

The U.S. Census Bureau sponsors and conducts the Census of State Governments. This survey deals primarily with the finances of state governments and is a component of the Annual Survey of State and Local Government Finances. The data in this table are based on information from public records and contain no confidential data.

The state government data in this table are from a survey of all state governments and are not subject to sampling error. The 2014 local government data in this table are from a sample of local governments, and as such, are subject to sampling variability. The state data presented may differ from data published by state governments due to differences in which organizations are considered "state government". The census definition includes the executive, legislative, and judicial branches as well as agencies, institutions, and commissions that are independent but depend on state finances. The revenues include monies received by external sources (sales and income taxes, inter-government revenues etc.) and profits from lottery/legal gambling. Revenues do not include money borrowed but do include sales of cash and securities and fixed assets.

## Government Size

In theory, there should be a direct correlation between population size and government size. The largest state should spend the most on services while the smallest state should spend the least. Large disparities between the two would show greater or smaller government expenditures per capita. Using this measure, Tennessee has less government spending relative to its population. Tennessee has the $16^{\text {th }}$ largest population but the $22^{\text {nd }}$ highest government spending. On the other hand, The District of Columbia has the 49 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ largest population but only the $41^{\text {st }}$ highest government spending. The District only has local spending, which Congress controls. Alaska has the $48^{\text {th }}$ largest population but the $40^{\text {th }}$ highest government expenditures. Minnesota has a similar disparity.

## Data Limitations

It is difficult to draw conclusions or comparisons from the financial data on Page 2. States vary in the way they administer funds. Many allow local governments to administer a larger portion than others. The difference between a government's total revenue and total expenditures cannot be determined from this data to see if a state has a surplus or deficit.

## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT \& LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 56,100 jobs from November 2015 to November 2016. There were large increases in professional/ business services (up 12,100 jobs), which includes increases of 6,100 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 4,100 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; and health care/social assistance (up 13,000 jobs), which includes increases of 6,800 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 3,900 jobs in hospitals.

Smaller increases occurred in construction (up 4,900 jobs), which includes increases of 3,100 jobs in specialty trade contractors and 2,500 jobs heavy/civil engineering construction; educational services (up 4,800 jobs); retail trade (up 4,400 jobs), which includes increases of 1,700 jobs in food/beverage stores and 1,500 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers combined with declines of 1,400 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,100 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; food services/drinking places (up 3,300 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (up 3,000 jobs); finance/insurance (up 2,100 jobs); and arts/entertainment/recreation (up 1,700 jobs). This was partially offset by declines of 1,400 jobs in fabricated metal products and 1,000 jobs in local government educational services.

During November 2016, nonfarm employment increased by 13,200 jobs. There were increases in retail trade (up 7,400 jobs), which includes increases of 3,000 jobs in general merchandise stores, 1,800 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; and 1,600 jobs in food/beverage stores; professional/business services (up 5,600 jobs), which includes increases of 3,800 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 1,500 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; local government (up 2,900 jobs); and transportation/warehousing (up 2,100 jobs). These were partially offset by declines in food services/drinking places (down 2,800 jobs), arts/entertainment/ recreation (down 1,800 jobs), and other services (down 1,500 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for November 2016 was 4.8 percent, unchanged from the revised October 2016 rate. The United States unemployment rate in November was 4.6 percent, down 0.3 percentage point from the revised October 2016 rate.

In November 2015, the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.0 percent while the state rate was 5.6 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 81 counties, increased in ten counties, and remained the same in four counties. In November, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 3.5 percent, down 0.1 percentage point from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Lake County, at 8.3 percent, up from 8 percent in October.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 700 jobs from October 2016 to November 2016. There were increases in retail trade (up 500 jobs), nondurable goods manufacturing (up 300 jobs), and local government (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline of 300 jobs in educational/health services.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 3,300 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 700 while service-providing jobs increased by 2,600 .

Total nonfarm employment remained unchanged from to October 2016 to November 2016. There were increases in retail trade (up 900 jobs), educational/ health services (up 700 jobs), local government (up 600 jobs), and state government (up 400 jobs).

This was offset by decreases of 1,400 jobs in leisure/hospitality, 900 jobs in professional/ business services, and 400 jobs in mining/logging/construction.

Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 5,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 200 jobs, while service-providing jobs increased by 5,300 .

Total nonfarm employment increased by 3,000 jobs from October 2016 to November 2016. There were increases in trade/ transportation/utilities (up 4,100 jobs), which include increases of 2,300 jobs in transportation/warehousing/utilities and 1,400 jobs in retail trade; professional/scientific/technical services (up 900 jobs); and educational/health services (up 400 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in administrative/support/ waste management (down 1,400 jobs), other services (down 700 jobs), leisure/hospitality (down 500 jobs), and federal government (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 7,900 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,100 , while service-providing jobs increased by 6,800 .

Total nonfarm employment increased by 4,700 jobs from October 2016 to November 2016. There were increases in professional/business services (up 2,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,000 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; retail trade (up 1,700 jobs); local government (up 1,100 jobs); and mining/logging/ construction and transportation/warehousing/ utilities (both up 900 jobs).

This was partially offset by decreases in educational/health services (down 1,300 jobs), which included a decline of 900 jobs in health care/social assistance; other services (down 1,200 jobs); and financial activities (down jobs 400 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 23,500 jobs. During that time, goodsproducing jobs increased by 9,600 , while serviceproviding jobs increased by 13,900 .
