Legislative Update	Richard Kennedy, Executive Directo	or, TCCY	
	TCCY is an independent state agency, operational since 1988. In addition to YTAC, we work with state, community, nonprofit orgs seeking to improve lives of youth and families. This year, a caption bill was filed that opened the code establishing TCCY. Last Monday an amendment was filed to eliminate the		

commission and imbed the work with other departments. When news began to spread, the outpouring of support was overwhelming. Statewide, child-serving associations advocated on behalf of the Commission. As of now, the Senate has rolled the bill to the first calendar of 2024, and the House subcommittee took the bill off notice. We are hopeful the bill will not be taken up until next January. Commission members were previously unaware of the amendment, and will now turn their attention to evaluating the potential legislation at the next quarterly meeting in May. Commission members have sent the Governor a letter expressing opposition to the measure.

Coming up at TCCY – community meetings, seeking input to improve TCCY

TCCY is limited in our ability to advocate for ourselves, so partnerships like YTAC are important to demonstrate the value of the council. We cannot tell you what position to take, but consider whether TCCY brings value to your work.

Other Bills – Youth Justice Review Commission, would function much like the 2nd look commission. The bill creating the commission passed out of Senate Committee this week and is scheduled for House Committee next week.

The Governor's bill establishing paid family leave for state employees has passed the senate.

A substantial investment is being made in DCS, and it is long overdue.

Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services Update

- Clinical High Risk for Psychosis (CHR-P) Program
 - o Currently with CMI Healthcare Services in Shelby Co.
 - Serves ages 12-15 at risk of developing psychosis
 - Ends 09/29/22 with potential no-cost extension to close out
 - Dept plans to apply for new 4-year CHR-P services SAMHSA grant
 - Preliminary results:
 - 0 conversions to psychosis
 - Increase in school enrollment
 - Decrease in crisis
 - Increase in life satisfaction
- First Episode Psychosis (OnTrackTN) Program
 - Using COVID relief funds, adding 3 additional OnTrackTN sites for a total of 8.
 - The new sites have received preliminary training and
 2 of them began enrolling in Feb.
 - Serves ages 15-30 who have experienced a first episode of psychosis within the past 2 years
 - 144 youth/young adults served this fiscal year (as of Dec. 2021).

- Recent outcomes:
 - 69% reduction in behavioral health reasons
 - 59% increase in symptom improvement
- Healthy Transitions
 - o 2 sites
 - Mental Health Cooperative (Davidson)
 - Frontier Health (Greene)
 - Serves ages 16-25 w/mental health diagnosis or cooccurring disorder, including co-occurring intellectual/developmental disability
 - Provided education & awareness of youth/young adult mental health to 16,327 individuals across TN
 - o Direct outreach to 283 youth
 - o 50 youth/young adults served this fiscal year
 - Recent outcomes:
 - + positive functioning in daily life
 - psychological distress
 - use of illegal substances
 - Notable events:
 - Partnership with TN DIDD to receive training on serving youth and young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities
 - Statewide Young Adult Leadership Council (YALC) meets monthly
 - Healthy Transitions Summit to be held March 30/31
 - Learn to navigate "The New Normal"
- Certified Young Adult Peer Support Specialist (CYAPSS)
 Program
 - Launched May 2021
 - o 18 young people trained from Sept 2021-March2022
 - Quarterly trainings based on # of applications received
 - o 1 individual fully certified; others on the way soon.
 - Eligibility
 - 18-30 yrs old
 - One year of recovery, healing and wellness, from mental illness or substance abuse
 - High school diploma or equivalent
 - Willingness to discuss lived experience with peers, staff, and the public
 - May not have a conservator
 - Application Process, Training, and Certification
 - 75 hours supervised peer support services
 - 3 references
