PETITION FOR WAIVER

Report (Including Statement of Request, Basis Upon Which Waiver is Sought, and Establishing Substantial Need Based on a Compelling Public Interest)

Authority

This Petition for Waiver is submitted pursuant to the Tennessee Heritage Protection Act of 2016, in accordance with Tennessee Code Annotated Section 4-1-412(c). This Petition for Waiver concerns a monument located on public land owned by the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County.

Ownership of Centennial Park

The Private Confederate Soldier Monument (the Monument) is located on public property. The Monument is located near the Parthenon in Centennial Park, which is owned by the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County. The deed where the Metropolitan Government took title to Centennial Park is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

The Board of Parks and Recreation of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County is a public entity that exercises control over Centennial Park. *Metropolitan Charter, Sections* 11.1001, 11.1002 (attached hereto). The Board of Parks and Recreation has the authority to supervise, control and operate the park and recreation system of the Metropolitan Government. *Metropolitan Charter, Sections* 11.1001, 11.1002.

Statement of Request, Basis Upon Which the Waiver is Sought, and Substantial Need for a Waiver Based on a Compelling Public Interest

In June 2019, the Monument was vandalized with "They were racists" in red paint. In September 2019, the Parks Board approved the addition of a marker adjacent to the Monument explaining the Monument's history and underlying motivations for placing Confederate monuments in the 20th century. *See* September 2019 Minutes of the Board of Parks and Recreation (attached hereto).

On Tuesday, January 5, 2021, the Metropolitan Board of Parks and Recreation for Nashville and Davidson County voted unanimously to petition the state for the removal of the Private Confederate Soldier Monument that is located in Centennial Park at 2500 West End Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee. *See* January 5, 2021 Minutes of the Board of Parks and Recreation (attached hereto).

The Monument that is the basis of this request features a bronze sculpture of a young Confederate private holding a rifle seated on a stone. The life-size soldier sits on a stone base adorned with several carved inscriptions and a bronze plaque.

In January 1902, members of the Frank Cheatham Bivouac Number 1, Association of Confederate Soldiers, Camp 35, United Confederate Veterans (the Bivouac) began efforts to construct a monument honoring common Confederate soldiers.

Although the Bivouac, founded in 1887, engaged in numerous noble pursuits, such as establishing a home for indigent and disabled veterans at the Hermitage, caring for Confederate graves, and providing benevolent programs for veterans, it also sought to influence historical memory by altering the Civil War narrative in textbooks in public schools and erecting Confederate monuments in public spaces.

Thus, while the Bivouac's desire to honor common soldiers seems innocuous, that motivation and the bivouac's execution of its goal must be viewed within the broader historical context. In September 1889, the Bivouac condemned history books "mischievous in tone and sentiment, untruthful in statement and tending to perpetuate the resentments of the civil war." Civil War veterans and their memorial and fraternal organizations across the United States engaged in a campaign of memorial building during the first two decades of the 20th century. This period was characterized by Civil War veterans dying, African Americans demanding equal rights, and state and local governments strengthening Jim Crow laws. Memorials to the Confederacy served as potent reminders of actions being taken in order to maintain the power status quo.

The Bivouac's focus on the common soldier was not innovative, but rather part of a growing trend in the United States. By honoring common soldiers, people embraced a narrow and more sanitized narrative of the Civil War that removed the decision makers, responsible for leading good people into the war, and left only the common man's devotion to hearth and home.

Unlike most monuments honoring soldiers erected at the time, the Bivouac's monument would not honor the dead. Instead, it would recognize those who survived the war and lived long enough to join the Frank Cheatham Bivouac, as evidenced by a large bronze plaque mounted on the west face of the base.

Although some viewed the soldier's expression as contemplative, historic newspaper articles and addresses featured at the cornerstone and unveiling ceremonies reveal the creators' true intention was to elevate the carefully crafted image of a soldier that would not betray the Lost Cause ideology sweeping the south around the turn of the nineteenth century. On February 28, 1903, *The Nashville Banner* announced the completion of the model of the Private Confederate Soldier Monument and published the following description:

The figure is more than ideal: it is typical....Hope and vigor are still with him and he is as determined as when he first shouldered the musket, but he is no longer the gay, boyish patriot, but the man who has suffered and is ready to suffer still more for the cause which he believes is right and just.²

On June 15, 1904, the second day of the Confederate Veterans Association, Tennessee Division annual reunion, an estimated 10,000 spectators attended the cornerstone laying in Centennial Park, Masons marched from the Masons' Grand Lodge on Church Street to Union Station where they boarded a special train for transport to the entrance of Centennial Park. From the entrance, mounted police, the 7th Cavalry Band, and the local commandry of the Knights Templar led the procession to the site selected for the Private Confederate Soldier Monument. The foundation, prepared in advance to receive a copper box of donated items "to be found, perhaps, by people of some future century" was encircled by members of the First Regiment Reserves, Confederate Veterans. Henry Watterson, editor of The Courier Journal, Louisville, Kentucky, delivered the keynote address, the majority of which supported the Lost Cause ideology embraced across the south. Henry Watterson's words demonstrated his belief that the Confederacy lived on through those rejecting an end to its cause, as he stated, "We build this monument to valor. We build it to probity. We build it in glorious tribute to the men who fell by our side. We build it to the spirit of the dead Confederacy." Waterson also emphasized the way that the war was beneficial to Southern whites, as he declared "Let us rejoice that out of the wreck of the South - and our beloved Tennessee, twin sister of my own beloved Kentucky - saved both her racehood [sic] and her manhood."4

On June 19, 1909, uniformed members of the Tennessee National Guard escorted members of the Bivouac to Centennial Park in three electric cars provided by the Nashville Railway and Light Company. Several hundred members of local United Daughters of the Confederacy chapters met the bivouac at the gate commencing a parade through the park led by the Industrial School Band. Judge S. F. Wilson stated, "I have no apologies to make for the humble part I played in the Civil War. Under the same conditions and the same circumstances I would do the same again. The test of the greatness of the private Confederate soldier comes in the strength of his lovalty to our reunited country." He closed his remarks with, "In honoring the private soldier with this monument you honor yourselves!" At the appropriate moment, Major Hord's granddaughters Annie Warner and Josephine Boensch and Winston Pilcher Folk, grandson of Captain M. B. Pilcher, pulled on the draping of two Confederate flags revealing a bronze sculpture. T. P. Weakly, president of the bivouac, presented the monument to F. P. McWirter, chairman of the Park Commission. Following the dedication in 1909, the Frank Cheatham Bivouac and related organizations held events at the Private Confederate Soldier Monument in honor of Confederate Memorial Day and as part of reunions and conferences. The Monument has continued to be a rallying point for Confederate memorialization services, including the Southern League's (a recognized hate group now known

In June 2019, the Monument was vandalized with "They were racists" in red paint. Although a marker has since been placed next to the Monument, there remains a continued risk of vandalism to the Monument at its current placement.

Charter of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County, Tennessee

Sec. 11.1001. - Established; qualifications, term and selection of members.

There shall be a metropolitan board of parks and recreation, sometimes in this chapter called "the board." The board shall consist of seven (7) members, who shall serve without compensation. One of the members of the board shall be a member of the board of education, selected by said board of education for a term of one (1) year; and another member of the board shall be a member of the planning commission, selected by said planning commission for a term of one (1) year. Five (5) members of the board, who shall hold no other public office, shall be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by a majority of the whole membership of the council. Said five (5) members shall serve terms of five (5) years each, provided that the first members appointed shall serve terms of one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4) and five (5) years, respectively. Any vacancy due to any cause, other than expiration of term, shall be filled for the unexpired term.

Sec. 11.1002. - Powers and duties.

The board shall have the following powers and duties:

- 1. The board shall supervise, control and operate the park and recreation system of the metropolitan government.
- It shall formulate the policies to be followed in the administration of the park and recreation system; and shall promulgate such rules and regulations as may be appropriate with respect to the administration of its policies.
- It shall employ, subject to the civil service provisions of this Charter and within its budget appropriation and other available funds, a director of parks and recreation and such superintendents and other employees as it deems necessary.
- 4. It shall review, approve, reject or amend the annual budget request as compiled by the director.
- 5. It shall recommend to the council (a) the sale of any lands owned by the metropolitan government for park or recreation purposes and no longer needed for such purposes, (b) the acquisition by condemnation of any additional lands needed for park or recreation purposes, and (c) the acceptance of any gift of lands offered for park or recreation purposes and useful for such purposes. In the acquisition or disposition of land, the board shall cooperate closely with the planning commission, whose recommendations shall be sought and carefully considered by the board.
- It shall have the authority to establish the fees and charges within the administration of the park and recreation department. It shall have sole authority of all matters pertaining to the operations of concessions.

Sec. 11.1003. - Director of parks and recreation—Qualifications.

The director of parks and recreation shall have at least five (5) years' experience in park or recreation administration in a supervisory or executive capacity.

Sec. 11.1004. - Same-Powers and duties.

The director shall be the chief administrative officer in charge of the management of public parks, playgrounds and other recreational areas and of a comprehensive recreation program for the area of the metropolitan government. He or she shall administer the policies of the board, recommend rules and regulations to the board for its consideration, and perform such other duties as may be assigned to him or her by the board or by ordinance.

(Amended by referendum election of November 6, 2018, Amdt. 6)

Sec. 11.1005. - Police protection for parks.

The board may employ custodial personnel who shall be designated as special police by the chief of police, without obligation to give a public officer's liability bond as provided for by section 8.205 of this Charter, and whose jurisdiction as special police shall be limited to the area of parks, playgrounds and other recreational areas. This section shall not be deemed to interfere with the right of the department of police to exercise police jurisdiction within said areas, nor with the duty to provide such police personnel as may be reasonably requested by the director of parks and recreation for the maintenance of law and order therein.

BOARD APPROVES LEASE BETWEEN METRO PARKS AND THE SPORTS AUTHORITY FOR A NEW COMMUNITY ICE HOCKEY AND SKATING COMPLEX AT ONE BELLEVUE PLACE

Upon motion of Mr. Fossick, seconded by Ms. Hughes, the board approved request by Staff to approve lease between Metro Parks and the Sports Authority for a new community ice hockey and skating recreation complex at One Bellevue Place. Below are the recitals of the contract document:

- 1. Metro Parks and the Sports Authority have determined that a new community ice hockey and skating recreation complex at One Bellevue Place encourages and fosters economic development and prosperity and provides recreational and other opportunities for the citizens of Nashville and Davidson County.
- 2. Metro Parks owns and operates property located at One Bellevue Place, 7638 Highway 70S, Nashville, TN, map/parcel 12800019600 on which, pursuant to Resolutions RS2017-713 and RS2017-963 it has caused a new recreation center and ice sports complex to be developed and constructed ("Building") utilizing the Metropolitan Government General Services Department as project manager.
- 3. Pursuant to Section 7-67-109 of the Tennessee Code Annotated, the Sports Authority has the express power to acquire land by lease in order to operate a project such as a sports and recreation facility.
- 4. Pursuant to Section 7-67-111 of the Tennessee Code Annotated, Metro Parks is permitted to convey land by lease to the Sports Authority.

BOARD GRANTS APPROVAL TO THE NASHVILLE PARKS FOUNDATION, TO RAISE FUNDS FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THREE (3) FIVE-A-SIDE SOCCER FIELDS IN COLEMAN PARK

The proposed project has been reviewed by the Planning, Maintenance, Recreation and Special Events divisions. The synthetic turf fields are proposed to be located on the footprint of an existing, poorer quality multi-use field. The proposed fields will have gross dimensions of approximately 125' x 225'. The intent is for the fields to be designated for general community use. All final plans, donor recognition and other terms require approval of Metro Parks staff and compliance with all applicable standards and policies. The completed facility will be donated at no cost to Metro Parks.

Upon motion of Mr. Haynes, seconded by Ms. Scott Barnes, the board granted approval to the Nashville Parks Foundation to raise funds for the development of three (3) five-a-side soccer fields in Coleman Park.

MR. RIDLEY WILLS, REPRESENTING THE FRIENDS OF AAITTIFAMA ARCHEOLOGICAL PARK PRESENTS ANNUAL UPDATE TO THE BOARD

Mr. Wills began by thanking Metro Parks' employees, Mr. Tim Netsch and Ms. Amrita Chatterjee, for their assistance with the Master Plan and the LPRF grant compliance. He stated that Hodgson and Douglac Landscape Architects are preparing the long-term Master Plan and the LPRF grant will build it. Friends of Aaittifama are funding the design, permitting, etc. and at the completion of this project, there should be \$200,000 in the bank to assist with maintenance of park. Currently 95% through the construction document and stormwater permitting is currently with TDEC. Should be going to Codes this week (September 2).

The initial phase will consist of:

- Building entrance plaza walky, ay
- Signage (will be maintenance free)
- Part palisade wall

There is no history from the people who disappeared in 1450 and although they were here for thousands of years, they did not leave their stories to be told. Friends of Aaittifama are trying to save this last remaining village in Davidson County. Building the palisade wall, which is a fortification made of wood and located 12 feet north from where the original palisade wall was located, with 6-inch core 10 steel posts and at the 13-foot mark and up on the posts everything above will be painted yellow ochre or be lighted going up each foot. Building off and north of the exact location of the wall so as not to disturb all the archeological knowledge which is based south of the original wall and to preserve what is left. At night all poles above 13 feet will light up and resemble a streak of light. This method is to make an artist's image of what was here and hoping that people driving by will wonder what it is and research it.

Ms. Hughes, board member, asked Mr. Wills how they knew when in that 6 month period of 1420 the wall was built? He responded that you cannot tell from the type wood that was taken from the older posts; however, you can tell within 6 months when the post hole was dug because if the seeds from the squash and beans workers spit into the post hole.

This project is scheduled to begin Spring 2020 and hopefully completed in Fall 2020.

XII. DEPARTMENT UPDATES (con. t.)

Ms. Gregory said that on Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays she works with senior programming. They have a line dancing group that has been in existence for 18 years and still growing strong. There are 80 participants at Hadley and 40 at Hartman. Out of this line dancing class a group was established that go out into the community and perform an average of 13-14 free performances annually. There is also a large population of seniors who gather and walk each morning on the adjacent greenway.

The Summer Program averages 130 youth and a showcase is presented at the end of the Summer. It is mandatory that all participate by singing, dancing, playing music, etc. If one participant doesn't participate it will cause a domino effect so all participants have to be involved. This program and the showcase help to develop self-esteem, learn a skill and promote participation.

Mr. Contee Harris oversees the swimming pool and has a traveling swim team in which the majority of his youth swimmers recieve scholarships.

The After-school Program involves Robert E. Lillard Elementary, Haynes Middle School, and Whites Creek High School. All three of these schools are priority schools and Hartman staff volunteer during their breaks at least once a week at one of the schools. (Purpose Prep students arrive at 4:30 pm). NAZA program with Haynes Middle School in the afternoon is right at 30 youth; however, only approved for 15 and Robert E. Lillard has about 45 attendees. Staff makes sure all youth also participate in sports activities.

Ms. Odom expressed her appreciation for facility managers like Ms. Gregory who are so committed to the community, center participants and promote activities that generate attendance.

MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING JANUARY 5, 2021

A meeting of the Board of Parks and Recreation of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County, Tennessee was held on Tuesday, January 5, 2021 at 12:00 pm via teleconference and was broadcast through the Metro Nashville Network, (MNN) http://stream.nashville.gov and select MNN, live on Nashville's Comcast Channel 3, AT&T UVerse Channel 99, Google Fiber channel 3 and streamed live on the MNN Roku app. Board members present were: Dr. Michelle Steele, Ms. Susannah Scott-Barnes, Ms. Tari Hughes, Mr. George Anderson, Mr. Crews Johnston, Dr. Sharon Gentry and Mr. Jeff Haynes. Ms. Macy Amos, representing the Metro Legal Department was also in attendance.

Dr. Michelle Steele, chair, called the meeting to order and stated that the first order of business will be a motion to determine under the Governor's Executive Order #16 that the meeting agenda constitutes essential business of this board and meeting electronically is necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of Tennesseans in light of the COVID-19 outbreak. Ms. Scott Barnes moved for approval, Dr. Sharon Gentry seconded, and the board approved without objection.

V. SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS/INTRODUCTIONS

GIARRATANA DEVELOPMENT LLC PRESENTS VISION FOR CHURCH STREET PARK

Before Mr. Giarratana's presentation Dr. Steele, chair of the Parks Board, provided the following background information regarding use of Church Street Park:

• May 2020 the board approved a grant of an in-kind gift of \$465,000 for the purpose of improvements to and programming of Church Street Park from the Historical Capital Corridor Foundation with work to conclude Spring 2021.

V. SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS/INTRODUCTIONS

GIARRATANA DEVELOPMENT LLC PRESENTS VISION FOR CHURCH STREET PARK

November 2020 the board agreed to seek public comment from all groups who
have ideas for improvements to Church Street Park located at 600 Church
Street, Nashville, TN. Interested parties were invited to present their ideas at
today's meeting.

Mr. Tony Giarratana began his presentation by encouraging the board to pursue a long-term solution to the chronic challenges that Church Street Park has presented to the Church Street neighborhood. He stated he was aware the park was closed last year for renovations in preparation for the Anne Dallas Dudley centennial anniversary and that new grass has been planted and new landscaping installed. Since the park was closed the atmosphere and walkability of the Church Street neighborhood has much improved and he remains hopeful that when it reopens that improvement will continue and that the park will not just become a prettier homeless encampment. However, if the park reverts to its prior unacceptable state after reopening, Mr. Giarratana is requesting the Board to issue a request for proposals for the long term repurposing of the park in a manner that will enhance the Church Street neighborhood, including the Robert A.M. Stern designed library across the street. If the Board issues an RFP, Giarratana Development will submit a proposal which is previewed below:

- MDHA owns property at Jo Johnston and 16th Avenues that it has sought to redevelop for permanent supportive housing for several years. Giarratana Development will provide the funds and expertise to undertake development of such a property with 60 residential units: 15 units for homeless youth, 15 units for homeless veterans and 15 units for intellectually disadvantaged ("IDD") residents. As each IDD resident needs a caregiver, an additional 15 units would be provided for those caregivers.
- This project has a budget of \$9 million without Giarratana fees and would be financed totally by his company and associates. Upon completion, the property and completed development would remain the property of MDHA, or one of its nonprofit affiliates. This project would be a significant advance towards achieving Metro's stated desire to provide permanent supportive housing for homeless and other disadvantaged residents.
- In return, Metro would convey the park property to Giarratana Development LLC with entitlements that would facilitate a magnificent redevelopment of that property which would enhance the Church Street neighborhood, including the Library, and provide an enormous boost to Metro's property tax rolls.

GIARRATANA DEVELOPMENT LLC PRESENTS VISION FOR CHURCH STREET PARK

Giarratana Development's primary goal is a positive repurposing of Church Street Park. The work currently being undertaken and proposed may do that and, if so, Mr. Giarratana stated that he will be a strong supporter of this effort. However, if it does not, Mr. Giarratana respectfully requests that the board undertake a request for proposal ("RFP") process so that a mechanism can be identified to address the chronic challenges presented by the park, once and for all.

STAFF TO REVISIT RECOMMENDATION FROM THE BOARD REGARDING INITIATING THE PETITION PROCESS FOR REMOVAL/RELOCATION OF THE PRIVATE CONFEDERATE MONUMENT IN CENTENNIAL PARK

The monument is a statue of a confederate private in uniform with a rifle created by sculptor, George Julian Zolnay, who designed many other confederate sculptures. The monument includes a plaque with the names of 540 members of the Frank Cheatham Bivouac. The monument was dedicated in Centennial Park on June 19, 1909. The purpose of this staff request is out of concern because the monument was vandalized by an unknown perpetrator in June 2019. The word "racists" was painted with red spray paint on the monument and our maintenance department cleaned the monument immediately after discovery. Since then and before, the department has received inquiries from the public if this monument should be located on public property.

In 2017 Metro Parks convened a group of local historians and representatives from the Historical Commission and learned at that time the monument could not be removed or relocated without State approval; therefore, the board will have to vote to determine how to proceed as the board has never addressed this monument.

At the August 2019 Parks Board Meeting, upon motion of Mr. Anderson, seconded by Ms. Scott-Barnes, the board deferred this request to the Public Arts Committee of the Parks Board.

At the September 2019 board meeting upon recommendation of the board's Public Arts Committee, the board approved retaining the monument in Centennial Park and providing contextual and interpretive signage at the site.

Ms. Susannah Scott-Barnes, board member, had requested to revisit this topic at the first in person meeting of the board; however, with an indefinite date to return to such meetings and the untimely deaths of Breonna Taylor and George Floyd she asked that the board go ahead and revisit.

STAFF TO REVISIT RECOMMENDATION FROM THE BOARD REGARDING INITIATING THE PETITION PROCESS FOR REMOVAL/RELOCATION OF THE PRIVATE CONFEDERATE MONUMENT IN CENTENNIAL PARK

Ms. Scott-Barnes stated that Parks ability to make changes are restricted by the State; however, with the Centennial Park renovation it seems there hasn't been any additional vandalism which is more likely the result of the statue been behind fencing in a closed park She stated she is concerned as a board member but would like to hear from other board members. Ms. Scott-Barnes also stated that when this park property is vandalized it becomes costly to Parks to continue to maintain it. She also said the Centennial Park Master Plan suggests moving the statue to *Flagpole Hill in Centennial Park where there is more space for contextualizing and additional signage as well as other civil war items located in that area.

Ms. Hughes stated that she agreed the statue is a divisive symbol and wasn't sure what the action would be. Macy Amos, legal advisor to Metro Parks, stated that Parks is constrained by State law, generally the Tennessee Heritage Protection Act prohibits the removal, relocation, or renaming of a memorial that is located on public property. A public entity such as the Parks Board may petition the Tennessee Historical Commission for a waiver from that prohibition and the commission will vote on whether to grant or deny waiver. The Tennessee Historical Commission is made up of 24 governor appointed members and five ex-officio members. These appointees will vote for removal or relocating the monument in our own park.

Dr. Steele stated that this came back up because legislators are going through the process to remove the bust of Nathan Bedford Forrest from the State Chambers; therefore, in light of this returning to their agenda it is a good time for Parks to present request to them as well.

Dr. Gentry asked if the State is having to go thru this process to remove the bust – isn't that considered state property? Ms. Amos was not sure of the process as every year the legislature votes on whether to remove the bust or not. Dr. Gentry stated that the legislators are seeking relocation of the bust to the Tennessee State Museum. Dr. Gentry asked for the motion to be clear if we are asking the State to relocate or remove the statue.

Dr. Steele asked for a motion. Ms. Scott-Barnes motioned to petition the State to remove the monument and Dr. Gentry seconded. The board unanimously approved.

*Please note that Flagpole Hill, a point of reference in Centennial Park mentioned in the minutes for agenda item 08-19-06, was officially named First Amendment Hill by the Parks Board in November 1992.






