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Division has worked diligently on each technical chapter of the SIM document to incorporate the new rules, new requirements, and updated inspection policies and procedures. The Division has also updated existing compliance forms and created new compliance forms as necessary for use to maintain compliance with the new rule requirements.

The draft versions of the revised and new Standardized Inspection Manual (SIM) technical chapters and compliance forms are all available for review on our website. The Division is providing these draft documents for review; and welcomes comments, feedback and participation from stakeholders, tank owners and/or operators, and service providers.

New Rules Webinar Review for Tank Owners / Operators

The Division is now pleased to offer three upcoming opportunities to participate in a one-hour new rules webinar developed specifically for tank owners and operators. This webinar will focus on the specific new rule requirements and responsibilities for the tank owner and operators to maintain compliance with the October 13, 2018, new rules UST system equipment testing and record-keeping requirements. The webinars will be provided at no cost to participants and are solely designed to help our regulated community maintain compliance and continue an open dialogue and communication between Division personnel and our tank owners and operators. A question and answer period will be held at the end of the webinar presentation for further clarification of the new rule requirements. New 2018/2021 Rule Change

Annual Release Detection Electronic and Mechanical Component Operability Testing*

New Rule Requirement: Annual testing of electronic and mechanical release detection components.

Tank Owner Responsibility: Maintain the 3 previous annual tests of release detection components.

Components Required to Test

- Automatic tank gauge and other controllers test alarm; verify system configuration; test battery backup
- Probes and sensors: inspect for residual buildup; ensure floats move freely; ensure shaft is not damaged; ensure cables are free of kinks and breaks; test alarm operability and communication with controller
- Automatic line leak detector function test
- Vacuum pumps and pressure gauges: ensure proper communication with sensors and controller
- Test all IM tank and sump sensors



*Annual operability testing must be maintained for three years.

Q&A

How long must annual operabilty testing be maintained?	All annual operability testing must be mainained for three years.
How often must an automatic line leak detector	An automatic line leak detector must be tested annually.

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What is required to be tested on an Automatic Tank Gauge annually?	The alarm must be tested, the system configuration must be verified and the battery backup tested.
What is required to be tested for probes and sensors annually?	They must be inspected for residual buildup, ensure the floats move freely; ensure the shaft is not damaged; ensure the cables are free of kinks and breaks, and the alarm operability and communication with the controller must be tested.
How often must the electronic and mechanical components of release detection equipment be tested?	All electronic and mechanical components of release detection equipment must be tested annually.
