by large growth (or decline) in population, natural disasters (i.e., flooding or hurricanes), commuting populations (those that primarily work in other

counties), and state and local taxes.

County Data

In 2008, the Tennessee counties with the highest per capita personal income were Williamson (\$55,717), Davidson (\$44,228), Shelby (\$41,598), Hamilton (\$38,460), Montgomery (\$38,270), Wilson (\$37,040), Knox (\$36,342), Fayette (\$36,287), and Loudon (\$35,546). The remaining 86 counties are all below the state average. The lowest counties were Hancock (\$18,365), Lake (\$20,745), Wayne (\$21,024), Johnson (\$21,646), Scott (\$22,000), Lauderdale (\$22,581), Bledsoe (\$22,849), Cocke (\$22,961), and Grundy (\$22,980).

The counties with the largest percentage growth during the past year were Haywood (up 9.04 percent), Lake (up 8.66 percent), Carroll (up 7.44 percent), Hardeman (up 6.1 percent), and Trousdale (up 6.08 percent). Counties with per capita income decline include Perry (down 1.54 percent), Cannon (down 0.34 percent), McMinn (down 0.32 percent), and Monroe and

Wilson (both down 0.02 percent).

Since 2005, the counties with the largest increases in per capita income were Johnson (up 19.3 percent), Lake (up 19.04 percent), Hardeman (up 18.49 percent), and Montgomery (up 18.03 percent). During this period, 17 counties increased less than 8 percent. The counties with the smallest increases were Marshall (up 3.29 percent), Perry (up 3.41 percent), and Maury (up 4.82 percent).

Metro Data

The metropolitan statistical area (MSA) with the highest per capita income in 2008 was Nashville (\$39,768), while the lowest was Morristown (\$27,415 up 2.48 percent). The largest one-year increase was in the Clarksville MSA (up 7.54 percent), while the smallest increase was in Nashville (up 0.99 percent).



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Unemployment Rates 1980-2009




UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTIVITIES (MOST RECENT AVAILABLE)

NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 15,900 jobs from September 2009 to September 2010. This includes seasonal increases in administrative/support/waste management (up 10,400 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 8,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,700 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 2,100 jobs in nursing/residential care facilities; retail trade (up 6,800 jobs); educational services (up 2,800 jobs); and fabricated metal products (up 2,400 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in mining/logging/construction (down 5,400 jobs), transportation/warehousing (down 5,000 jobs), information (down 3,400 jobs), finance/insurance (down 2,700 jobs), transportation equipment (down 1,700 jobs), and state government (down 1,500 jobs).

During September, nonfarm employment increased by 16,700 jobs. The largest seasonal increases were in local government educational services (up 8,100 jobs); educational/health services (up 7,500 jobs), which includes an increase of 6,100 jobs in educational services and 1,400 jobs in health care/social assistance; state government educational services (up 5,500 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 1,400 jobs); and transportation/warehousing (up 1,300 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in leisure/hospitality (down 3,000 jobs), which includes a decline of 2.700 jobs in arts/ entertainment/recreation; federal government (down 1,600 jobs); and wholesale trade durable goods (down 1,000 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for September 2010 was 9.4 percent, down 0.2 percentage points from the August 2010 rate. This is the second month in a row that the current rate is less than or equal to the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 9.6 percent in September 2010. In September 2009, the national unemployment rate was 9.8 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 10.8 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 85 counties, increased in seven counties, and remained the same in three counties. There were 45 counties with an unemployment rate less than 10 percent and two counties had a rate above 15 percent. The lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 6 percent, down 0.3 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 19.9 percent, up from 19.8 percent in August 2010.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2009 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,400 jobs from August 2010 to September 2010. There were seasonal increases in state government (up 900 jobs), educational/health services (up 600 jobs), and retail trade, transportation/warehousing/utilities, and financial activities (each up 200 jobs).) This was partially offset by decreases in leisure/hospitality (down 700 jobs) and professional/business services (down 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 2,900 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 700, while service-providing jobs increased by 2,200.





Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,400 jobs from August 2010 to September 2010. There were seasonal increases in state government (up 1,600 jobs); professional/business services (up 1,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 800 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; educational/health services and local government (both up 500 jobs); and transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in durable goods manufacturing (down 1,000 jobs), leisure/hospitality (down 800 jobs), federal government (down 400 jobs), and other services (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 7,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 3,000, while service-providing jobs declined by 4,500.





Total nonfarm employment increased by 3,500 jobs from August 2010 to September 2010. There were seasonal increases in local government (up 3,000 jobs), state government and educational services (both up 1,100 jobs), and administrative/support/waste management, leisure/hospitality, and transportation/warehousing/utilities (each up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in mining/logging/construction, federal government, and financial activities (each down 400 jobs); retail trade and durable goods manufacturing (both down 300 jobs); and wholesale trade and other services (both down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 4,300 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 3,600, while service-providing jobs declined by 700.
