#### **#2: Struck By – Inspection #317585735**

A **67 year old male** part time property maintenance employee was cutting down a dead tree approximately 55 feet tall and 31 inches in diameter at the west side of the property. As the employee was cutting down the tree a limb, approximately 6 inches in diameter, fell and struck the victim on the head and shoulders. The victim succumbed to the injuries three days later. Personal protective equipment was provided on the job site, but the victim was not wearing it nor was he trained in how and when to use it.
