## The Labor Market Report

## May Labor Force Estimates by MSA

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that unemployment rates were lower in May than a year earlier in 298 of the 388 metropolitan areas, higher in 66 areas, and unchanged in 24 areas. Fifty-seven areas had jobless rates of less than 3.0 percent and two areas had rates of at least 10.0 percent. The national unemployment rate in May was 4.1 percent, not seasonally adjusted, down from 4.5 percent a year earlier.

On page two is a modified list of metropolitan areas. Included in this list are the five Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) with the most and least people in the labor force and the MSAs with the highest and lowest May preliminary unemployment rates. All Tennessee metro areas are included as well as other large MSAs.

## MSA Unemployment, NSA

In May, Ames, Iowa; Bismarck, North Dakota; and Fargo, North DakotaMinnesota, had the lowest unemployment rates at 1.9 percent each, closely followed by Fort Collins, Colorado at 2.0 percent. The two MSAs with unemployment rates greater than 10 percent were El Centro, California ( 20.5 percent) and Yuma, Arizona (18.9 percent). A total of 194 areas had May jobless rates below the U.S. rate of 4.1 percent, 181 areas had rates above it, and 13 areas had rates equal to the nation.

Beckley, West Virginia had the largest over-the-year unemployment rate decrease in May (-2.4 percentage points), followed by Casper, Wyoming (-2.3 points). The largest over-the-year rate increase occurred in Toledo, Ohio ( +1.2 percentage points).

Of the 51 metropolitan areas with a 2010 Census population of 1 million or more, Denver-Aurora-Lakewood, Colo-
rado and Nashville-DavidsonMurfreesboro, Tennessee had the lowest unemployment rates ( 2.3 percent) in May. Of the cities with a large population, Cleveland-Elyria, Ohio, had the highest jobless rate at 5.8 percent. The largest monthly decreases occurred in Birmingham-Hoover, Alabama; Chicago-Naperville-Elgin, Illinois-IndianaWisconsin; Indianapolis-CarmelAnderson, Indiana; and Portland-Vancouver-Hillsboro, OregonWashington (-1.2 percentage points each). The largest over-the-year rate increase was in Cleveland-Elyria, Ohio (+0.9 percentage point).

## MSA Nonfarm Employment

In May, 304 metropolitan areas had over -the-year increases in nonfarm payroll employment, 77 had decreases, and 6 had no change. The largest over-the-year employment increases occurred in New York-Newark-Jersey City, New YorkNew Jersey-Pennsylvania ( $+151,500$ ), Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington, Texas (+115,800), and Atlanta-Sandy SpringsRoswell, Georgia ( $+81,900$ ). The largest over-the-year decreases in employment occurred in Houma-Thibodaux, Louisiana ( $-4,200$ ), Shreveport-Bossier City, Louisiana $(-3,000)$, and Rochester, New York (-2,700).

Over the year, nonfarm employment rose in 47 of the 51 metropolitan areas with a 2010 Census population of 1 million or more, and fell in 3. The largest over-theyear percentage increases in employment in these large metropolitan areas occurred in Nashville-DavidsonMurfreesboro, Tennessee and Orlando-Kissimmee-Sanford, Florida ( +4.0 percent each). The greatest over-the-year percentage decreases occurred in Rochester, New York ( -0.5 percent) and New Orleans-Metairie, Louisiana ( -0.3 percent).

## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT \& LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 60,000 jobs from May 2016 to May 2017. There were large increases in administrative/support/waste management (up 9,100 jobs); construction (up 7,700 jobs), which includes increases of 5,100 jobs in specialty trade contractors and 1,600 jobs in construction of buildings; and state government (up 7,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 6,000 jobs in state government educational services.

There were smaller increases in retail trade (up 5,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,100 jobs in general merchandise stores combined with a decline of 1,200 jobs in food/beverage stores; accommodation/food services (up 4,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,900 jobs in food services/drinking places; health care/social assistance (up 4,600 jobs), which includes increases of 3,400 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 2,300 jobs in hospitals, combined with a decline of 1,800 jobs in nursing/ residential care facilities; financial activities (up 3,900 jobs), which includes increases of 2,100 jobs in real estate/rental/leasing and 1,800 jobs in finance/insurance; wholesale trade (up 2,200 jobs); and local government and transportation equipment manufacturing (both up 2,100 jobs).

During May 2017, nonfarm employment increased by 2,900 jobs. There were increases in administrative/support/waste management (up 3,800 jobs); arts/entertainment/recreation (up 2,600 jobs); accommodation/food services (up 2,400 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,800 jobs in food services/drinking places; financial activities and construction (both up 1,500 jobs); and wholesale trade and local government (both up 1,100 jobs).

This was partially offset by declines in educational/health services (down 4,600 jobs), which includes a drop of 3,800 jobs in educational services; state government educational services (down 3,900 jobs); professional/scientific/technical services (down 3,700 jobs); transportation/warehousing (down 1,500 jobs); and food/beverage stores (down 1,000 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for May 2017 was 4.0 percent, down 0.7 percentage point from the revised April 2017 rate. The United States unemployment rate in May 2017 was 4.3 percent, down 0.1 percentage point from the revised April 2017 rate. In May 2016, the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7 percent while the state rate was 4.6 percent.

The unemployment rate decreased in 94 counties and was unchanged in Cannon County. Cocke County had the largest decrease (down 2.1 percent). In May, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 2 percent, down 0.6 percentage point from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Rhea County at 5.1 percent, down from 6.6 percent in April.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12 th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. Total nonfarm employment in Chattanooga decreased by 900 jobs from declines in state government (down 900 jobs), leisure/hospitality (down 400 jobs), and transportation/warehousing/utilities and educational/health services (both down 200 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in retail trade and local government (both up 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 6,400 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,600 while service-providing jobs increased by 4,800 .

Total nonfarm employment in Knoxville increased by 2,700 jobs from April 2017 to May 2017. There were increases in professional/business services (up 1,000 jobs); leisure/hospitality (up 900 jobs); financial activities (up 400 jobs); and local government, durable goods manufacturing, and mining/logging/ construction (each up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in state government (down 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 2,600 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 500 while service-providing jobs increased by 2,100 .

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 1,800 jobs from April 2017 to May 2017. There were decreases in educational/health services (down 1,000 jobs), professional/ scientific/technical services (down 800 jobs), transportation/warehousing/utilities (down 500 jobs), and durable goods manufacturing (down 300 jobs). This was partially offset by increases of 2,100 jobs in administrative/support/waste management, 800 jobs in leisure/hospitality, and 200 jobs in both other services and mining/logging/ construction.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 8,600 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 2,900 , while service-providing jobs increased by 5,700 .

Total nonfarm employment increased by 3,800 jobs from April 2017 to May 2017. There were increases in administrative/support/waste management (up 2,100 jobs); leisure/hospitality (up 1,900 jobs); educational services (up 1,000 jobs); financial activities (up 700 jobs); wholesale and retail trade (each up 500 jobs); and other service (up 200 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by declines in professional/scientific/technical services (down 1,800 jobs), health care/social assistance (down 800 jobs), durable goods manufacturing (down 400 jobs), and mining/logging/construction (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 37,500 jobs. During that time, goodsproducing jobs increased by 6,200 , while serviceproviding jobs increased by 31,300 .
