CHAIRPERSON LANE: At this point on the agenda we have listed the legislative update, and if you'll agree, Executive Director Cody Vest, I'll ask you to handle that.

MS. VEST: Thank you very much. If you would turn to your iPads for the legislative update on this. I believe we got some feedback on the recording.

MR. ROUSSEAU: I'm sorry, that was Alan Rousseau. I apologize.

MS. VEST: That's okay. If you will look at Senate Bill 414, it says, "The Tennessee Code Annotated Section 62-26-223(b) is amended by adding the following as a new subdivision. A person engaged exclusively in the business of obtaining and furnishing information regarding a candidate for employment to the candidate's potential employer." That shall take effect as becoming law.

I sent all this out to you ahead of time for possible discussion. I do not know how many companies or investigators are going to be affected by this. This is an employment -- I take it an employment company, that's what they do, just

employment. There are these types of companies that do more than just for employment. So I really don't know how this is going to affect. Do we have any questions or any discussion with the Commission Members?

MR. FLAIR: What I didn't understand, Madam Chairman, I didn't understand, is it going to require a PI license and a PI business license in order to be able to do that?

CHAIRPERSON LANE: That's it.
MR. FLAIR: It's that simple, right?
MS. THOMAS: What this new law does, is it exempts companies that solely do employment background checks. That's what this law does. And I think that's why Cody wanted the Commission to discuss to kind of see how the Commission feels, do they see that this trend is changing, how do they see this evolving maybe.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: So like insurance companies, they are doing a lot of inhouse investigators, and they are exempt working for one attorney, one employee. This is going to be the same thing here. And it's in law now, I don't know what we can do about it.

MS. VEST: Yes, ma'am. Thank you, that's
exactly what it is. But I just want we did Page 9
discuss it briefly whenever it came up, but it is in effect now.

MS. THOMAS: It is. May 18 th.
MS. VEST: May 18th.
MS. THOMAS: Is when it was signed into law.

MS. VEST: So what this means is if I get any telephone calls from someone who says, "Do I need
to have a license to do background checks on
individuals for employment," they do not have to have
a PI license and they do not have to have a company license.

MS. THOMAS: And just to clarify on that, this is if your company solely does that. So if that is just one part of what you do, you will still need a license. But if your company only does employment background screening, you no longer need a license for that.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: That's the reason I did not think that it would really affect companies that have license.

MS. THOMAS: I think companies that are currently licensed, if they solely do background checks, I think the effect would be they just won't

renew.
CHAIRPERSON LANE: You don't think they would have to?

MS. THOMAS: Because they don't have to keep up with that. Again, that's if that's all they do. I don't know how this will affect the industry going forward, how the legislature sees companies that solely do one thing, we start carving out exceptions for different types of checks as technology advances and things like that. This just seems like the first step maybe. Of course, we won't know until the new legislative proposals and things like that go into effect.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: It will eventually hurt.

MR. HORTON: Do you think that at some point it will hurt the PI business?

MS. THOMAS: I think that's what Cody and I talked about. It's hard to gauge at this point, because I'm not sure how many companies we have currently that solely do background checks, but it could encourage people to begin those types of companies.

MR. HORTON: But with internet, you can about find out anything about anybody. If you are
smart enough to do that. We have a son that's that smart, he's a computer programmer.

MS. THOMAS: That's the thing about the definition about investigation companies, that we are tending to see that that definition is so broad. As technology advances, it becomes more and more difficult to determine who needs a license and who doesn't.

MR. VALENTINE: I do a lot of background investigations, and the reason the companies use me is because you can't trust everything that's on the internet. And the databases that I use, you can trust. They are accurate and verified.

MS. VEST: I also brought this up because I do not know how it's going to affect your bottom line. We won't know probably for, I want to say, at least a good two years to go through a renewal cycle, see who renews with these types of companies or how many telephone calls we might get asking these specific questions. So I will be keeping an eye on the budget and get back to you just as soon as I can, when I get this information.

MR. VALENTINE: Did the General Assembly come to our Commission before they passed this law? MS. THOMAS: No.

don't know an answer to because I didn't -- I don't believe anybody would come before you. You might be called to go before them, but they are not -- I just don't foresee them -- but I do understand your question.

MR. VALENTINE: Just a curtesy call to ask if you --

MR. VALENTINE: -- viable or necessary
or --
MS. VEST: They just send the information down from the Hill, and then I answer the questions.

MS. THOMAS: And I will say in this particular bill, it wasn't just our chapter that was affected by this change. It did hit there, but it did affect different chapters in the law. So it will probably just be a waiting game to see how it affects other industries or companies going forward.

DR. RITCH: As with most laws, this was prompted by some individual at some point in time.
Do we have any idea what promoted this, who was the prime mover.

MS. VEST: No, sir, I do not know that answer.

DR. RITCH: Okay. I don't think there's anything clandestine about it. I think they just didn't want to keep pay a fee for something --

MS. VEST: Okay. Is there any other discussion?

CHAIRPERSON LANE: If not, the next item on the agenda --

MR. RICHARDS: I have one thing I need to mention? Regarding the proposed changes in the polygraph rules, we need to change the wording on one of them, and I discussed that with you.

MS. VEST: Yes, sir. I am going to -- if that's all right with you, we'll put that under unfinished business.

MR. RICHARDS: That will be fine.
MS. VEST: Then we'll talk about that as we go. Thank you, sir.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: Our next item on the agenda is the legal report, and I'll respectfully request our staff attorney, Ashley Thomas, along with the Assistant General Counsel Ms. Brown.

MS. BROWN: Good morning, Commission, my name Shilina Brown, and I am here to present to you the legal report. We have a short report today. This is actually one matter, with Respondent 1 being the investigator, and Respondent 2 being the company.
I don't know if you'd like -- this is a little bit
lengthy, I don't know if you'd like to take a few minutes and read this over or would you like me to read this into the record?

CHAIRPERSON LANE: We need it read into the record.

MS. VEST: I'm sorry, yes, we read all complaints into the record.

MS. BROWN: Okay, I'm sorry. There's several boards I cover, each board is a little different. Okay.

So the first complaint number is
2017018721. Respondent 1 is the investigator. The second complaint is 2017018761. Respondent 2 is the company. This was a consumer complaint against the Respondent investigator stating the Complainant posted an advertisement on Craig's List for, "A DeWalt four and a half angle grinder, never used."

The Complainant purchased the item in 2011 or 2012 from Lowe's in Hendersonville, Tennessee, and never used the item. An individual made an inquiry about the tool and asked to meet the Complainant. The Complainant and the Respondent agreed to meet in the early afternoon at Opry Mills Shopping Mall in front of Chewy's Restaurant.

A male individual met the Complainant in the parking lot and inspected the tool and told the Complainant the tool had been stolen and proceeded to tell the Complainant that he was a private investigator. The Complainant insisted it was not stolen and asked the private investigator for some identification. The Respondent showed the Complainant his identification card.

The Complainant was still unsure whether or not the Respondent was actually a private investigator just by looking at the laminated identification card, which just had "private investigator" underneath the man's name. Since the Complainant was involved in law enforcement with another state agency and did not feel he was able to determine whether or not the Respondent was actually an investigator, the Complainant took a picture of the identification card that the Respondent handed

him with his phone, and the Respondent grabbed the identification card from him and told the Complainant, "Better watch out or I'll call 911 on you." The Complainant told him to, "Go ahead and call them."

At this point, the Complainant was unsure whether or not the Respondent was trying to steal his tool from him. The Complainant told him that he was a law enforcement officer and showed him his badge and told the Respondent to return the grinder back to the Complainant. The Complainant refused to give the grinder back to the Complainant. The Complainant believed the Respondent was attempting to steal his property. The Respondent started waving his ball cap in another direction over his head, as though he was signaling someone in the distance to come over to them, and at this point the Complainant grabbed his grinder from the Respondent.

The Respondent stepped closer to the Complainant, stated, "You better be careful, I'm a retired Metro officer of 33 years and I'm a black belt." The Complainant responded and stated, "You are the one that needs to be careful." The
Complainant reached into his pocket to get his car keys, and the Respondent stated, "Don't move, let me
see your hands."
The Complainant believed the Respondent had a gun concealed on him and the Complainant slowly brought out his hands with his keys in his hands. Thereafter, two other individuals, a male and a female, approached the Complainant, and the Complainant backed way from the Respondent and put the angle grinder inside his car and locked his car. Suddenly the mall security appeared and asked what was wrong, and the Complainant explained the situation to the security officer. The security officer stated it appears that everything was under control and left the area.

The other two individuals approached the Complainant and accused him of stealing the tool. And the female had a box in her hand and demanded that the Complainant take out the angle grinder form the trunk of the Complainant's car so she could check the serial number, and the Complainant refused. The female individual threatened to call the police, when she suddenly remembered she had a picture of the serial number from the Craig's List post. The woman apologized for the confusion when she realized the serial number was different.

MS. BROWN: Yes.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER ON PHONE: Who am I speak with?

MS. VEST: Ma'am, are you calling on the line for Alan Rousseau?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER ON PHONE: No, ma'am.

MS. VEST: Ma'am, this is the Private Investigations \& Polygraph Commission that you called into.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER ON PHONE: I must have accidentally called. Because I don't remember calling this number, and I just heard somebody talking. So it must have been an accident, I do apologize.

MS. VEST: Thank you, ma'am.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER ON PHONE: Uh-huh.
MS. BROWN: The Respondent provided a
response and stated he was working a theft case for
his client and it was believed the grinder had been
stolen from his client. The Respondent's client had seen the grinder on Craig's List, and it appeared to be brand new, just like her grinder. The Respondent claims he did not curse, yell or threaten the
Complainant in any manner. The Respondent stated

that because the Complainant put his hands in his front pocket, the Respondent got into a defensive position. The Respondent claims he waved down the mall security guard and asked if he would check the serial number, and the security guard stated everything looked peaceful and he needed to get to the other side of the mall. The Respondent's clients walked up to the Complainant and checked the serial number and realized the Complainant's grinder had a different serial number, and the Respondent apologized and left.

My recommendation is to authorize a formal hearing and send a consent order with a civil penalty in the amount of $\$ 250$ for violation of Tennessee Comprehensive Rules and Regulations 1175-04-.02, Proper Conduct of Practice, (1), "The licensee shall at all times recognize the primary obligation to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public in the performance of the licensee's professional duties."

CHAIRPERSON LANE: Is there a motion? MR. ROUSSEAU: Alan Rousseau. I move we accept the recommendation of counsel.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: Commissioner Rousseau made a motion. Is there a second?

MS. VEST: My question is, since the
answer is yes, do we go back and re-open the
application when she was here in January? See, in
January -- if I am not mistaken, this is the lady I
had approved by error, that's why I brought her back to you, for her apprenticeship.

Are you still with that same company.
MS. SILVA: Well, since January I haven't been able to do anything since my license was --

MS. VEST: Will you be going back to that company?

Once you have had an apprenticeship, according to your statute, no matter whether it's completed or not, you only get that apprenticeship one time. Now she would be required to make application to be a private investigator. And from what I understand from your vote today, we will be granting that, once she meets all the other requirements, take the test, whatever she needs to do.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: That's my understanding also. Congratulations to you. I wish you well.

MS. SILVA: Thank you so much.
CHAIRPERSON LANE: Can we take about a ten-minute break now?

MS. VEST: Yes, please.
(Short break.)
CHAIRPERSON LANE: I'll call the meeting back to order. Everybody's here. Looks like next on the agenda we have the administrative matters, and I'll, again, turn this over to our Executive Director Cody Vest to handle it.

MS. VEST: Thank you. Yes, if you'll look on your iPads, the next thing on the agenda is your monthly reports. These were sent out to you in advance. We'll go ahead and take a look. You have

the month of March and April are exactly going to be
the same. We have four Commission Member vacancies, that's Allen Rousseau, David Horton, Minnie Lane, and
Dr. Ritch. I have not heard anything about these
reappointment, but we do have reappointed Walt
Valentine, David Brown, and Larry Flair. And we
do -- of course, we do appreciate you serving until
your term expires or the Commissioner reappoints
someone or you get reappointed. And we certainly
appreciate everyone serving and continuing to serve.
The next month is actually the same
thing, it just tells you the same information that I
have to report from month to month.
If there's no questions about those,
we'll just move right on, if would you, please.
MR. VALENTINE: I noticed that we had
four complaints in March
MS. VEST: Yes.
MR. VALENTINE: And none in April.
MS. VEST: Yes.
MR. VALENTINE: How many complaints do we have on the books now?

MS. THOMAS: If I'm not mistaken, I
believe there are two, not counting the one Ms. Brown presented this morning. I believe that's correct.

MS. VEST: In answer to your question, we have a couple of those that are still being worked.

MR. VALENTINE: Okay.
MS. VEST: If there's no other questions, we'll just move onto what we call the budget review that we just handed out in color. I do apologize, it was so small on the iPads, I'm sure you couldn't read them. Well, they weren't on your iPads because of the change that I had received, and so we handed that out to you, had it sitting at your areas when you came in. But it was brought to my attention that it could not be read, so we went and printed it in color for you.

All right. I'll go over this briefly.
What you need to look at is the bottom line where it says "Net Surplus, Deficit." Your total so far for the fiscal year is $\$ 21,810$. Now, of course, we still have the month of May and June to put on here. So far the only really big difference there, let's see, if you'll look at "Administrative Cost Backs," it's in the second block under "Pl Poly Expenses." You'll see a little bit of an increase there, it's $\$ 4,422$. It's almost double what you had all the other months. That is where we had another charge for our new computer system, and they went into each program and
did a charge to us based on the number -- I believe it was based on the number of your investigators.

And I do apologize, we did have a way I could just push a button and find out how many private investigators there are, now it requires me to contact IT to get that information. Hopefully I will be able to tell you next time we meet how many private investigators you actually have that are active and how many companies. We might want to take a look at that and do a comparison and see what happened over the course of time.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: Okay.
MR. VALENTINE: That information isn't online for to us access ourselves?

MS. VEST: I don't -- you may be able to find that information under core.tn. If there wasn't any other questions about that, we can move on. What I do have is some correspondence.

We have an individual, Randall, R-A-N-D-A-L-L, last name W-I-T-T-I-G, who has come up for renewal, but he is out of the country. He is in Honduras. He has a private investigator license and he has a company license. The company license requires, on paper anyway, a notarized statement of affiliates. He's not able to get it notarized in

Honduras by an American notary. I think we already had this at the last meeting, and we said something like, why didn't he get the notary from that country to do it, but I don't know if every country has notaries. I don't know anything about that. What we did the last time, though, was we let him go ahead and renew, and when he does come back into the country, he will give us a notarized statement.

So I'm asking you if I can do that for this gentleman to tell us, yes, we will accept his notarized statement. He has no investigators, it's just him. He's out of the country, but he's supposed to come back maybe in September or October, and at that time he needs to give me a notarized statement of his affiliates. From now on, we should not be running into this because you are required to do your renewals online now, but he was out of the country, couldn't get it done for some reason.

Feel free to e-mail myself or Cody with those changes, and we'll try include that.

MS. VEST: On another note on the same line, for instance, the statute does say that you are supposed to have your application on file before you take the exam. With our new database, we want everything uploaded when you make application. Therefore, you should be taking the exam before you make the application. That is the number one thing that is holding up applications in our office.

These individuals are taking these exams three, four, sometimes as many as six times. Each time they do, they have to pay to do it. I am going to be meeting later on this month with the PSI, it is not for an item of review, it is just to make sure that we understand how they are handled. But we just
recent -- not really too long ago sat down and actually did an item review with the laws and the rules and then the amended back questions for the actual private investigators. So I will be talking with Alex Rodriguez at our appointment. I want to make sure that I do get a monthly count of how many are taking that exam, how many are failing that exam, and if at all possible, what areas that they are failing in to see if I can bring it back to the Commission, do we need to have another item review, is our exam too hard, is it too easy, are people not studying, is the exam material not correct. There is some reason that somebody has to take it six times.

CHAIRPERSON LANE: I was one that sat on than, and I would have thought it would have been too easy. I am shocked. I am interested in knowing, once you talk to them, maybe they are not implementing it correctly or something.

MS. VEST: Not studying is probably the number one. I do stress to them that it is 50 percent based on the laws and the rules. I mean, you got 50 percent already, if you know those. And you have to purchase the material, and you have to study that material in order to take that exam. But then we need to actually consider, Madam Chair, that
