Per Capita Personal Income by State 2000-2014

In Tennessee, the per capita personal income in 2014 was \$40,654, up from \$35,426 in 2010 (the last Census). In 2014, Tennessee had the 35th highest per capita personal income in the country. In 2010, Tennessee was ranked 37th. At the turn of the century, Tennessee was ranked 35th (\$27,483) while in 1990 Tennessee was ranked 37th (\$16,733). The per capita income in the United States in 2014 was \$46,129, up from \$44,765 the previous year.

What Is Per Capita Income

Per capita personal income is the annual total personal income of the residents in each state divided by the population of the state. The Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) uses the Census Bureau's annual midyear population estimates. The **total personal income** is derived by summing the net earnings by place of residence, any rental income, dividend and interest income, and transfer payments. Personal income is measured prior to the deduction of state and federal income tax as well as other personal taxes. All income is reported in current dollars. In simpler terms, it is the total income on the front page of your 1040 tax form. The per capita personal income can be influenced by large growth/decline in population, natural disasters, commuting populations (those that primarily work in other counties), and state and local taxes.

A good example is Louisiana. In 2000, the per capita income was \$23,552 (ranked 47th in the U.S.). In 2010 it was \$37,199, which was the 30th highest ranking. The increase was due, in part, to hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Many people who lost their homes and businesses left the state, causing both the total income and population to decrease while the per capita income increased.

Transfer payments affect total personal income. In 2014, national personal transfer receipts grew by 4.5 percent. Medicaid transfer receipts increased 13.6 percent in the 26 states where coverage expanded under the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and 7.3 percent in the states where coverage

did not expand. The transfer payments are the government subsidy for the increase in Medicare disbursements. Per capita income in states that expanded coverage had greater increases in 2014 than states without expanded coverage.

State Per Capita Income

In 2014, the states with the highest per capita income were the District of Columbia (\$76,532), Connecticut (\$62,467), Massachusetts (\$59,182), New Jersey (\$56,807), New York (\$56,231), and Maryland (\$55,143). All these states adopted ACA. The poorest states (measured by per capita personal income) were Mississippi (\$34,333), West Virginia (\$36,644), South Carolina (\$36,934), Alabama (\$37,493), Idaho (\$37,533), and New Mexico (\$37,605). Four of the lowest seven states are located in the southeast. Virginia is the only southeastern state above the national average.

Since 1990, the District of Columbia and Connecticut were the two areas with the highest per capita income. In 1990, Massachusetts was ranked fifth and has slowly risen to third. Since 1990, Mississippi, West Virginia, and Arkansas were unchanged as the three states with the lowest per capita income. Utah has been in the bottom six for thirty years.

States with the largest population were California (38,802,500), Texas (26,956,958), Florida (19,893,297), New York (19,746,227), Illinois (12,880,580), and Pennsylvania (12,787,209). These six states accounted for 41.1 percent of the total U.S. population. There are six states and Washington, D.C. that have less than one million residents. They are Wyoming (584,153), Vermont (626,562), D.C. (658,893), Alaska (736,732), North Dakota (739,482), South Dakota (853,175), and Delaware (935,614).

In Tennessee the per capita income increased by 2.8 percent from 2013 to 2014. During that same period the population grew 0.8 percent. Since the 2010 Census the per capita income increased \$5,228 (14.8 percent) while the population, at the same time, increased 192,669 (3.0 percent). From 2000 to 2014 the per capita income increased 47.9 percent while the population increased 14.8 percent.

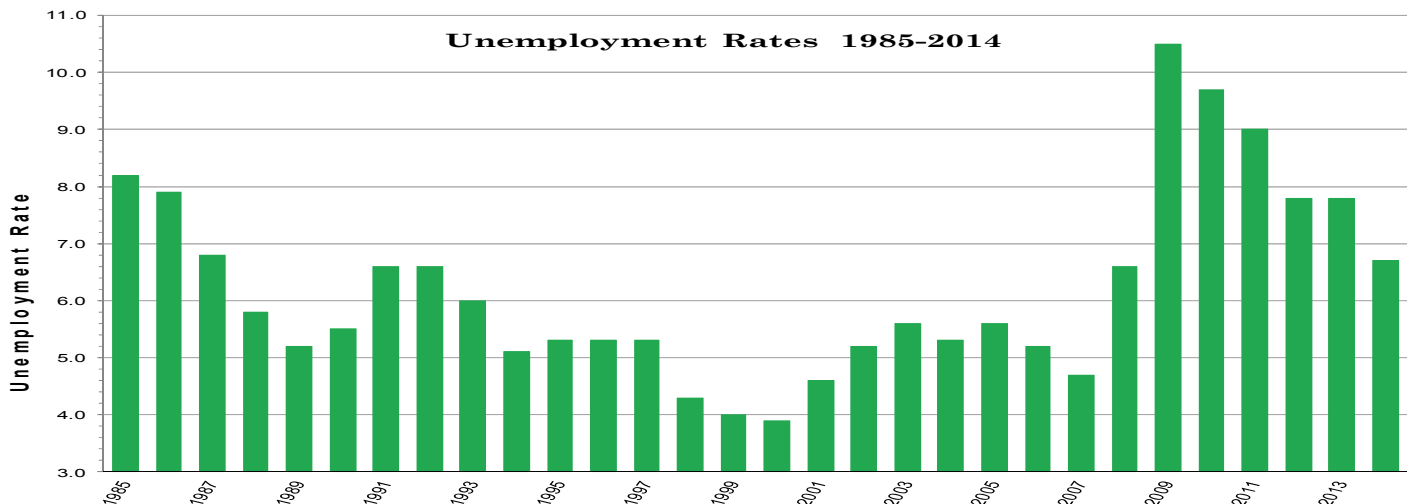

NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 53,700 jobs from May 2014 to May 2015. There were large increases in professional/business services (up 8,600 jobs), which includes increases of 4,700 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 2,500 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; accommodation/food services (up 7,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 6,900 jobs in food services/drinking places; and retail trade (up 7,600 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,700 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers. There were smaller increases in health care/social assistance (up 5,200 jobs), which includes increases of 3,100 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 1,500 jobs in hospitals; mining/logging/construction (up 4,300 jobs); transportation/warehousing (up 3,700 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (up 3,600 jobs); educational services (up 3,300 jobs); wholesale trade (up 2,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,400 jobs in durable goods wholesalers; arts/entertainment/recreation (up 2,600 jobs); financial activities (up 2,400 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in finance/insurance; and local government educational services (up 1,500 jobs). These increases were partially offset by declines of 1,800 jobs in other services and 1,500 jobs in federal government.

During May 2015, nonfarm employment increased by 15,200 jobs. There were increases in accommodation/food services (up 5,000 jobs), which included increases of 2,700 jobs in food services/drinking places and 2,300 jobs in accommodation; arts/entertainment/recreation (up 4,800 jobs); professional/business services (up 3,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 5,200 jobs in administrative/support/waste management combined with a decline of 2,600 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; local government (up 2,700 jobs); retail trade (up 2,400 jobs); mining/logging/construction (up 2,100 jobs); and wholesale trade (up 1,900 jobs). This was partially offset by declines of 6,500 jobs in state government and 2,200 jobs in educational services.

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for May 2015 was 5.8 percent, down 0.2 percentage point from the revised April 2015 rate. The United States unemployment rate in May was 5.5 percent, up 0.1 percentage point from the revised April 2015 rate.

In May 2014, the national unemployment rate was 6.3 percent while the state rate was 6.5 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in 92 counties, declined in Jackson County, and remained the same in two counties. There were 10 counties with a rate lower than 5 percent. In May 2015, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 4.1 percent, up 0.4 percentage point from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Hancock County at 9.9 percent, up from 8.5 percent in April.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2014 benchmark.

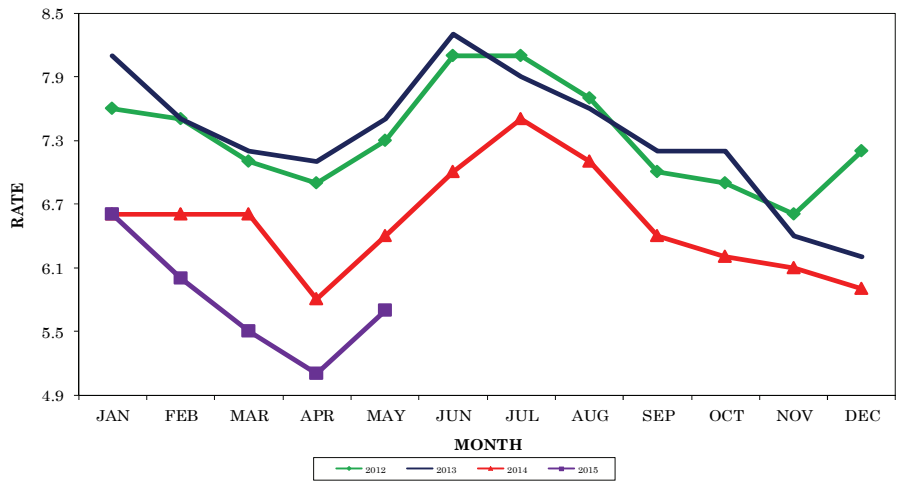

Total nonfarm employment increased by 800 jobs from April 2015 to May 2015. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 800 jobs), retail trade (up 400 jobs), and professional/business services (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines of 600 jobs in state government and 200 jobs in financial activities.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 7,600 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 900 while service-providing industries jobs increased by 6,700.

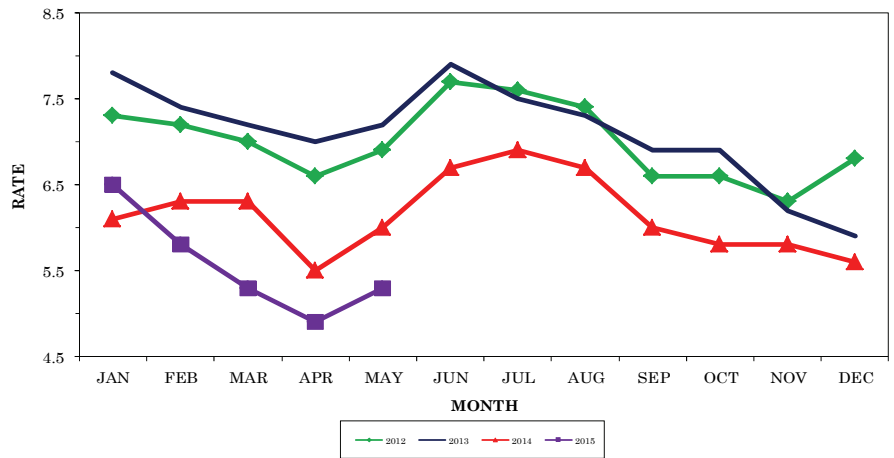

Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,700 jobs from April 2015 to May 2015. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 1,100 jobs); local government (up 700 jobs); mining/logging/construction (up 500 jobs); retail trade and educational/health services (both up 400 jobs); and manufacturing (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in professional/business services (down 1,100) jobs and state government (down 500 jobs).

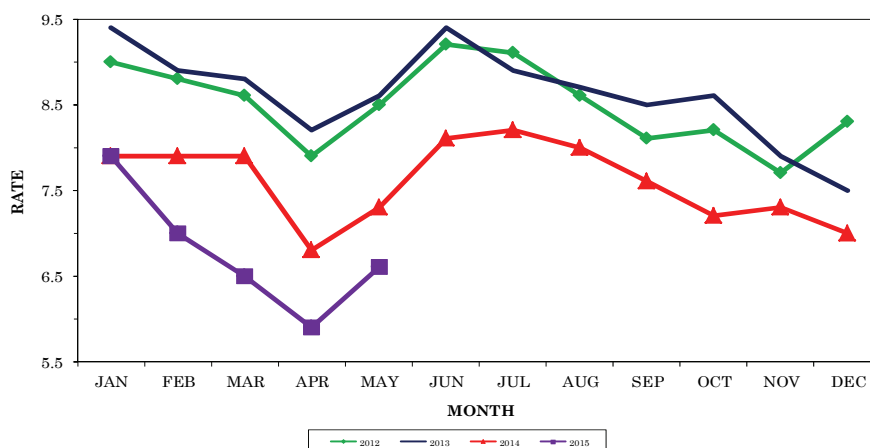

Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,100 jobs from April 2015 to May 2015. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 2,700 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 2,300 jobs); financial activities (up 700 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 600 jobs); and wholesale trade and local government (both up 300 jobs).

This was partially offset by decreases in state government (down 1,900 jobs), professional/scientific/technical services (down 900 jobs), educational/health services (down 700 jobs); retail trade (down 400 jobs); and mining/logging/construction (down 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 6,000 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs declined by 1,200, while service-providing jobs increased by 7,200.

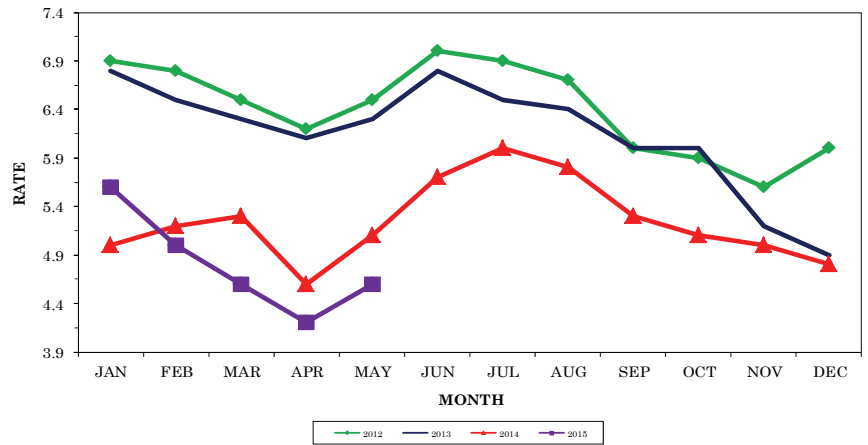

Total nonfarm employment increased by 7,900 jobs from April 2015 to May 2015. There were seasonal increases in leisure/hospitality (up 3,900 jobs), retail trade (up 1,400 jobs), administrative/support/waste management (up 1,200 jobs), mining/logging/construction (up 1,100 jobs), local government (up 900 jobs), wholesale trade (up 700 jobs), and other services (up 400 jobs).

These were partially offset by declines in state government (down 700 jobs); educational/health services (down 500 jobs), which includes a decrease of 1,100 jobs in educational services combined with an increase of 600 jobs in health care/social assistance; and durable goods manufacturing, information, and professional/scientific/technical services (each down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 27,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 5,600, while service-providing jobs increased by 21,900

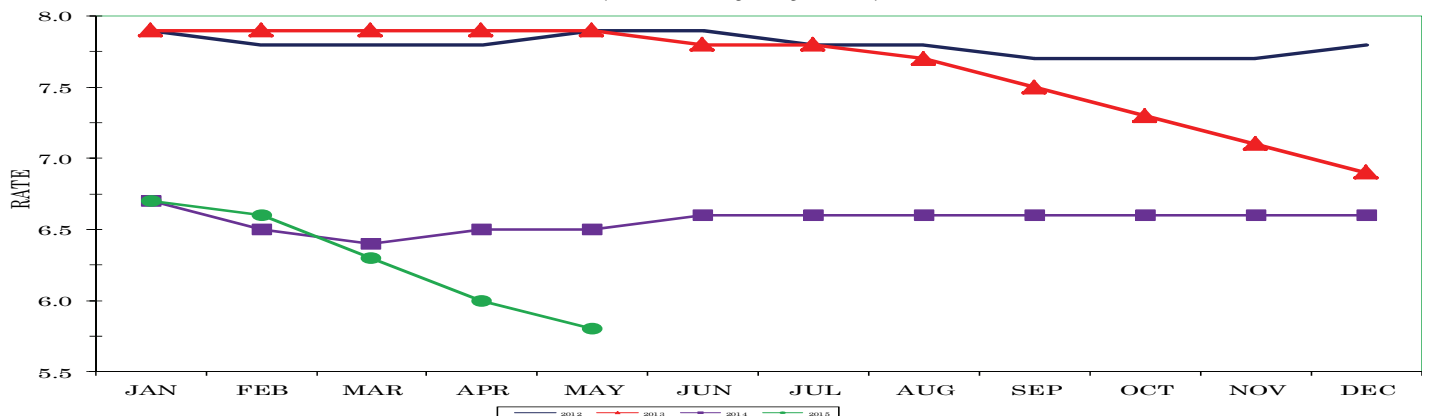
