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A Letter from the Commissioner

The Tennessee Department of Safety & Homeland Security is responsible for ensuring the safety and general welfare of the public. The department's general areas of responsibility include:

- Law enforcement and criminal investigations
- Homeland security
- Safety education
- Driver license issuance, renewal and replacement
- Enforcement of various vehicle safety and inspection laws
- Gun permit applications

The department uses its Customer Focused Government Plan as its guide in setting priorities. It's stated vsion is "to be a national leader in best practices that enhance public safety and customer service," and its mission is "to serve, secure, and protect the people of Tennessee."

Headquartered in Nashville, the department maintains a strong presence statewide with more than 50 field offices and employees in each of the state's 95 counties. It is comprised of a highly professional staff of over 1,800 employees, approximately half of whom are commissioned law enforcement officers, while the remaining are civilian employees.

Since the department's creation in 1939, it has undergone various modifications to ensure it is equipped to meet the needs of Tennessee's citizens. Although the major visible focus is on highway safety and ensuring the general welfare of motorists and passengers, the department's services extend to an array of law enforcement activites, ranging from the interdiction of drug trafficking to the investigation of identity crimes; oversight of the state's driver license system and handgun permit system; and homeland security responsibilities.

The department has come a long way since the first state police force was created in 1929, patterned after the historic Texas Rangers. The department itself was established by the General Assembly in 1939, a decade after Governor Henry Horton signed a law creating the Tennessee Highway Patrol, an offshoot of the state police force.

Today, the department and its highly trained state troopers are responsible for safety on more than 87,000 miles of state and federal highways. In 1937, Tennessee became the 32nd state to enact a driver license law. During that first year, 521,571 licenses were issued. Today the number of licensed drivers in Tennessee is approximately 4.5 million.

Since its accreditation in 1999, the department has received re-accredited status in 2002, 2005, 2008 and 2011. The Tennessee Department of Safety & Homeland Security is one of the most visible arms of state government.

Commissioner Bill Gibbons

Bill Gibbons joined Governor Bill Haslam's cabinet as commissioner for the Department of Safety and Homeland Security in January 2011.

Prior to his appointment as commissioner, Gibbons served as Shelby County district attorney general for approximately 14 years.


As commissioner, Gibbons oversees the agency's law enforcement, driver services, and terrorism prevention efforts. He also chairs Governor Haslam's public safety subcabinet made up of all state executive branch departments and agencies involved in public safety to develop and take the lead in implementing a single, consistent state agenda to combat crime.

Gibbons began his service in state government as a policy assistant to Governor Lamar Alexander. Prior to being D.A., Gibbons was a partner in the law firm of Evans and Petree. He has also served as a member of the Memphis City Council and the the Shelby County Board of Commissioners.

Chief of Staff David N. McGriff

David McGriff was named chief of staff in January 2015. McGriff acts as a top advisor to Commissioner Bill Gibbons and oversees the day-to-day operations in the Department of Safety and Homeland Security. He works closely with the assistant commissioners of the Administrative Division, Driver Services Division and Office of Homeland Security, as well as the colonel of the Tennessee Highway Patrol.

McGriff joined the department after spending six-plus years as the director of the West Tennessee Drug Task Force, as well as the chief criminal investigator for the Shelby County District Attorney's Office. Prior to that, he was deputy director for the West Tennessee Drug Task Force from 2001 to 2007. McGriff also worked as a task force supervisor for the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and criminal investigator for the Shelby County District Attorney General.



The Department of Safety and Homeland Security strives to keep the citizens of Tennessee fully informed of its objectives, functions, and accomplishments by maintaining a policy of open communication. This is done through the Communications Office, which serves as the primary point of contact for the agency for media relations and community outreach activities. The Communications Office develops and disseminates news releases, media advisories, reports, and social networking updates. The Communications Office is also protective of the public by ensuring compliance with all laws pertaining to public records. The office maintains the integrity of the department's investigations and actions by safeguarding the safety, evidence, and/or the rights of supsects, defendants, and other citizens. The Communications Office leads the department's public awareness efforts for many statewide law enforcement initiatives, including coordination and cooperation with other state departments and agencies such as the Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT), the Governor's Highway Safety Office (GHSO), and local law enforcement agencies.

Governor's Highway Safety Office

Citizen Safety

The Communications Office met its objective of leading the department's public awareness efforts by keeping the public informed of driver services issues, holiday enforcement, road safety issues, enforcement statistics, enforcement intiatives, and homeland security issues.

Department Promotion

The Communications Office promoted the department by distributing press releases highlighting achievements. This information allowed the public to recognize the hard work in drug enforcement, homeland security initiatives, highway safety iniatives, driver services improvements, and even personnel issues. Providing the public with this information met the department's objective to keep citizens fully informed of its objectives, functions, and accomplishments.

Executive Divisions

Legal and Legislative Services

The Legal Division serves in an advisory capacity to all other divisions of the department as well as staying abreast of changes in state and federal laws. The division works with and assists the Attorney General's Office in all appealed asset forfeiture cases and any claims filed against the department or its employees. The division also includes the commissioner's legislative liasions, who serve as the department's point persons with the Tennessee General Assembly. The Legal Division also contains regional offices that specifically handle asset forfeiture and driver improvement cases.

Asset Forfeiture Section

The asset forfeiture section oversees asset forfeiture laws, managing all aspects of asset forfeiture cases, and representing the lawenforcement agencies that seize the property. The staff is responsible for the processing, setting, and final disposition of all administrative hearings relative to seizures arising from the Tennessee Drug Control Act, DUI seizures, driving on revoked license seizures, and altered vehicle identification seizures. These hearings are currently held in Nashville, Memphis, Knoxville, and Chattanooga as well as various other parts of the state. As an offshoot of this service, the Legal Division provides training to law enforcement officers in this area of the law to enable the law enforcement officers to prepare better cases, which in turn strengthens the division's representation of them.

Driver Improvement

The Driver Improvement Section evaluates the driving records of Tennesseans, based on crashes and/ or convictions of traffic violations, in order to identify and keep track of high-risk drivers and establish procedures for their rehabilitation. Adults who accumulate 12 points within a year are given an opportunity to attend a hearing. If they fail to request a hearing, their driving privileges are suspended for a period of six to 12 months. Drivers under 18 who accumulate six (6) or more points within a year are required to attend an administrative hearing with a Department of Safety hearing officer, where the driver and the driver's parent or legal guardian are required to appear. Driver Improvement also conducts hearings concerning financial responsibility and other driver license issues. Hearing officers are located throughout the state in five offices. In addition to holding the hearings in person, phone hearings are offered for out-of-state drivers. In most cases, when a driver attends a hearing, he or she is given the opportunity to attend a defensive driving class in-lieu of or to reduce the suspension.

Driver Improvement also handles medical referrals regarding the capability of drivers involving physical, mental, and substance abuse concerns. After seeing that a proper evaluation of the driver has been undertaken either by a medical professional or by a licensing re-examination, Driver Improvement may suspend the driver's license, add restrictions, or withdraw the proposed suspension. Other responsibilities include approving and monitoring the Defensive Driving Schools located across the state.

Department Divisions

Administrative Services



The Administrative Services Division provides support across the agency. The division is led by Assistant Commissioner Larry Godwin and consists of the bureaus of Facilities Management; Fiscal Services; Human Resources; Information Technology; Inspectional Services; Internal Audit; Research, Planning, and Development; and Talent Management. Godwin joined the Department of Safety and Homeland Security in April of 2011. Prior to his appointment, Godwin was a 37-year veteran of the Memphis Police Department, retiring as the City's Director of Police Services in the spring of 2011.

Fiscal Services

Fiscal Services is responsible for preparing the annual budget, maintaining, processing, and accounting for all expenditures and revenues within the department

Information Technology (IT)

IT is responsible for system and platform design, installation, maintenance, and all other computer related equipment activity including business solutions, project management, solutions development, operations, and information processing.

Talent Management

Talent Management has taken the lead in developing leaders and helping employees improve their skills and expertise to contribute to the overall success of the department.

Human Resources (HR)

HR is responsible for organizing and coordinating the hiring process, implementing and reviewing salary administration policies, processing employee transactions, and providing career counseling.

Inspectional Service Bureau

The Inspectional Services Bureau receives and investigates complaints against employees and documents compliments as well.

Facilities Management

Working with the Department of General Services, Facilities Management is responsible for building maintenance programs and state wide construction programs as well as ensuring a safe and healthy workplace for the department.

Internal Audit

Internal Audit provides safeguards against fraud, waste, and unauthorized use or misappropriation of funds and property.

Research, Planning, and Development (RP&D)

RP&D is responsible for creating and providing policies and procedures to all department employees. It also adminsters a variety of special programs such as the Ignition Interlock Device Program and Digital In-Car Camera Program, compliance with standards promulgated by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Standards, management of all of the department's forms and publications, coordination of the disbursement of federal funding dirived from asset seizures, planning Tennessee's connectivity to the nationwide public safety broadband network, and working with the department's legislative liasions on various laws and initatives.

Department Divisions Driver Services

The mission of the Driver Services Division is to promote safe, knowledgeable, and competent drivers in the State of Tennessee. The division issues driver licenses and photo identifications in addition to handling a variety of other services, ranging from gun permit applications to voter registration. It is also responsible for cancelling, revoking or suspending licenses as a result of previous offenses as well as reinstating the licenses of eligible citizens.

The Driver Services Division is continously working to provide the best customer service experience possible. In addition to the service centers located throughout the state, the division also partners with county clerks and other local government entities and offers online services for the convience of customers.

Driver Services District Locations



There are also a number of units offering specialized services to the department and the public:

Commercial Driver License (CDL)

The CDL section is responsible for the testing and issuing of commercial driver licenses to all persons who qualify as well as the management of CDL driver records. It coordinates commercial driver record issues with other state and federal partners.

Driver License Issuance

This section is responsible for driver testing and issuing standard driver licenses and photo-identifications to all persons who qualify, selling motor vehicle records, and handling voter registration and handgun permit applications.

Financial Responsibility

This section is responsible for coordinating all cancellation, revocation, and suspension actions against driving privileges arising from crashes, moving violations, weapons violations, child support arrearages, and handles failure to appear in court and reinstatement of driving

Office of Homeland Security




Assistant Commissioner David Purkey

The Office of Homeland Security has primary responsibilty and authority for directing homeland security activities including, but not limited to, planning, coordinating, and implementing all homeland security prevention, protection, and response operations. This responsibility includes developing and implementing a comprehensive coordinated strategy to secure the state from terrorist threats and attacks. The office serves as liaison to related agencies of the federal government, agencies of local government, agencies of other states, and related private sector agencies on matters of homeland security.

The office, in partnership with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI), operates an intelligence gathering fusion center, which enchances the state's ability to analyze terrorism information and improve information-sharing among state, local, and federal agencies.

TN Homeland Security Districts



Awareness - Identify and understand terrorist threats within Tennessee.

Prevention - Detect, deter, and mitigate terrorist threats to Tennessee.

Protection - Safeguard our citizens, their freedoms and property, and the economy of Tennessee from acts of terrorism.

Response - Assist in coordinating the response to terrorist related events.

Organizational Excellence - Put the safety of our citizens first.

Tennessee Highway Patrol

Members of the THP enforce all duties set forth by state law, including, but not limited to, motor vehicle laws, investigation of traffic crashes, assistance to motorists, and assistance to other law enforcement agencies upon request. Additional, the THP is responsible for the enforcement for all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to the safe operation of commercial vehicles on the roads and highways of Tennessee, including enforcement of licensing, fuel tax, and insurance law applying to interstate motor carriers. Major commercial vehicle enforcement activities include inspecting commercial vehicles and driver logs, patroling highways with focus on truck traffic violations, and weighing commercial vehicles both at Interstate Inspections stations and with portable scales along the highway. The THP is the lead state agency in interdicting illegal activites on our highways and interstates and in investigating

numerous categories of crimes, including identity theft. Its Special Operations Unit includes a Bomb Squad, tactical operations for high risk situations, and search and rescue operations.
