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MS. VEST: This is just through the end 2 of May. Our fiscal year changes in June -- I mean, it cuts off June the 30th; the new fiscal year starts July 1st. Every year we must end in a positive 5 balance. I don't believe that's going to happen this year. I'm not overly concerned after talking with administration about being Sunset, because hopefully this is your ebb. Every year it's an up or down 9 year, and this looks like we have a down year now. 10 Right now you are in negative \$20,956.

11 According to what the trend is showing 12 here, it's your net surplus or deficit, I don't 13 believe we are going to be able to pull that out in 14 one month. We have not seen in our office a flux of 15 applications coming in, although this is not the 16 renewal month for them to have a large number 17 renewing. So I do believe you will be ending in the 18 red this year.

19 If you end in red two years, we are 20 subject to Sunset. We have to look at different 21 things. Increasing fees is not something I really 22 want to talk about. I don't know if we are at that 23 point yet or not, I'll need to speak with our 24 administration to see if they see some way that I am 25 going to be able to pull this out. If we don't have,

are we comparable with the other corresponding states or the other states surrounding Tennessee in the

Page 17 industry, do you know by chance? Where I'm going with this, where are we on the scale, are we in the 2 3 ballpark with these other states?

4 MS. VEST: I'm not going to be able to 5 speak about that today. I don't know the answer to 6 that. I have -- I do have some information here 7 where I have contacted other states, but it's 8 concerning their apprenticeship, I did not look to 9 see what the fees were. That is something that I can 10 do and get back with you. I can send you an e-mail, 11 give you an idea what the other states are doing. 12 But a lot of you have already -- have your license 13 for what, Alabama, maybe Kentucky, Georgia, so you 14 might already know what the fees are. But yes, I 15 will look that up.

16 When you talk about raising fees, you are 17 not talking about raising fees on the application; we 18 are talking about if we do raise fees, we are talking 19 about raising fees on the actual licensees, that 20 would be the renewal fees. We are already apparently 21 having difficulty getting people into your industry, 22 the last thing I think we probably would want to do 23 is raise the fee. It has to be done, it has to be 24 done, but I think we need to look at everything 25 first. So I need to get some of this information

liability. I noticed in six years there's only been ten polygraph examiners that came on. So that's maybe two -- less than two a year. So I think the 2,000-hour requirement, people aren't understanding that's just one option, you have got two other 5 options you could do. And I don't know how to address that for people that are trying to get in the 7 8 field.

9 MS. VEST: But one thing -- we do talk 10 about this at our seminars, but whenever I give a seminar, it's already private investigators there, it's not the public that's there. So you already know -- hopefully you already know what the 13 requirements are. We do get telephone calls, we do 14 get questions. That 2,000 hours, ever since that's 15 been in place, has been like a sore eye. I would be quite frank with you. 17

18 Yes, there are other ways to get into 19 this profession. We have a staff member who talks to 20 the private investigators who is in the back of the 21 room, I believe Tiffany is. She knows the rules and 22 laws as good as I do or -- she does talk to people, 23 we do it all the time. Yes, sir, I have heard that a 24 lot. I will be sure to make a note of that and we 25 will discuss it again at the seminars, try to

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together for you so I can present it to you, we can make an intelligent decision on what to do next. 2

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CHAIRMAN VALENTINE: Another alternative would be to have every other meeting telephonic.

MS. VEST: Yes, sir. We meet six times a year, we can do three telephonic and three in person, one every other. There's ways we can do that.

CHAIRMAN VALENTINE: If that saves enough money to balance the budget.

10 MS. VEST: I don't even know how much it 11 is. I'll have to look into how much your travel 12 expenses are and really what that would actually do 13 to the budget. I mean, if it's \$2,000, it's not going to make a difference. If it's \$20,000, it 15 would make a difference, but it's not.

MR. SHANKS: Cody, I have been reviewing 17 and looking, and since the 2000 hours were added, a 18 lot of people are misunderstanding what that says.

19 Besides 2,000 hours, it also says, if they have

20 experience, that would count, or if they have

21 education. And those things would have to come

22 before us, but everybody, I think, is being told you

23 have got to have 2,000 hours to own a company. And 24 the issue I am seeing with myself or anybody else, we

25 do not want to hire somebody because of the

6 MS. THOMAS: That is one option. The 7 other is to submit a legislative proposal to our 8 administration, and if they decide to put that in 9 their packet to take to the governor, it will go as 10 part of the Department's bill, the Department of 11 Commerce and Insurance as a whole, but if that is not 12 done, then you'd have to find a sponsor on the Hill 13 to carry the bill. 14

MR. FLAIR: Can you address, please, 15 ma'am, what type of notification -- could we maybe 16 think on that during -- before our next meeting and 17 maybe get some feedback from the other Commissioners 18 or whatever, see if we want to go in that direction 19 as well?

20 MS. THOMAS: Absolutely. I'll talk to my management to determine when those deadlines are for 22 me to prepare the proposal to submit for the 23 Department's bill, and I will let you all know at the 24 next meeting.

16 We have asked that, Mr. Richards, if they 17 want to talk to someone concerning a polygraph, that they come straight into our office. We have so few polygraph -- I'm sorry, so many -- very few examiners, excuse me, and I always have to pull the book out and go down line by line by line. If I do

22 have any difficulty, I do call Mr. Richards on that.

23 That's a little bit harder to teach someone to do

24 when you maybe have one call every six, seven months

25 or something of that nature. I will talk with them

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1 MS. THOMAS: Absolutely.

MR. BAYNE: Question on this budget. Are there -- going forward in FY-19, are there expenditures that could go down? I frankly don't know *Edison expenditures well enough to -- so would ask you what that's about.

I don't know what to tell you to say that we can pull this 16 out next year. We had the same number of 17 18 investigators, but I will look at it and I will get

19 back with you more on this and the changes that we

20 can possibly make. You want me to check with the

21 other states and see if we are comparable with other states, what their fees are, we can -- I'll do that.

23 And we'll just start at the bottom and work up, see

24 what we can do with the budget.

25 We hold down expenses all we can hold

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Page 25 down. The only thing I have any control over is

2 supplies. 3

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CHAIRMAN VALENTINE: Is what? MS. VEST: Supplies. Pens for the office.

MS. WILLIAMS: Paper.

MS. VEST: Just whatever we particularly 8 need in the office. That's the only thing I can hold 9 down. If I need a toner for the printer, I just got 10 to have one, but that's the only thing my office has 11 control over, and we buy our own. I go to Sam's and 12 I buy them by the case.

MR. BROWN: Do you track the 14 applications, Cody?

MS. VEST: Do I track the applications? MR. BROWN: On a monthly basis in terms 17 of the numbers that are coming in.

MS. VEST: Every now and then I will take 19 a look at them. That's what I've been telling you at 20 the last several meetings, there are no new 21 investigators coming in.

22 MR. BROWN: That's what I thought. 23 MS. VEST: I talked to you about the

24 apprenticeship. I guess I can go ahead, if you want 25 me go ahead and discuss that little piece, since we

1 talking about private investigations, along with

alarms, along with polygraph. We don't really get

3 into polygraph too much because most of that -- we do

4 know most of that is law enforcement. But anybody

that wants to know, I'll be glad to talk with them.

The word's going to go out that we are going to be

7 there for the public for anybody that wants to talk

to us about one of our professions. The other

professions are going to be there as well,

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You go on the internet, you fill out the 25 application, you pay all that money, you go take that

2 Alabama at all. Georgia, they don't have an

3 apprenticeship. Kentucky said no. North Carolina

4 says they call them associates, and they have to have

5 3,000 hours. Arkansas said no. Delaware said no.

6 Indiana, no. Missouri said no, but they have to have

7 two years experience, and they are called an

8 employee. Nevada said no, but you have to have five

9 years or else 10,000 hours of full-time experience. 10 North Carolina calls the apprentices associates, and

11 you have to have 3,000 hours.

I told you last time one of the

13 Commission members asked me about that, so I did

14 contact these other states to see about the

15 apprenticeship. Some of them -- I think they call

16 them associates, instead of apprenticeships, but not

17 all the states have apprentices. I don't know how

18 else you are going to bring people into the industry. 19 I mean, unless somebody just wakes up one day and

20 sees TV and says I want to be a private investigator

21 and calls us.

22 We will be going to -- Mark Amick and I 23 are going in September to a workshop for the public, 24 and we are going to have a booth. It's going to be

25 for all our professions, and we are going to be
